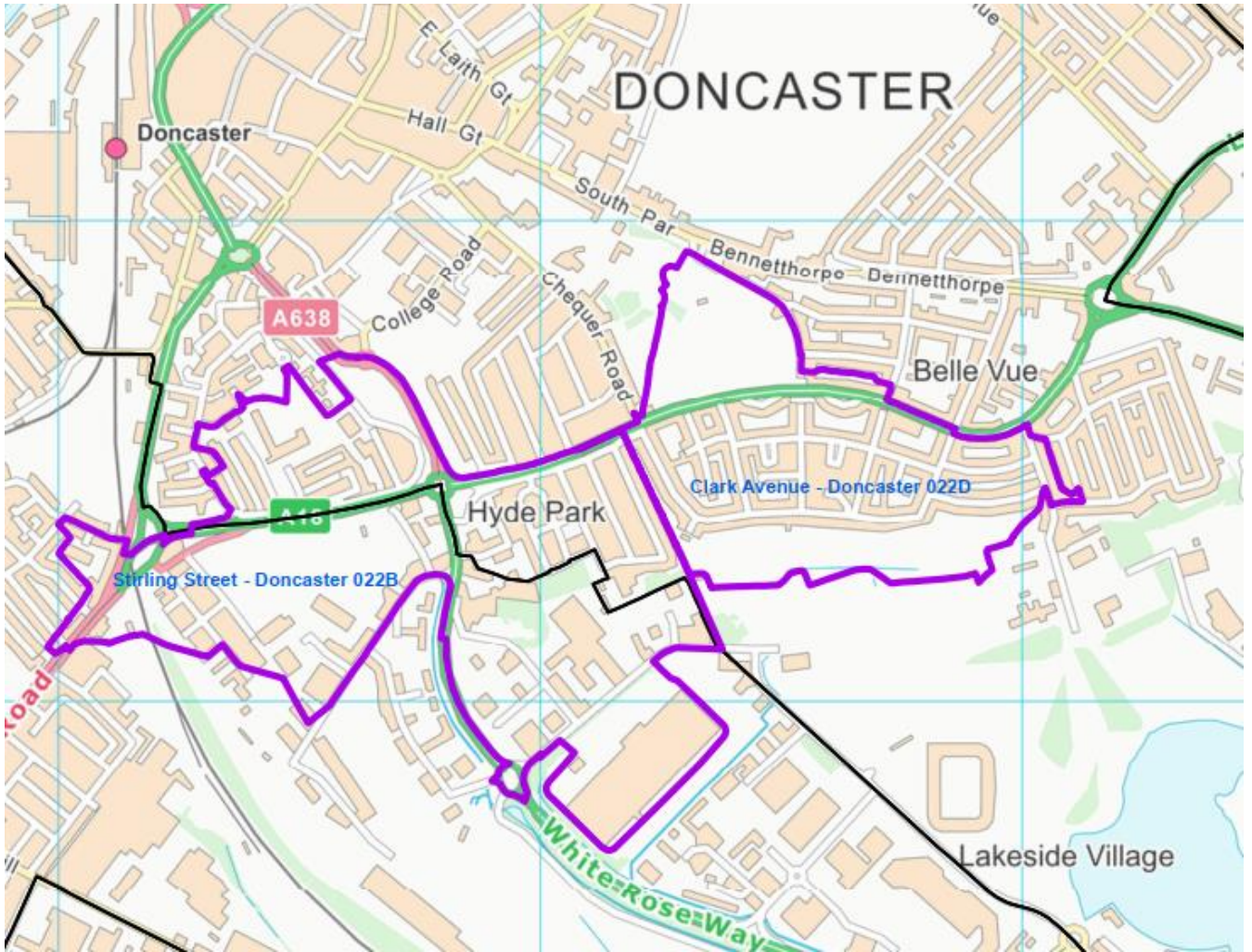

This report

This report focuses on Hyde Park which is part of the Town ward boundaries. It will focus on outlining key information and priorities for this community. The document will show the initial conversations with communities, including ward members, community organisations, faith groups, residents and other organisations who work in the area. Communities' knowledge of their own areas enables them to identify their strengths and the assets on which they can build on. This document is shared with the intention of supporting those conversations and sharing information that might not be readily available to local people.

One Page Summary

Hyde Park falls within Town ward boundaries and can be split into three LSOA (Lower Super Output Area) areas, Stirling Street, Doncaster, and Clark Avenue. According to the Census 2021 the total population is 3,200.

Hyde Park has a higher Black Asian and Ethnic Minority (BAME (Black Asian and Minority Ethnic)) population than the average of England whereas those who have identified as white make up 70.8% of residents in Hyde Park which is lower than the national baseline of 81%. There is a variety of ethnic populations residing in this area. The top five ethnicities found in Hyde Park are English, Polish, Pakistani, Slovak, and Romanian.

The age profile of Hyde Park is slightly younger than that for England, with higher proportions of children, and lower proportions of older people. There is also a lower percentage of older adults (> 65 years) when compared to the average of Doncaster and England.

Child obesity and weight management is an area of concern in Hyde Park. A high number of residents are living with long term health conditions. The main cause of deaths within the ward boundaries are coronary heart disease. A high number of residents are reported to have poorer lifestyle choices, which can increase their risk of respiratory and other diseases.

There are higher levels of unemployment in Hyde Park in comparison to the average of Doncaster and England. Long term unemployment is quite high in this community also.

Key Health priorities

- Poverty (including child poverty, fuel poverty, poverty in older people, unemployment, and long-term unemployment)
- Childhood development, including weight management.
- Life expectancy
- Preventative measures to target poor lifestyle choices (smoking cessation, alcohol consumption, dietary advice)
- Asthma and other respiratory diseases, high blood pressure, depression.



Assets

Well Doncaster use a community-centred approach which allows investment in supporting, working with, and empowering communities to facilitate a healthy community. The voice and role of our communities and taking a strengths/assets-based approach to work with individuals, families and communities is crucial to the achievement of our overall vision.

