
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This Report

This report focuses on the community of Armthorpe, part of the Armthorpe ward in the East of the City and begins with a summary outlining key information and priorities. This document builds on the initial conversations with communities, including ward members, community organisations, faith groups, residents and other organisations who work in the area. Communities' knowledge of their own areas enables them to identify their strengths and the assets on which they can build on. This document is shared with the intention of supporting those conversations and sharing information that might not be readily available to local people.

Armthorpe community is represented as accurately as possible in this report, where possible, separate data and illustrations have been used. Much of the health and population data presented in this report for Armthorpe.

One Page Summary

This report focuses on the community of Armthorpe is a ward in the East of the City. Armthorpe has a population of 14,200 with 30.9% 1-person household to 16.9% 4 or more living in a household. Household who is living in deprived circumstances is 35.4% compared to Doncaster average which is 34.7%, Armthorpe is just below.

Armthorpe has a good employment opportunity which shows in this report, there is 57.2% in employment which is higher than Doncaster average at 54.9%.

The community is predominantly White British 95.7%. The remaining are small diverse communities of Asian, Black, Mixed, and other Ethnic Groups. 90.4% of residents in Armthorpe was born in the UK compared to Doncaster 89.6%.

The Armthorpe ward has an Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) Score of 22.1. Armthorpe ranked 48 out of 88 communities in Doncaster.

Armthorpe has many community assets which include green spaces, parks, and community venues.

Key Health priorities

Armthorpe

- Poor healthy life expectancy Deaths that are caused by respiratory diseases, smoking is Armthorpe in significantly higher than England's average.
- High levels of heart disease alongside inactive deprived households with children and young people as well as high levels of childhood and adult obesity.
- Children obesity- Year 6 students is significantly worse than England's average and reception age.

Assets

Well Doncaster uses a community centred approach which allows investment in supporting, working with, and empowering communities to facilitate a healthy community. The voice and role of our communities and taking a strength or assets-based approach to work with individuals, families and communities is crucial to the achievement of our overall vision.

Health Assets are made up of different assets in the community.




Figure 1 – Armthorpe Ward Health Assets




Figure 2 – Armthorpe Ward Business Assets





Figure 3 – Armthorpe Ward Community Assets

Health and Wealth

Deprivation

Health inequalities are avoidable differences across the population and between different groups within society. Health inequalities arise from the conditions in which we live, work and play. These conditions influence our opportunities for good health, how we think, feel and act, therefore shaping our health and wellbeing.

Evidence shows that people living in our most deprived areas face the worse health inequalities in relation to health access, experiences, and outcomes. Deprivation covers a range of issues and refers to unmet needs caused by a lack of resources, including but not limited to finances, housing, and education. It is measured in different ways including the Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD). Doncaster is within the 10% most deprived communities in England.

The map below shows Armthorpe is in the 70 % most deprived communities in Doncaster.





Figure 4 - Doncaster borough deprivation by LSOA

IMD data shows deprivation levels have increased in Armthorpe between 2015 and the most recent data collected in 2019. As it can be seen in the table below. Armthorpe has been the 7th most deprived community in Doncaster in both 2015 and 2019 and has become more deprived according to national rankings (escalating to position 793).

The 2021 Census data has been used to produce estimates that classify households in England and Wales by four dimensions of deprivation: employment, education, health and disability and household overcrowding.



The Census 2021 data breaks down this information into household deprivation within Armthorpe area compared to Doncaster and England.

44.8% of households in Armthorpe are not deprived in any dimensions which is significantly lower than Doncaster (43.7%) and England (48.4%).

Similarly, 16.0% of households are deprived in two dimensions higher than Doncaster (16.7%) and England (14.2%) and households deprived in three dimensions (3.7%) are significantly higher than Doncaster (4.6%) and England (3.7%).

The graphic below illustrates the differences between Armthorpe. Armthorpe has a significantly higher prevalence of output areas which are deprived in 3 dimensions.

Figure 8-Armthrope household deprivation (census 2021)


St leger has government affordable housing within the Doncaster borough. There are 678 St Leger properties in Armthorpe. 215 of these are 3 bed houses and 157 are 2 bed bungalows. Total amount of rent arrears between 21-22 was £50,218.00 and rent arrears between 22-23 £59,364.00, this amount risen within 4 years.

Citizen's advice Doncaster Borough

In Armthorpe there are 117 residents who are seeking support the Citizens advice which is out of 9000 residents in Doncaster. Please see the diagram below, the purple dots show the areas the residents are from seeking the support.




The top 5 issues that residents are seeking advice about is showed in the diagram below.



