
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
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This Report

This report shows the initial conversations with communities, including ward members, community organisations, faith groups, residents and other organisations who work in the area. Communities' knowledge of their own areas enables them to identify their strengths and the assets on which they can build on. This document is shared with the intention of supporting those conversations and sharing information that might not be readily available to local people. The data provided within this report will be from various inputs and will consist of Lakeside community, Belle Vue community and ward level data.

One Page Summary

There are 88 communities in Doncaster, they are ranked in order by the Index of Multiple Deprivation. Belle Vue is ranked the 53rd deprived whereas Lakeside is ranked 80th. Even those these rankings are some of the lowest and are not classed as high deprivation areas, many residents, including children and older people, are living with some levels of deprivation.

Residents in Lakeside and Belle Vue have a larger than average population of working age residents. There is a high proportion of Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME (Black Asian and Minority Ethnic)) residents live in this community.

Development of children, adolescents and young adults is still area of concern for these communities. The number of children living with excess weight is very high, and many are overweight by the time they start school. This pattern continues throughout primary school, with many children being classified as obese by the age of 11.

People in Belle Vue have a lower life expectancy than that of residents in Lakeside and Doncaster. Many residents in both communities are living with conditions related to poor lifestyle choices, including coronary heart disease (CHD) and cancer; there is also a high incidence of Stroke. A sizeable number of preventable deaths occur in people aged 75 and under in Belle Vue. Self-harm related injuries are the leading cause of hospital admissions in Belle Vue also.

Key Health priorities

- Poverty (including child poverty, fuel poverty, poverty in older people, unemployment, and long-term unemployment)
- Child development (specifically weight management and sedentary behaviours)
- Preventing premature deaths specifically linked to poor lifestyle choices (chronic pulmonary disease, Lung cancer and stroke)



Assets

Well Doncaster uses community centred approaches that support investment in supporting, working with, and empowering communities to facilitate a healthy community. The voice and role of our communities and taking a strengths/assets-based approach to work with individuals, families and communities is crucial to the achievement of our overall vision.




Figure 1. Lakeside Business Assets

Figure 2. Lakeside Community Assets





Figure 3. Lakeside Health Assets




Figure 4. Belle Vue Business assets

Figure 5. Belle Vue Community assets





Figure 6. Belle Vue Health assets



Health and Wealth

Health inequalities are avoidable differences across the population, and between different groups within society. Health inequalities arise from the conditions in which we live, work and play. These conditions influence our opportunities for good health, how we think, feel and act, therefore shaping our health and wellbeing.

Evidence shows that people living in our most deprived areas face the worse health inequalities in relation to health access, experiences, and outcomes. Deprivation covers a range of issues and refers to unmet needs caused by a lack of resources, including but not limited to finances, housing, and education. It is measured in different ways including the Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD).




Figure 7. LSOA Deprivation levels 2015-2019

Poverty

The IMD score in Lakeside/Bessacarr grange currently stands at 10 this is extremely lower than that of Doncaster which stands at 30.3, it is also considerably lower than the national rate of 21.7. Belle Vue/Town fields is on the same level at 30.2 as Doncaster but is higher than the national rate.

Deprivation

The data provided via Public Health Fingertips shows the different levels of deprivation throughout our communities in Doncaster. Below is a table of data showing income deprivation, children affected by income deprivation, older people in poverty and those affected by fuel poverty. From the data provided we can see that Bessacarr is comparatively less deprived than Doncaster and also nationally.




Figure 8. Levels of income deprivation across wards, Income Deprivation Affecting Children (IDACI) and Income Deprivation Affecting Older People (IDAOPI), 2019

Alcohol

The data supplied by Public Health Fingertips data shows that Bessacarr is the 6th lowest population of Doncaster with hospital admissions of alcohol attributable conditions (broad definition)




Figure 9. Alcohol admissions by ward 2016/17-20/21

Lakeside/Bessacarr grange has a rate of 83.9 and Belle Vue/Town Fields of 133.3 compared to Doncaster at 112.7 and is lower than England at 100.0.

Smoking

In Doncaster we have 37 GPs, of which they provide data for their patients who when registered, register as a smoker. Doncaster has 274,681 patients registered aged 15+ of this 49,332 are down as being a smoker (17.96%). Doncaster has the highest percentage of registered smoked compared to our surrounding boroughs Rotherham (16.48%), Barnsley (17.11%), Sheffield (13.92%) and Other (14.46%).

From the data provided by NHS England 16 GPs serve the Central Locality based in communities throughout. The table below shows the number of patients registered to Central GP surgeries, registered as a smoker.

Foodbank Data

There are 8 active foodbanks in the Central locality of Doncaster. On average in quarter 2 (Jul – Sept 23) 311 adults and 127 children per month who were supported by Central Foodbanks.