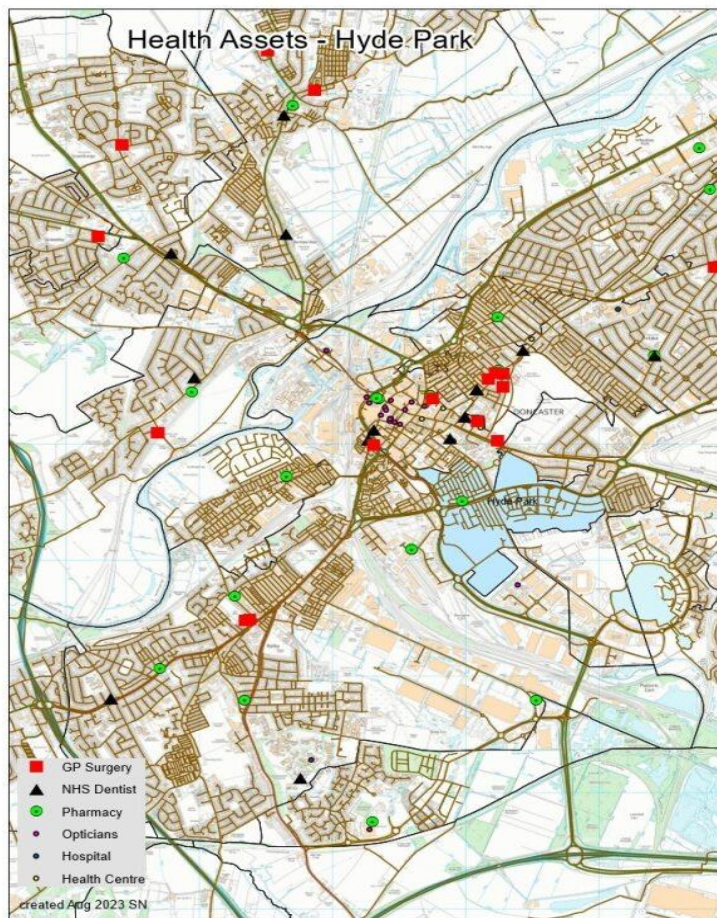


Figure 1. Hyde Park Health assets

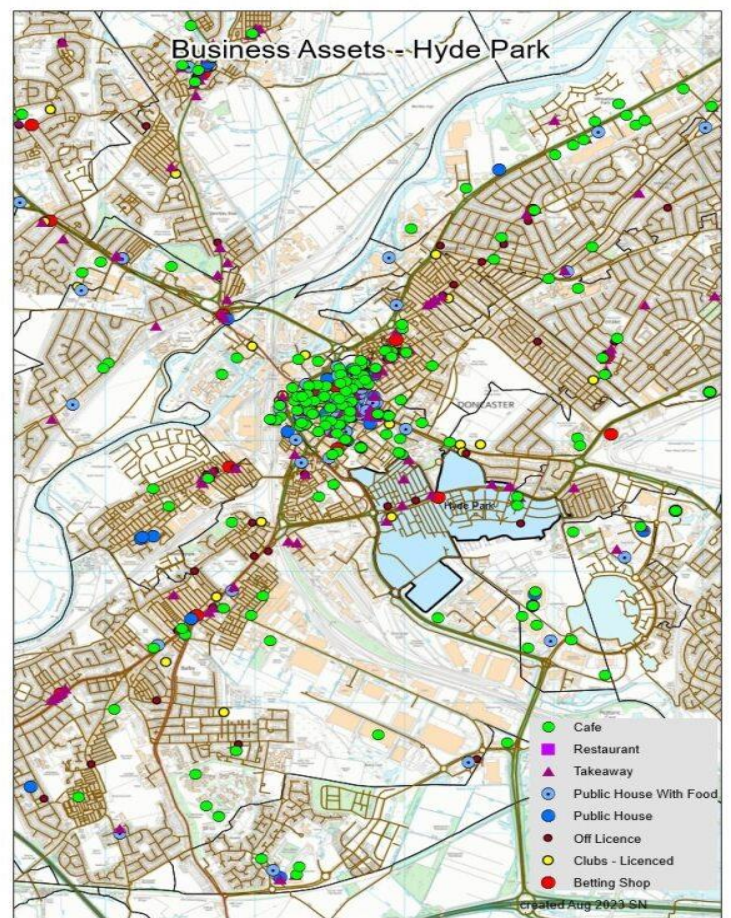


Figure 2. Hyde Park business assets

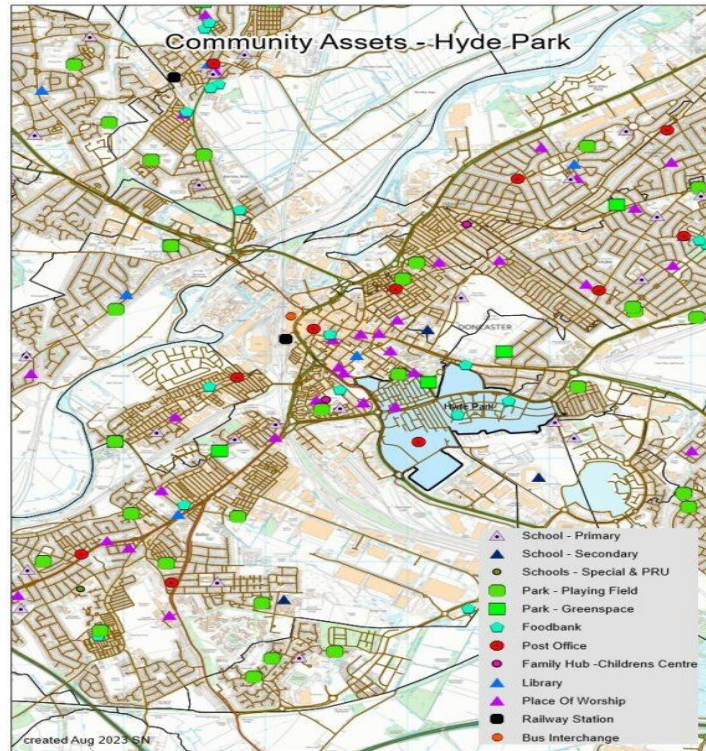


Figure 3. Hyde Park Community assets

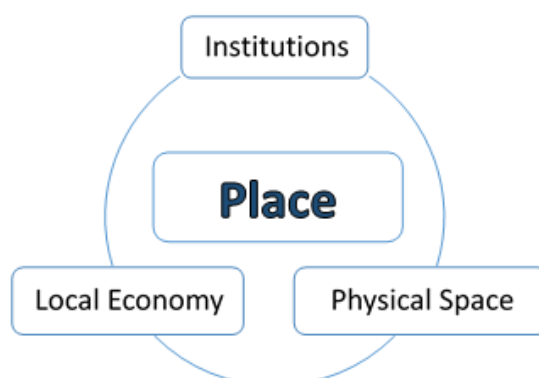

Health and Wealth

Deprivation

Health inequalities are avoidable differences across the population, and between different groups within society. Health inequalities arise from the conditions in which we live, work and play. These conditions influence our opportunities for good health, how we think, feel and act, therefore shaping our health and wellbeing.

Evidence shows that people living in our most deprived areas face the worse health inequalities in relation to health access, experiences, and outcomes. Deprivation covers a range of issues and refers to unmet needs caused by a lack of resources, including but not limited to finances, housing, and education. It is measured in different ways including the Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD). The map below illustrates the elevated levels of deprivation in Town centre.