Poverty

A significantly high proportion of Armthorpe residents are experiencing income deprivation (11.8), This is significantly higher than Doncaster (16.6%) and England (12.9%). 16.2% of children in Armthorpe are living in poverty, significantly higher than Doncaster (22.7%) and England (17.1%). Furthermore, 13.6% of older people are also living in poverty which is higher than Doncaster (15.9%) and England (14.2%). These deprivation indicators are illustrated in the chart below comparing the



Armthorpe ward to England. From the IMD LSOA breakdown it can be assumed that the majority of those experiencing income deprivation or child poverty live in Armthorpe.

Fuel poverty

Fuel poverty is defined as a household living on a lower income which is not deemed reasonable enough to warm a home sufficiently. In 2020, (16.2) of adults in Armthorpe were unable to warm their homes to a reasonable standard which is higher than Doncaster (18.8%) and significantly higher than England (13.2%). The recent cost of living crisis including rising fuel costs and inflation may be a contributing factor.




Figure 9 - Deprivation indicators - Armthorpe

Another measure which may indicate deprivation is the number of cars in each household. There are significant differences between Armthorpe. This should also be considered when considering health interventions between the communities as it may be a barrier to accessing services. This is illustrated in the graphic below.





Figure 10 - Households without a car or Van, 2021 Census

Employment

In Armthorpe north 28.3% of residents aged 16 and over who are not in employment and have never worked, significantly higher than Doncaster (27.2%) and England (25.6%). This is particularly high in the Hatter Close area where 28.3% of residents who aren't in employment have never worked.








Figure 11 - Not in employment & never worked – Armthorpe

In Armthorpe, of those who are in work the majority work full time (61.0%), which is similar to figures for Doncaster (60.7%) and England (59.1%) and 21.2% work part time, less than Doncaster (28.9%) and England (29.8%).




Figure 11 - Employment History, Occupation & Highest level of Qualification for Armthorpe compared to England

Occupation figures in figure 11 highlight those in Elementary Occupations (15.4%) is lower than Doncaster (16.5%) and England (10.5%) along with skilled trades occupation (12.9%), higher than Doncaster (11.7%) and England (10.2). Traditionally these roles are low skill and low pay roles. Furthermore, 11.4% are employed in Professional Occupations, lower than Doncaster (12.8%) and England (20.3%), usually requiring higher skill levels, education and receive higher pay. Contrastingly,

A large percentage of people aged 16 years and older in Armthorpe North have no qualifications (24.6%) compared to Doncaster (24.6%) and England (18.1%). Streets such as Lime tree (43%), Cow Lane (33.8%) and South field Road (26.6%) have particularly high levels of residents with no qualifications, this could be due to the area being mainly bungalows and residents being from the older generation. Furthermore, residents who are qualified to Level 4 and above in Armthorpe South (20.6%) than Doncaster (22.7%) and England (33.9%).

Childhood Development

In 2021/22 the data shows that 29.7% of children are overweight or obese at reception age in Armthorpe which is higher to Doncaster (26.1%) is significantly higher than England (22.6%). This increases to 41.7% in year 6 which is significantly higher to Doncaster (38.2%) and England (35.8%).

In Armthorpe the prevalence of regular smokers at age 15 (8.5%) are higher than Doncaster (6.8%) and England (5.4%). the general fertility rate, which is live births per 100.0 women aged 15-44 is higher (63.3) than Doncaster (62.4) and England (59.2).

In 2020, emergency admissions in under 5s are lower in Armthorpe (70.7 per 100.0) than Doncaster (99.0 per 100.0) and lower than England (119.3 per 100.0). Emergency hospital admissions for under 15-year-olds (82.4 per 100.0) are lower than Doncaster (88.8 per 100.0) and England (92.0 per 100.0).

The Pupil Lifestyle Survey is conducted by City of Doncaster Council to provide valuable data on children and young people's health-related behaviour, through an anonymous school-based questionnaire. Data from the survey has provided a set of Doncaster-wide figures at key points in children and young people's development; KS2, 3 and 4. This profile will compare the previous 2020 data with that collected most recently in 2022.

In Armthorpe 170 pupils participated. 84% of participants have breakfast, this is lower than the Doncaster (86%). The survey also indicated that 44% of school-aged children in Armthorpe have school meals, this is higher than Doncaster (19%). 13% Armthorpe school aged children have free school meals which is lower than Doncaster (16%). 66% of children in Armthorpe say that they have fruit and vegetables and 14% claimed to consume takeaway food most or every day (vs 15% across Doncaster).

96% of children reported they feel warm and comfortable at home which is lower than Doncaster (97%). 95% felt able to clean themselves at home, also higher than Doncaster (90%). 2021 data showed that only 81% of school children in Armthorpe felt able to have a restful night's sleep, which is higher than Doncaster (78%).

92% of Children reported that they felt safe at home which higher than Doncaster and 91% have a nice, safe place at home or near home to play (Doncaster average 85%).

54% of school children in Armthorpe surveyed reported that they feel able to get involved in the wider community lower than Doncaster (62%).