There are none based in these Communities. On average 514 people receive a food parcel from the foodbanks in this locality per month.

Employment

The 2021 Census has given us new data based on the community of Lakeside and Belle Vue.

71.9% of residents in Lakeside are currently in employment and 63.3% in Belle Vue, which is higher to that of Doncaster (54.9%) and England at 57.4%. There is a considerable number of these residents in Lakeside who work from home 29.3% and Belle Vue 21.5%, both are higher than the rate of Doncaster at 18.5%. Even so, 45.1% of people within Lakeside have not been employed in the last 12 months which is lower than the rate for Doncaster at 61.6%. Belle Vue has a slightly higher rate than Lakeside at 53.3% but is still below Doncaster. The Census 2021 data revealed that 28.3% of the population of Lakeside have been recorded as Never Worked and 33% for Belle Vue respectively, which is similar to the rate of Doncaster (27.2%) and England (25.6%).

Of those who work, many people work full time (69.7% and 61.8%) which is slightly higher to that of Doncaster (60.7%) and England (59.1%). Part time working is just slightly lower for Lakeside (14.9%) than the Doncaster rate (20.7%) and England (19.5%) with Belle Vue having rate closer (20.7%).

The census has also showed us the professions of residents in Lakeside (24.8%) and Belle Vue (17.1%) with Professional occupations which is considerably more than that of Doncaster (12.8%) and on par with England (20.3%). This follows suit with the roles of – Managers, Directors and Senior Officials and Associate professional and technical occupations.




Figure 10. Occupations for Lakeside and Belle Vue residents – Census 2021

Housing

Most of the housing in Lakeside and Belle Vue are 'new builds' and consist of whole houses, flats, and apartments. There is a mixture of residents that outright own their house (65.7% and 85.2%) compared to that of Doncaster (33.6%).




figure 11. Accommodation type in Lakeside and Belle Vue - Census 2021

St Leger Homes is the main provider of Doncaster's Social Housing. St Leger homes own 2 3 bed houses in Lakeside, they are rented to 46-65 years of age and has rent arrears of £121 for 2022/23. St Leger Homes do not own any houses in Belle Vue

The 2021 Census data has produced estimates that classify households in England and Wales by four dimensions of deprivation: employment, education, health and disability and household overcrowding. Lakeside and Belle Vue have a higher proportion of households not in any deprived dimensions (67.9% and 51.3%) compared to Doncaster (43.7%) and England (48.4%). It also has lower proportion of households in all other dimensions: one dimension: Lakeside and Belle Vue (23.9% and 33.3%,) compared to Doncaster (34.7%) and England (33.5%). Two dimensions; Lakeside and Belle Vue (6.7% and 12.2%) Doncaster (16.7%), England (14.2%). Three dimensions; Lakeside and Belle Vue (1.5% and 3.2%) Doncaster (4.6%) and England (3.7%) and four dimensions: Lakeside and Belle Vue (0% and 0%), Doncaster (0.2%) and England (0.2%).

This data shows that both communities are not classed as deprived communities in Doncaster.

Long-Term Health Conditions

The 2021 Census shows us that 53.2% of residents live in 'very good health', in Lakeside and 46.3% in Belle Vue, this is higher than the rate for Doncaster 44.3%. 34.5% live in 'good health' in Lakeside and 37.6% in Belle Vue (Doncaster 34.1%), 8.8% live in 'fair health' in Lakeside and 11.7% in Belle Vue (18.2%), 2.3% live with bad health in Lakeside and 3.5% in Belle Vue (Doncaster 5.3%) and 1.1% live with 'very bad health in Lakeside and 0.9% in Belle Vue (Doncaster 1.6%). Specifically, incidence rates of Heart Attack (82.4 per 100 people) are the largest hospital admission in Lakeside with Self Harm being the highest in Belle Vue (180.6 per 100 people).




Figure 13. Comparison of emergency hospital admissions by ward 2016/17-20/21

Emergency hospital admissions largely associated with health conditions related to poor lifestyle choices are also more likely across those severely deprived communities. As you can see Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange is lower for all hospital admissions across the board compared to Doncaster and national rates.

Life Expectancy

Life expectancies in males (82.7y) and females (84.7) living in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange are higher than the rates of Doncaster (*m*: 77.9, *f*: 81.3) and England (*m*: 79.5, *f*: 83.2), but are lower in Belle Vue.




Figure 14. Life expectancy and deaths, preventable deaths under 75

Causes of Death

The leading causes of death within Bessacarr is Stroke (111.2 per 100,000). A considerable number of deaths are deemed preventable, suggesting work on measures to target healthy lifestyle choices may have an impact on these figures.




Figure 15: All age deaths

Deaths rates from all causes and all ages across Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange, aside from All Cancers all are lower than those of for Doncaster and England. This is the opposite for Belle Vue/Town Fields.