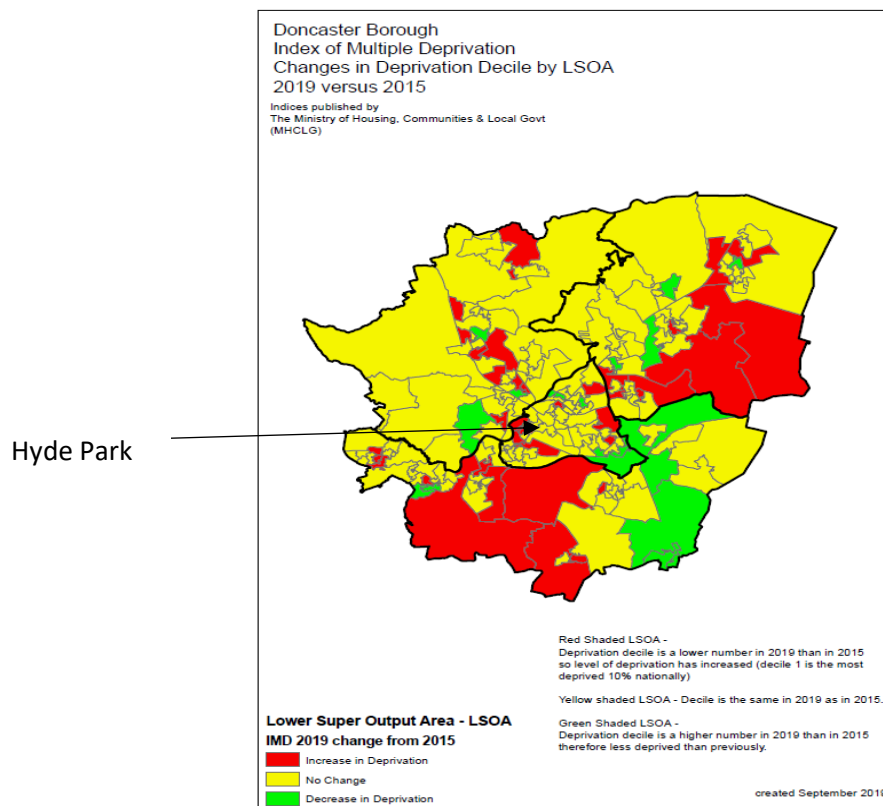


Figure 4. Doncaster Index of Multiple Deprivation, changes in deprivation between 2015-2019

Wealth Inequalities

The data provided via Public Health Fingertips shows the various levels of deprivation throughout our communities in Doncaster. Below is a table of data showing income deprivation, children affected by income deprivation, older people in poverty and those affected by fuel poverty. From the data provided Hyde Park/Town ward is a significantly higher in deprivation across all areas compared to Doncaster and England.

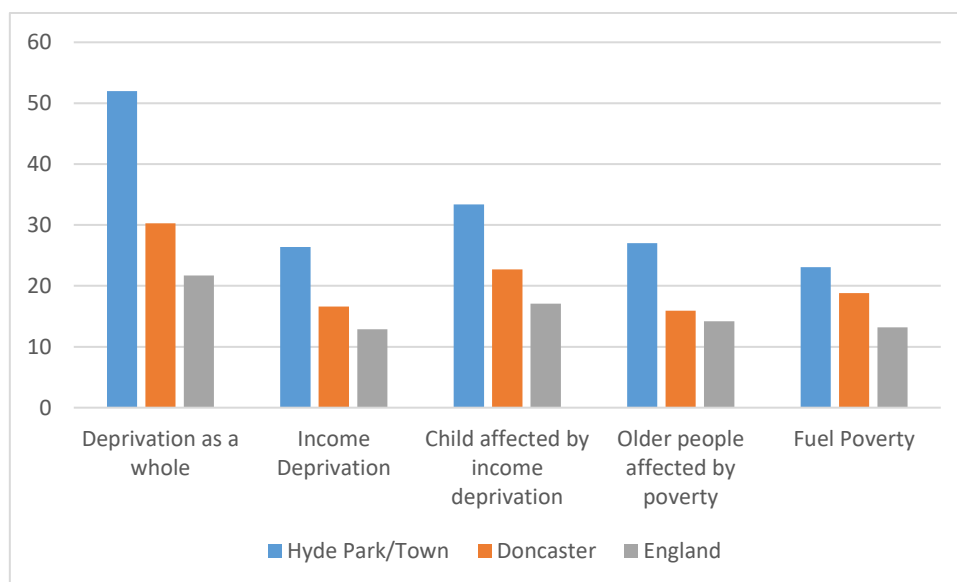


Figure 5. Indicators of Deprivation

Employment

The 2021 Census has given us new data based on the community of Hyde Park, not including the City Centre for the employment status of its residents.

56.6% of residents are currently in employment, which is only slightly lower than that of England at 57.4%. There is a considerable number (51.7%) of these residents who are employed travel less than 10km to their place of work, this is significantly higher than the national average (35.4%). Which shows there are a sizeable proportion of jobs on their doorstep. Even so, 43.8% of people within Hyde Park have not been employed in the last 12 months which is lower than the national average at 61.1%. What is shocking to see is that the Census 2021 data revealed that 40.4% of the population of Hyde Park have been recorded as Never Worked which is significantly higher than the average of 25.6%. However, it should be noted that the population of Hyde Park is a transient community where many refugees and asylum seekers have access to support.

Of those who work most people work full time (61.2%) which is similar to that of Doncaster (60.7%) and England (59.1%). Part time working is of a similar picture for Hyde Park (23.7%) which is a little higher than the Doncaster average (20.7%) and England (19.5%).

The census has also showed us the professions of residents in Hyde Park with Elementary occupations – simple and routine tasks/first skill level roles being the highest (33.7%) which is more than double that of Doncaster (16.5%) and triple that of England (10.5%).

The Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA 2022) data shows the percentages of residents claiming universal credit. In the Hyde Park/Town ward 8.88% of residents are claiming this benefit, this is the second highest percentage in the whole of Doncaster.

Food Poverty

There are 8 active foodbanks in the Central locality of Doncaster. On average in quarter 2 (Jul – Sept 23) 311 adults and 127 children per month who were supported by Central Foodbanks.

There is not one directly situated in Hyde Park, but all foodbanks can be sourced from the residents in this community. On average 514 people receive a food parcel from the foodbanks in this locality per month.

Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough

The data provided by Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough shows us that the Central Locality (1017) has the highest number of clients registered with the service compared to the other localities: North 546, South 611, and East 608.