It is important to note that the Pupil Lifestyle Survey is self-reported and was not completed by all the schools.

Long Term Health Conditions

In Armthorpe, the number of people who report to be living with a long-term limiting illness (21.8%) is significantly worse than for England (17.6) and matches Doncaster (21.7).




Figure 12 – Armthorpe Long term conditions from the Local health


The 2021 census data is showing in Armthorpe 43.3% have very good health which is lower than England (48.5%). The percentage of residents with bad health is 5.3%, higher than England (4.0%).

Armthorpe high levels of hospital admissions for Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) (133.8 per 100.0), 10th highest in Doncaster. Incidences of lung cancer (134.7 per 100.0) and a smoking prevalence of 8.5% is lower than Doncaster (19.7%). Armthorpe ward which is significantly high rates of emergency hospital admissions for COPD (133.8 per 100.0),

compared to Doncaster (124.2 per 100.0) and England (100.0 per 100.0), indicating residents are struggling to manage their condition.


Another key health priority for Armthorpe is the prevalence of heart disease. Circulatory disease, Strokes and Chronic Heart Disease (CHD) are the leading causes of all age and premature deaths in the community. Risk factors for heart disease, such as obesity and alcohol consumption, are also high. Hospital admissions for alcohol attributable conditions Armthorpe are 116.4 per 100.0 which is higher than Doncaster 112.7 per 100.0.

The infographic below shows the percentage of the population in Armthorpe causes of death which relate to health conditions. The prevalence of all these health conditions is higher in Armthorpe than the borough's average. The significantly high level of emphysema, coupled with the significantly higher proportion of deaths from respiratory diseases, highlight the need to tackle the high rates of smoking within the Armthorpe ward. Armthorpe East when broken down in LSOA 88.30 per 1000 per population alcohol specific between 2016-July 2023, this was the highest record in the borough.




Life Expectancy

At a community level, residents living in Armthorpe have a significantly shorter life expectancy. Males in Armthorpe (78.8) and females (80.8) have a significantly shorter life expectancy. The male life expectancy in Armthorpe is not significantly different than Doncaster (77.9) & England (79.5).




Loneliness and Isolation

Just under a third of older people live alone in Armthorpe (32.0%) compared to 31.6% across Doncaster and 31.5% England. Whilst this does not indicate loneliness and/or isolation, it is an indicator to be considered alongside local intelligence.

In Armthorpe 30.9% of residents live with 1 person in a household compared to England (30.1%). 36.3% of people live with 2 people within a household compared with England (34.0%). 15.9% of residents live with 3 people with slightly higher compared to England (16.0%). In the household composition in Armthorpe, 64.5% of residents live in a single-family household and is higher than England (63.0%).

In Armthorpe there is a high number of 1 bedroom St leger bungalows 146 and 1 bedroom St leger flats 83, most of these property's will sit in line with the 30.9% of residents that live with a household who has 1 person or the 36.3% in a 2 people household.







Figure 15 - Armthorpe household size/household

Physical activity

The following map show where there are high numbers of inactive households around the borough. Data is mapped to Lower Super Output Areas, but wards are shown and labelled for orientation. This can be seen in the map below, which identifies areas with the highest number of inactive households. This data has been matched to the number of children and young people living in deprived and inactive households. People living in income deprivation means only people living on social benefits but also in low income or/or precarious work.

Armthorpe has lower number of inactive population when compared to the other areas.




170 pupils answered The Pupil Lifestyle Survey in 2021 regarding physical activity from Armthorpe schools. The Pupil Lifestyle Survey showed that 51% of Armthorpe school children reported walking to school, in line with the Doncaster average of 46% and physical activity via school clubs is 7%, which is lower than to the Doncaster of 11%. Around 74% of school children in Armthorpe who took part in the survey reported that they enjoyed physical activity (Doncaster 76%) and the number of days of physical activity matches those reported for Doncaster. For those who reported not enjoying physical activity, the most common reason was 'getting hot and tired' (50%).

Prevention and Control

Vaccinations

Vaccination uptake data shows Armthorpe has a higher-than-average vaccination rate with 84.2% of its residents receiving the first dose (89.0%) in 2023. Armthorpe has a second dose uptake of 86.7%.



Recovery

The Coronavirus pandemic has had a huge impact on our communities and work continues to focus on the recovery stage of the pandemic. As a part of the recovery approach, Well Doncaster have secured funding from the Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government for Third Sector organisations across the borough to employ Community Connectors. Their role comprises understanding the barriers and work with residents to create solutions that increase vaccination uptake and compliance to social distancing in disadvantaged groups. They also encourage and support those most affected by COVID-19 and engage them in community events and services.