Figure 16: Deaths under 75

Lakeside/Bessacarr grange has one of the lowest rates of deaths in under 75s across Doncaster. The chart shows that Bessacarr has a significantly lower death rate in all areas

under 75 compared to Doncaster and even England. Belle Vue/Town fields is higher in all deaths.

Childhood Development

The general fertility rate, live births in Lakeside is 56.2 with 1.1% born to teenage mothers. In Belle Vue the general fertility rate, live births are 57, with 1.1% born to teenage mothers.

Healthy development milestones from early to middle childhood, are looked at in all 88 Doncaster communities. The prevalence of children classified as overweight (including obese) in reception is lower in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange and Belle Vue/Town Fields (19.5% and 24%) compared to the rate of Doncaster (26.1%) and England (22.6%). In the same category moving into Year 6 you can see that the percentage increases and the numbers of children are reported to be overweight (including obese) (29.3%) in Lakeside and Belle Vue (40%).




Figure 17. Average levels of overweight and obese children in reception and year 6 across 2019/20 – 21/22

During adolescence and young adulthood, hospital admissions amongst individuals aged 15-24 years of age are the 6th lowest in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange (114 people per 10,000) compared to the rate of Doncaster (161.66 people per 10,000). Belle Vue/Town Fields (224.9 people per 10,000) is a lot higher than its neighbouring community and Doncaster.

As there are no schools located within Lakeside and Belle Vue the local catchment area would be Bessacarr. The following data has been taken from the 2022 Pupil Lifestyle Survey and will best represent children's reporting for these two communities.

In the 2022 Pupil Lifestyle survey saw 13% reported having a long-standing illness higher than Doncaster 12%. 4% reported having a disability which is in line with the rest of Doncaster.

When asked about healthy eating and wellbeing, 91% report having breakfast which higher that the percentage of Doncaster (86%) and 52% having school dinners, this is lower than Doncaster (55%). There is an extremely lower proportion of children accessing free school meals with 3% in Bessacarr than the rate across Doncaster at 19%.

98% reported feeling warm and comfortable at home, 90% feel able to clean themselves at home and 82% reported having a restful night's sleep. These are all in line with Doncaster. 84% of children stated that they felt safe at home (Doncaster 89%) and 87% of children have a nice safe place at home or near home to play.

The Department for Education supplies each local authority with the school attainment grades for those in KS2 and KS4. As noted above the information provided has been take from the closest school catchment area for these two communities.

At KS4, each pupil is given an Attainment 8 score (a score out of 90) based on their 8 best GCSE grades including English, maths and at least 3 other traditional academic GCSEs (sciences, languages, and humanities). Other qualifications at an equivalent level (e.g., BTECs) can also count towards the score. In 2019, the average GCSE attainment 8 score per pupil (out of 90) was 54.5 in Bessacarr, this is higher than Doncaster (44) nationally (46.7). In 2022 the results had a slight decrease at an average of 49.4 for Bessacarr, compared to Doncaster at 45.2 and nationally at 48.8

In 2023 for KS2, 69% of pupils achieved the expected standard in reading, writing, and mathematics in Intake, a slight increase of 4% since 2022. This is higher than that of Doncaster as a whole (55%) and is also the national percentage of 60%.

Twenty-one children have been recorded as receiving Elective Home Education and eleven recorded as missing education in Bessacarr (City of Doncaster Council, 2023).

Physical Activity

Mosaic data shows a small percentage of the population in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange, and Belle Vue do not engage in any moderate intensity physical activity. Please see appendix for more information on mosaic data. More information on the Acorn profile can be found in the appendix.




Figure 18. Levels of inactivity within households across Doncaster

Data from the Pupil Lifestyle Survey (2022) reports an average of 21% of children are physically active on only one or two days a week, whilst 28% were said to be active on three of four and 50% on five or more occasions during the week. Getting hot, tired, and not being particularly good at physical activity were the two residing answers given by pupils when asked why they did not participate in physical activity The full Pupil Lifestyle Survey at ward level and locality level can be found here.

The main reason children do not take part in physical activity is that they get to hot and tired (63%) followed by that they just prefer to do other things (63%) then not being very good at it (56%), they also don't like being competitive (44%), to being outdoors in bad or cold weather (38%). The last reasons for inactivity are feeling shy about their body (19%) and having to change into different clothes (6%).

Green Spaces/Parks

Lakeside Lake and Lakeside Hill are the largest green spaces for residents to use who live in Lakeside and Belle Vue. There are 3 parks located in the vicinity – Buttermere Crescent Park, Runway Park and Belle Vue Avenue/Hyde Park play areas all are easily accessible to residents. The parks consist of toddler and junior play areas.