From April 2023 to the current day there has been 7254 new interactions from Central residents. 704 of them are repeat interactions covering 636 postcode areas. The table below shows a comparison from all Localities to the Hyde Park

Childhood Development

The number of children with low birth weight remains high in Town Centre. Around 9.3% of babies born after 37 weeks are classified as weighing less than 5.5 lbs or 2.5 kg compared to only 6.9% in England. Hyde Park/Town ward (2.6) has the second highest rate of teenage pregnancies compared to Doncaster (1.1) and England (0.7).

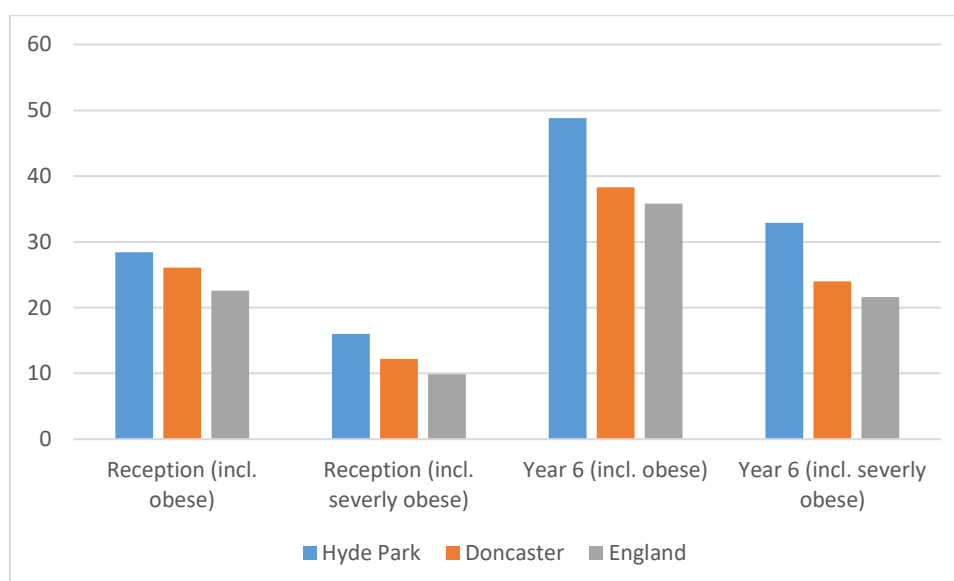


Figure 7. Average levels of overweight and obese children in reception and year 6 across 2019/20 – 21/22

Healthy development milestones from early to middle childhood, continue to be an area of concern in Hyde Park/Town wards. The prevalence of children classified as overweight (including obese) in reception is greater in Hyde Park/Town ward (28.4%) compared to the average of Doncaster (26.1%) and England (22.6%). This trend continues into year 6, where increasing numbers of children are reported to be obese 48.8% or severely obese (32.9%) (Figure 7).

During adolescence and young adulthood, hospital admissions amongst individuals aged 15-24 years of age are the 6th highest in Hyde Park/Town ward (211.8 people per 10,000) compared to the average of Doncaster (161.66 people per 10,000).

Furthermore, the general fertility rate, which is live births per 100.0 women aged 15-44 (66.1) is higher than Doncaster (62.4) and England (59.2) and low birth weight babies (4.2%) is lower than Doncaster (7.8%) and England (6.8%).

In the 2022 Pupil Lifestyle Survey saw 16% reported having a long-standing illness higher than Doncaster (15%) and 6% reported having a disability which is in line with the rest of Doncaster.

When asked about healthy eating and wellbeing, 95% report having breakfast and 58% having school dinners, this is in line with Doncaster. There is a lower proportion of children accessing free school meals with 18% which is in line with Doncaster at 16%.

96% reported feeling warm and comfortable at home, 81% feel able to clean themselves at home and 72% reported having a restful night's sleep. These are all in line with Doncaster. 82% of children stated that they felt safe at home (Doncaster 88%) and 76% of children have a nice safe place at home or near home to play.

School Attainment

The Department for Education supplies each local authority with the school attainment grades for those in KS2 and KS4.

At KS4, each pupil is given an Attainment 8 score (a score out of 90) based on their 8 best GCSE grades including English, maths and at least 3 other traditional academic GCSEs (sciences, languages, and humanities). Other qualifications at an equivalent level (e.g. BTECs) can also count towards the score. In 2019, average GCSE attainment 8 score per pupil (out of 90) was 41 in Hyde Park, this is lower than both Doncaster overall (44) and nationally (46.7). In 2022 the results are lower at an average of 37.2 for Hyde Park, Doncaster at 45.2 and nationally at 48.8.

In 2023 for KS2, 32% of pupils achieved the expected standard in reading, writing, and mathematics in Hyde Park, a small rise of 3% since 2022. This is extremely low compared to Doncaster as a whole (55%) and the national percentage of 60%.

Seven children have been recorded as receiving Elective Home Education and sixteen recorded as missing education in Hyde Park (City of Doncaster Council, 2023).

Health Inequalities

Long-Term Health Conditions

The proportion of residents with poor health in Hyde Park is considerably greater than the average of England. Over 25.3% of residents reported having poor general health compared to an average of 17.6% across England. Many engage in poor lifestyle choices, including smoking (25.4%), increased alcohol consumption (15.3%), and a lack of fruit intake (12%). Further, 8% of those smoking reported to smoke 20+ cigarettes a day. Not sure where to get information from

Incidences of asthma are 13.8% more likely to occur in Hyde Park than the baseline average. Nearly a quarter (20.0%) of the population have high blood pressure and over a third are classified as obese (34.2%).

In the 2021 Census 15.1% of Hyde Park reported having a disability under the Equity Act which is slightly lower than Doncaster (20.3%) and slightly lower than England (17.3%). Emergency hospital admissions from residents living in Hyde Park for life limiting health illness are higher than England. COPD (Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease) has the highest value of 190.8 per 100 compared to England at 100 per 100, followed by coronary heart disease 156.2 per 100 compared to England at 100 per 100. There are significantly high rates of all Cancers, 132.3 per 100 compared to England 100 per 100. Hospital admissions for harm and injury is also significantly higher with alcohol attributable conditions at 143.9 per 100 compared to England at 100 per 100.

Alcohol

The data supplied by Public Health Fingertips data shows that Hyde Park/Town ward is the 7th highest population of Doncaster with hospital admissions of alcohol attributable conditions (broad definition)

Hyde Park/Town ward has a rate of 132.1 compared to Doncaster at 112.7 and is significantly higher than England at 100.0.