Population Health Management

Covid-19 has had a huge impact on communities. It is vital to understand the effect and direction the pandemic has had on community organisation in the ward so that: 1) support can be offered and 2) work can be implemented to manage any gaps or risks associated with changes. To support the former, Well Doncaster officers undertake regular population health management insight with community organisations in Stainforth, identifying their status and needs and work with each group to meet their goals. 



Ethnicity and Language

Armthorpe continues to be predominantly White British (95.6%), higher than Doncaster (93.1%) and England (81.0%). 0.8%% of the population are Black, Black British or Black Welsh, lower than Doncaster (1.2%) and England (4.2%). 0.6% are Asian, Asian British or Asian Welsh, lower than Doncaster (2.9%) and England (9.6%) In addition. Only 1.7% of residents are from mixed or other ethnic groups, significantly lower than Doncaster (2.7%) and England (5.2%). This aligns with a low number of residents in Armthorpe that cannot speak English well or at all (1.6%), compared to Doncaster (1.6%) and England (1.9%).






Figure 22. Armthorpe Ethnicity & Proficiency in English profiles, Census 2021

Housing




Figure 23. Housing profiles in Stainforth, Census 2021

Housing conditions and the surrounding environment can have profound impacts upon residents' health and exacerbate health inequalities. The data in figures 23 and 24 below explores several variables to analyse the housing in Stainforth, this is important given its highly dense nature.

There are 6,100 households in Stainforth. 2021 census data shows that 12.3% of houses in Armthorpe are socially rented, this is lower than Doncaster (17.0%), residents who owns their homes with a mortgage or loan or shared ownership 32.4% which is higher than Doncaster 29.6%. 90.9% of homes in Armthorpe is whole house or bungalow, this is higher than the Doncaster average. 64.6% Armthorpe residents are living in of single-family household which is higher than Doncaster 64.1 and England 63.0%.

Whether a household's accommodation is overcrowded, ideally occupied or under-occupied. This is calculated by comparing the number of bedrooms the household requires to the number of available bedrooms. An occupancy rating of -1 or less implies that a household's accommodation has fewer bedrooms than required and therefore overcrowded. Armthorpe South has 3.0% of houses that are overcrowded, higher than Doncaster (2.5%) whereas Armthorpe North has 9.2% of houses that are overcrowded which is lower than Doncaster.




Figure 25 – Occupancy Rates in Armthorpe, 2021 Census

Stronger communities' insight

Stronger communities' data shows the vulnerable victims in the East area of Doncaster. As seen in the graph below the number of vulnerable victims that are being supported by the Stronger Communities team. East area of Doncaster has the highest number compared to the other localities.

Community Insight

Appreciative Inquiry

The Well Doncaster Team undertake Appreciative Inquiry (AI) within communities to gather insight to support code signing action plans with the community. Armstrong (2020) suggests in 'A changing world, again. How Appreciative Inquiry can guide our growth' that reframing the questions considering a crisis like Covid-19 and drawing on strengths and assets from past positive experience will help participants as they restructure their community. The AI questions are structured to pull out the successes of the past and present, to seek new potentials and possibilities and build on those through the Dream and Design stages.

Appreciative Inquiry will be conducted in Armthorpe from July 2021. The Appreciative Inquiry will include the following steps:

- Discovery Phase This will involve engagement with the residents of Armthorpe to find out what is working well in the community. Responses will be themed to allow priorities of the community to be established.
- 2. **Dream** Residents and key stakeholders will be invited to attend an initial workshop to discuss what ideas they have for their community and how these will meet the priorities highlighted in the discovery phase.
- 3. **Design** All attendees are invited back for a second workshop to develop an action plan to direct work for the community.
- 4. **Deliver** A collaborative way of working and investing resources in working towards to the actions from the previous phase.

Well Doncaster is starting to work in Armthorpe from 2023. Well Doncaster officers will be going into community assets and having strength base conversations with residents throughout the Armthorpe ward.

In 2023 we have gathered conversations and the responses have been themed, showed in table below. We will revise theming each month.

By presenting data for small areas, Local Health provides evidence of inequalities within local areas. It supports targeted interventions to reduce such inequalities.

Local Health contains indicators related to:

- Population and demographic factors
- Wider determinants of health
- Health outcomes

It presents data for middle super output areas (MSOA), electoral wards, clinical commissioning groups (CCG), local authorities, and England as a whole.

Please note, as the Local Health tool was designed to allow users to map small area data, a mapping option has not been provided in this profile.

The MOSAIC types who "Do not exercise" and "Do not take part in Sport" were searched and three priority groups have been identified through work with strategic partners as part of the development of Doncaster's Physical Activity Strategy. The three priority groups are:

- The Inactive
- Families with children and young people
- People living in income deprivation

These groups are cross-referenced against the inactivity list allowing for the identification of MOSAIC types which are both likely to be inactive and living in deprivation as well as inactive and from households with children and young people.