Prevention and Control

The Coronavirus pandemic has highlighted the need and value of understanding at risk population groups at a hyper-local level to guide prevention work and ensure that appropriate support and resources are in place.




Figure 19. At risk settings in Central Doncaster

As of 25 October 2023, 89.1% of eligible residents in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange have received their first COVID-19 vaccination dose, 86.9% have received their second dose, and 74.5% have received their third dose or boosters (UK Health Security Agency, 2023).

The uptake in Belle Vue/Town Fields is lower with 69.1% of eligible residents have received their first COVID-19 vaccination dose, 65.4% have received their second dose, and 49.7% have received their third dose or boosters (UK Health Security Agency, 2023).

Population Health Management

Covid-19 has had an enormous impact on communities. It is vital to understand the effect and direction the pandemic has had on community organisation in the ward so that: 1) support can be offered and 2) work can be implemented to manage any gaps or risks associated with changes. To support the former, Well Doncaster officers undertake regular population health management insight with community organisations in the Central Locality identifying their current status and needs, and work with each group to meet their goals. Community Information

Population and Diversity

Around 14.5% of residents in Lakeside/Bessacarr Grange stated their ethnicity as "not White UK' with 26.7% in Belle Vue/Town Fields, although the specific categories and languages spoken are unknown, closely followed by 'not white' at 10.6% and 14.7% respectively. These communities have a low percentage of non-English speakers (1.2% & 5.4%).

Population size

Age profile

Working age adults make up the largest proportion of the population in both Lakeside and Belle Vue, Belle Vue does have higher rate of younger residents compared to Lakeside and Doncaster. The census 2022 data shows that Belle Vue also has a slightly higher rate of elderly residents living in the community compared to Lakeside.




Figure 20. Age profiles of Lakeside community




Figure 21. Age profiles of Belle Vue community

Community Insight

Appreciative Inquiry

The Well Doncaster Team undertake Appreciative Inquiry (AI) within communities to gather insight to support co-designing action plans with the community. Armstrong (2020) suggests in his work 'A changing world, again. How Appreciative Inquiry can guide our growth' that reframing the questions considering a crisis like Covid-19 and drawing on strengths and assets from past positive experience will help participants as they restructure their community. The AI questions are structured to pull on the successes of the past and present, to seek new potentials and possibilities and to build on those through the Dream and Design stages.

The Appreciative Inquiry will include the following steps take:

- Discovery Phase This will involve engagement with the residents of Hyde Park to find out what is working well in the community. Responses will be themed to allow priorities of the community to be established.
- 2. **Dream** Residents and key stakeholders will be invited to attend an initial workshop to discuss what ideas they have for their community and how these will meet the priorities highlighted in the discovery phase.
- 3. **Design** All attendees are invited back for a second workshop to develop an action plan to direct work for the community.
- 4. **Destiny** A collaborative way of working and investing resources to meet the actions from the previous phase.

Residents were asked a series of questions which have been placed into themes. The below information has been recorded from talking to residents who live in the Lakeside Community. Unfortunately, we do not have any insight at this moment in time for Belle Vue.

From the responses, the Lakeside area is equipped with great amenities and transport links, they have good green spaces which are within walking distance. The responses also show that they lack a sense of community and feels as there is no community cohesion, this may be due to a lack of community centres or family hub where families can meet up together.

Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough


The data provided by Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough shows us that the Central Locality (1017) has the highest number of clients registered with the service compared to the other localities: North 546, South 611 and East 608.

From April 2023 to the current day there has been 7254 new interactions from Central residents. 704 of them are repeat interactions covering 636 postcode areas. The table below shows a comparison from all Localities as a whole and individual Bessacarr for comparison.




Figure 23. South Yorkshire Police ASB incidents 2023

Through partnership working with South Yorkshire Police data has been provided of ASB incidents reported to the police. The Central Locality is currently the highest ASB reports for the whole of Doncaster with 604 recorded.

Vulnerable Victims

Community Investment


Over the last 3 years there has been £1.96 million of investment into the Central Locality from Public Health and partnerships. This investment has been successfully applied for by partners and VCFS (Voluntary Community and Faith Sector) groups. The top 3 areas of funding spend has gone to support Youth Activities (£327,850), Community Engagement employment (£279,718) and Mental Health (£205,747).

The top 3 areas of spending in the Town ward are: Youth Activities (£301,555), Community Engagement Worker (£189,6555) and All ages Mental Health (£130,478).

Doncaster Talks

In 2019, Doncaster Talks undertook an insight across the borough of Doncaster. Responses were separated into wards and thematically analysed. Across the town ward, there were 246 responses recorded. The main themes on what people liked about the area, what could be improved, and what the borough should focus on are displayed in the table below.

246 responses were received which equates to 1.10% of the Ward