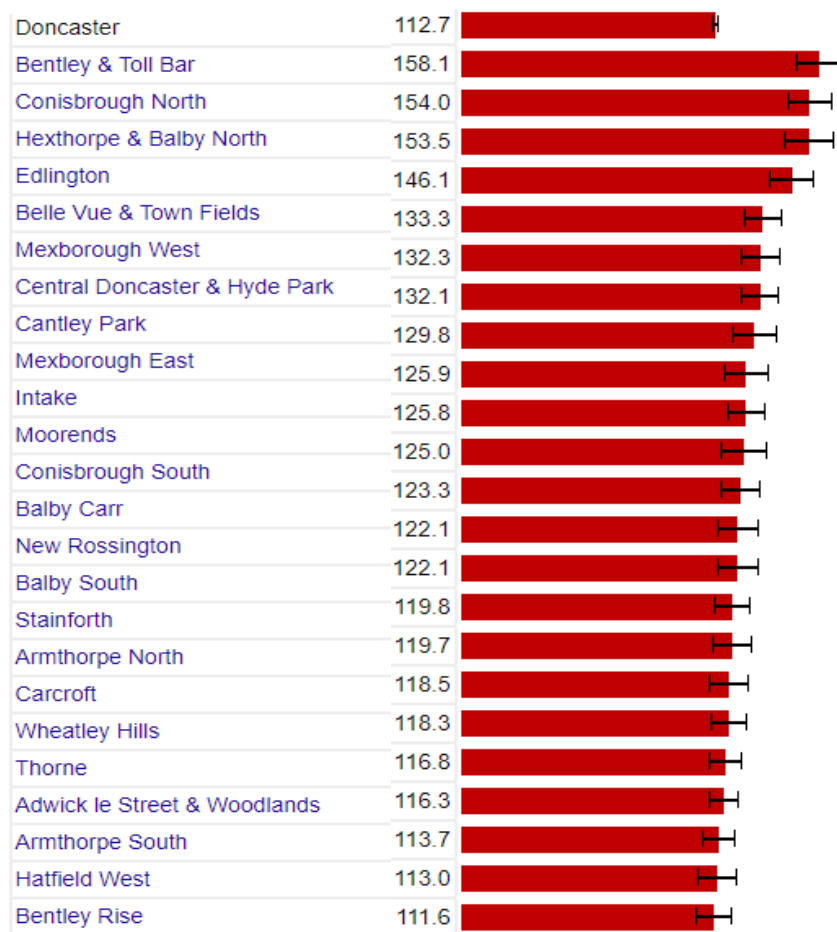


Figure 8. Hospital admission attributed to Alcohol in Doncaster

Smoking

In Doncaster we have 37 GPs, of which they provide data for their patients who when registered, register as a smoker. Doncaster has 274,681 patients registered aged 15+ of this 49,332 are down as being a smoker (17.96%). Doncaster has the highest percentage of registered smoked compared to our surrounding boroughs Rotherham (16.48%), Barnsley (17.11%), Sheffield (13.92%) and Other (14.46%).

From the data provided by NHS England 16 GPs serve the Central Locality based in communities throughout. The table below shows the number of patients registered to Central GP surgeries, registered as a smoker.

The table shows that Hyde Park does not have its own GP surgery, therefore for those registered with a GP would most likely be registered to one in a nearby community.

City Centre has the highest amount, 3 out of the top 5 number of smokers in Doncaster.

*Data provided shows a patient registered, they may not live in the locality of the GP surgery.

Causes of Deaths

The leading causes of death within Hyde Park and ward boundaries are coronary heart disease (200 per 100,000). As a borough, however, Doncaster (121.8 per 100,000) shows a higher average number of deaths caused by coronary heart disease than the national average (100 per 100,000). A considerable number of deaths are deemed preventable, suggesting work on measures to target healthy lifestyle choices may have an impact on these figures.

Deaths rates from all causes and all ages across Hyde Park (123.5) are greater than those of for England (100). Hyde Park has one of the highest rates of deaths in under 75s across Doncaster (155.6 per 100), majority of which are considered preventable (206.3 per 100).

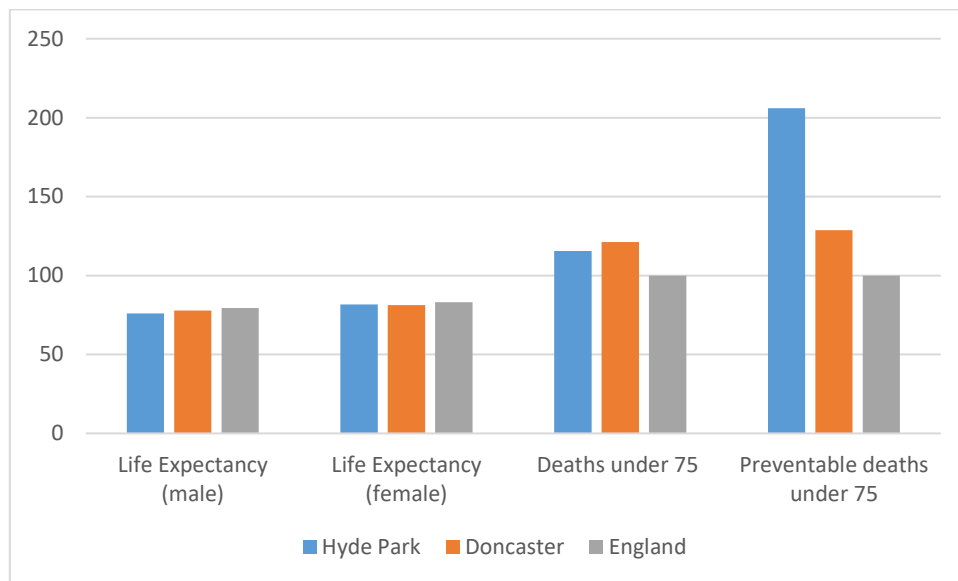


Figure 9. Life expectancy and under 75 death rate 2019/20 – 21/22

Loneliness and isolation

One-person households (none-pensioner) make up 32.8% of residents, whilst there is a higher percentage (58.5%) of households containing lone parents in Hyde Park. Whilst this does not report direct feelings of isolation, the data discussed along with 14.9% of the population not feeling general happiness and 10.5% not feeling a sense of worth, it may well be lonely and isolated individuals feeling this. Further data and discussion are needed. Data shows that just under 10% of the population is living with clinical depression, whilst 9% reported feeling down or depressed in the week before data was collected. Given these trends and Doncaster reporting the lowest scores for well-being nationally, mental wellbeing should be a focus for future support.

Physical Activity

Mosaic data shows a small percentage of the population in Hyde Park/Town Centre does not engage in any moderate intensity physical activity. Please see [appendix](#) for more information on mosaic data. This falls in line with Acorn data which shows 19% of Hyde Park/Town Centre residents have reported never engaging in moderate intensity physical activity. 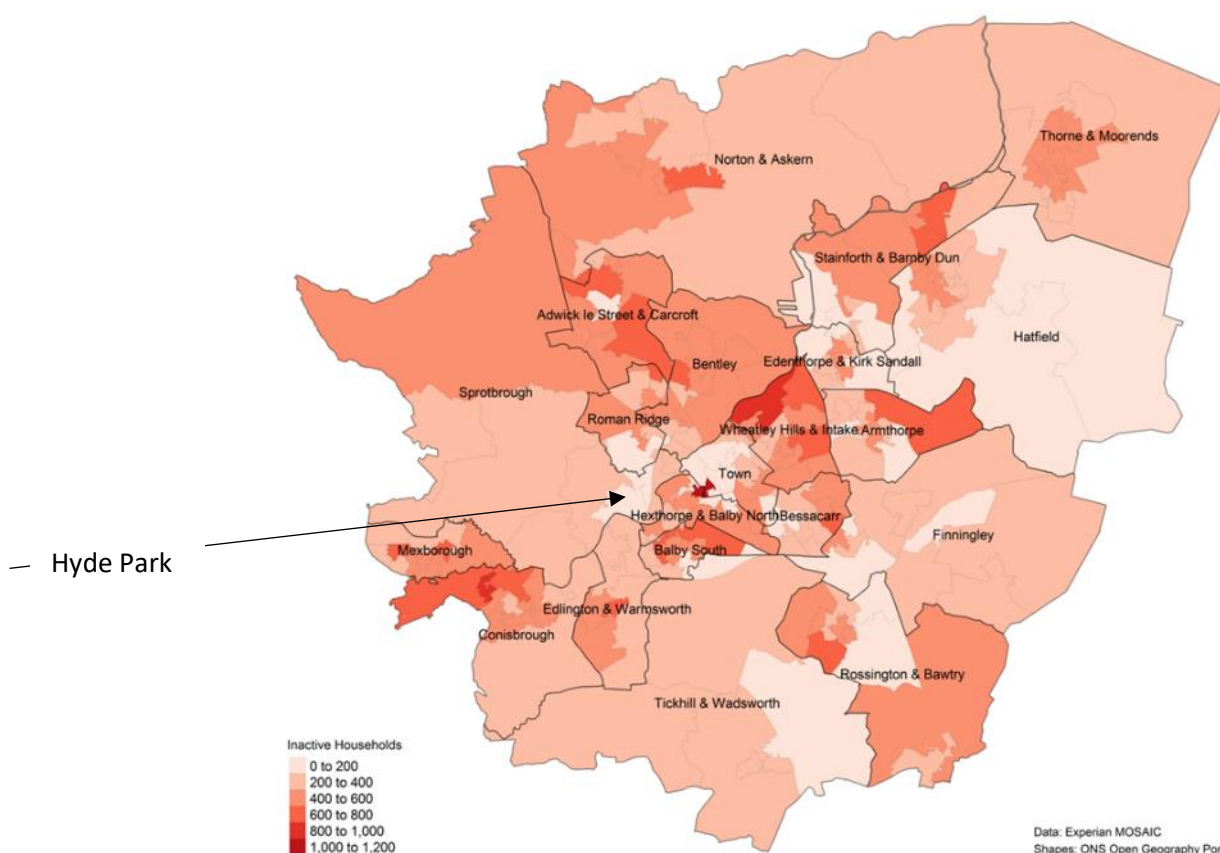


Figure 10. Levels of inactivity within households across Doncaster

Data from the Pupil Lifestyle Survey (2022) reports an average of 36% of children are physically active on only one or two days a week, whilst 23% were said to be active on three of four days and 33% on five days or more occasions during the week. Getting hot, tired and not being particularly good at physical activity were the two residing answers given by pupils when asked why they did not participate in physical activity. The main reason children do not take part in physical activity is that they get too hot and tired (38%) followed by that they don't like being outdoors in bad weather (33%) and they prefer to

do other things (33%), they also don't like being competitive (29%), to not being very good at it (24%). The last reasons for inactivity are feeling shy about their body (19%) and having to change into different clothes (19%).

Green Spaces/Parks

Situated in Hyde Park is a large green space - Elmfield Park, the community have access to playing fields, picnic areas, tennis courts, table tennis and football pitches. There is also a bowling green, walking routes and a sculpture/memorial. Elmfield Park is currently on the list of 'Doncaster Future Parks,' which is run by Get Doncaster Moving, CDC (City of Doncaster Council). Between 2021 -25 multiple green spaces/parks in Doncaster will undergo improvements so more people can enjoy beautiful green spaces and access them more often. Partnership working throughout CDC and using community insight and local Friends of Groups will see these changes shape what the community wants.

Population Health Management

Covid-19 has had a significant impact on communities. It is vital to understand the effect and direction the pandemic has had on community organisation in the ward so that: 1) support can be offered and 2) work can be implemented to manage any gaps or risks associated with changes. To support the former, Well Doncaster officers undertake regular population health management insight with community organisations in Town Centre (including Hyde Park) identifying their current status and needs, and work with each group to meet their goals. Community Information

Population and Diversity

Hyde Park has a higher BAME population than the average of Doncaster and is not higher than the national average. There is a sizeable Asian and African resident population in this ward.

Population size

4000 people live in Hyde Park

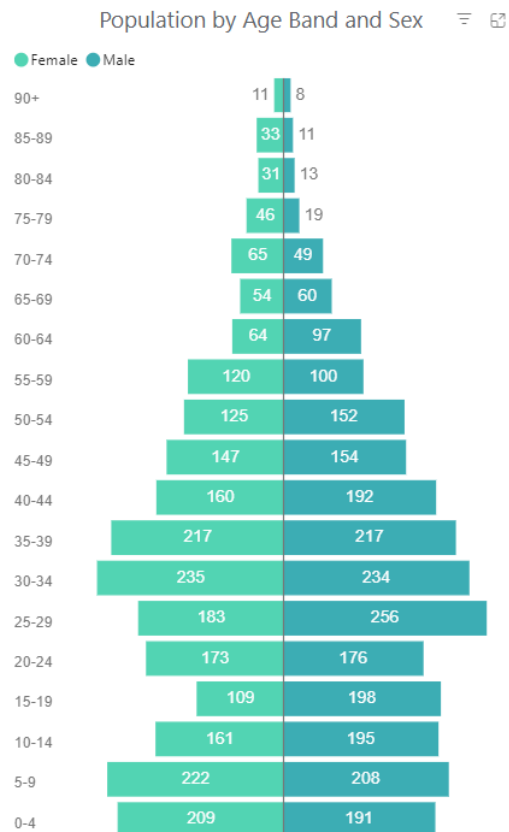


Figure 11. Age profiles of Hyde Park Community

With this larger than average BAME population in Hyde Park the main language spoken is English at 68.7% but comparing this to the national average at 90.8% this is significantly lower.

Housing

The 2021 Census data has produced estimates that classify households in England and Wales by four dimensions of deprivation: employment, education, health and disability and household overcrowding. Hyde Park has a lower proportion of households not in any deprived dimensions (34.2%) compared to Doncaster (43.7%) and England (48.4%). It also has higher proportion of households in all other dimensions: one dimension: Hyde Park (39.2%,) compared to Doncaster (34.7%) and England (33.5%). Two dimensions; Hyde Park (19.4%) Doncaster (16.7%), England (14.2%). Three dimensions; Hyde Park (6.8%) Doncaster (4.6%) and England (3.7%) and four dimensions: Hyde Park (0.4%), Doncaster (0.2%) and England (0.2%).

Terraced houses make up a substantial proportion (53%) of the property ladder in Hyde Park, whilst semi-detached amount to 32%. Flats make up just 12% of the properties on offer. Of these houses, 67.1% of have two or more people residing in them, suggesting that a high number of inter-generational families live within the area.

Hyde Park has a significantly lower number of people who own their property outright compared to Doncaster overall and England. Most tenants privately rent their properties (34.7%), followed by social rented (25%) closely followed by those who have a mortgage/loan (22.2%) with a small number of residents owning their property outright (18.1%).

St Leger Homes is the main provider of Doncaster's of Social Housing. St Leger homes own 243 properties in Hyde Park and this comprises of 1 bed bungalow (10), 1 bed flat (8), 2 bed houses (29), 3 bed houses (196), and homeless family properties (3).

The majority of the social housing renters are aged between 46-65 years old and 26-45 years old.

St Leger homes also has a large outstanding amount of rent arrears from those living in the City Centre, 2021/2022 the amount owed is £31,173 and for 2022/2023 the amount is £37,723.

Stronger Families

Crime/ASB

Data provided by City of Doncaster Council Community Safety team shows that the number of Anti-Social behaviour, early intervention, hate crimes and low-level crime in the Central locality is the second highest for Doncaster.

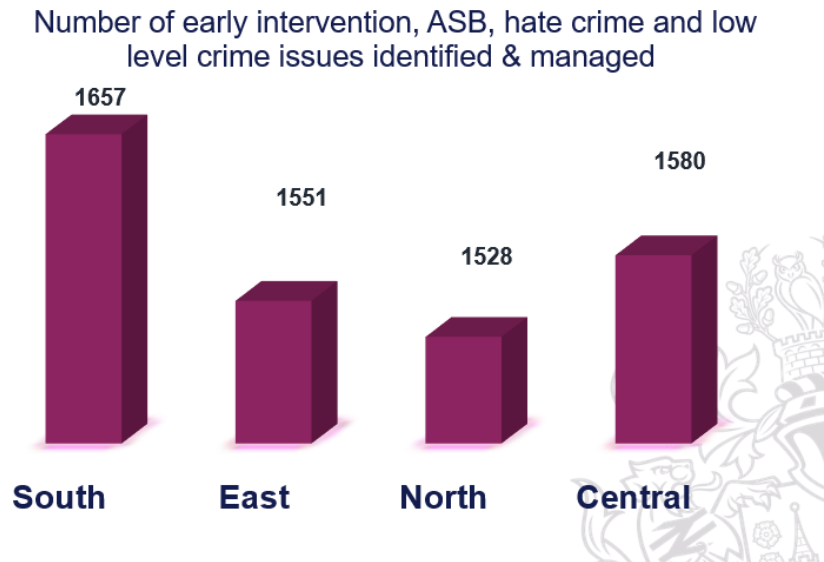


Figure 12. Number of early interventions, ASB, hate crime and low-level crime issues identified & managed.

Upon further breakdown the data shows that from 1580 incidents/report 458 are recorded as being in the City Ward including Hyde Park.

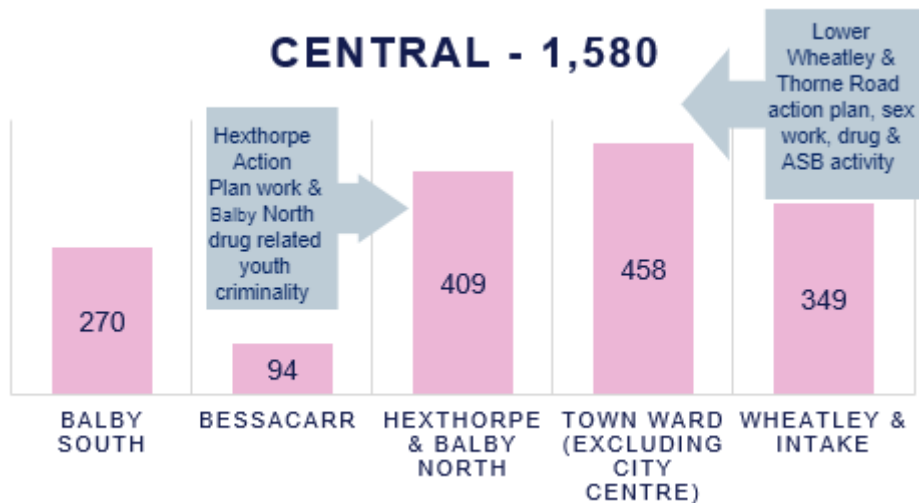


Figure 13. Further breakdown of figure 13

Through partnership working with South Yorkshire Police data has been provided of ASB (Anti-Social Behaviour) incidents reported to the police. The Central Locality currently has the highest ASB reports with 604 recorded.

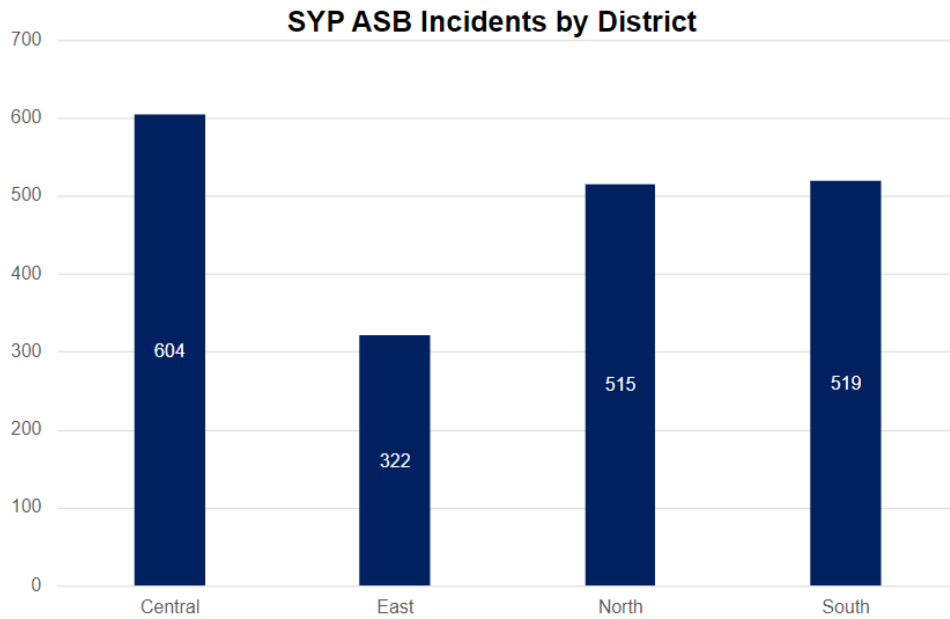


Figure 14. SYP crime reporting in partnership with CDC

Vulnerable Victims

The number of vulnerable victims for each Locality is also recorded from the table below you can see that Central is again the second highest area of Doncaster. East Locality (82) has double that of Central (41) but likewise Central has more than double of the North Locality (22).

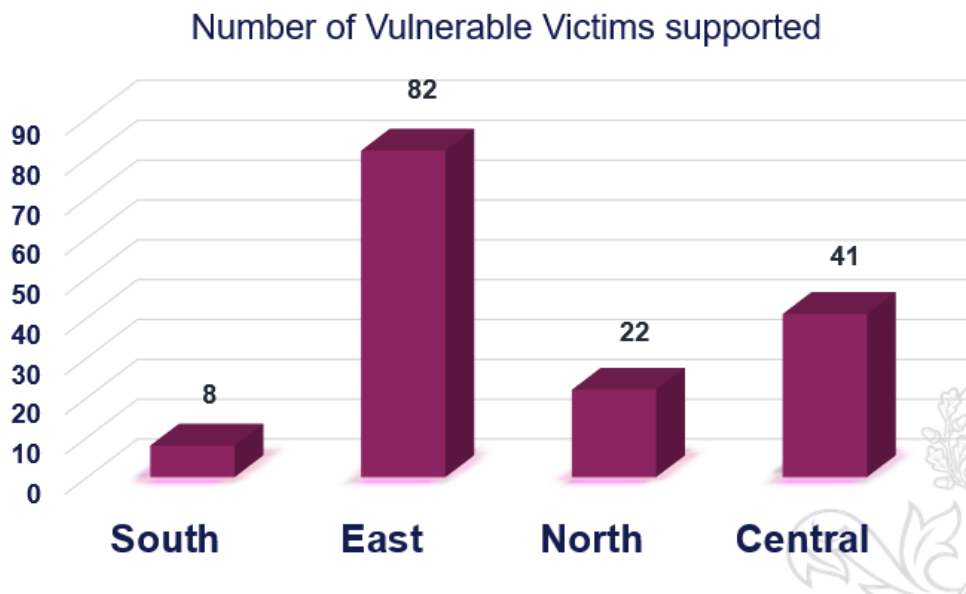


Figure 15. Number of Vulnerable victims supported.

Of the 41 vulnerable residents recorded in Central Doncaster, 3 of them are based in the City Centre ward.

Wellbeing service

This is one of the services run by CDC Stronger Communities team, the service covers helping residents with financial support, physical health, housing, mental health and social isolation.

Community Insight

Appreciative Inquiry

The Well Doncaster Team undertake Appreciative Inquiry (AI) within communities to gather insight to support co-designing action plans with the community. Armstrong (2020) suggests in his work 'A changing world, again. How Appreciative Inquiry can guide our growth' that reframing the questions considering a crisis like Covid-19 and drawing on strengths and assets from past positive experience will help participants as they restructure their community. The AI questions are structured to pull on the successes of the past and present, to seek new potentials and possibilities and to build on those through the Dream and Design stages.

The Appreciative Inquiry will include the following steps:

1. **Discovery Phase** – This will involve engagement with the residents of Hyde Park to find out what is working well in the community. Responses will be themed to allow priorities of the community to be established.
2. **Dream** – Residents and key stakeholders will be invited to attend an initial workshop to discuss what ideas they have for their community and how these will meet the priorities highlighted in the discovery phase.
3. **Design** – All attendees are invited back for a second workshop to develop an action plan to direct work for the community.
4. **Destiny** – A collaborative way of working and investing resources to meet the actions from the previous phase.

The Well Doncaster has conducted community conversations in the community since 2021. Insight has undergone a thematic analysis and the three themes, and their sub-themes have emerged.

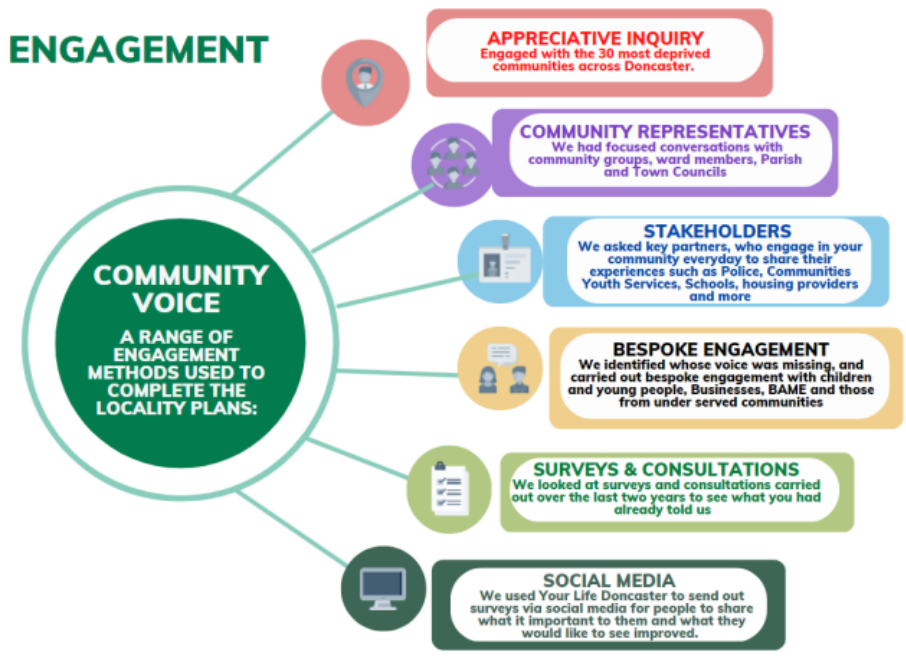


Figure 16. Community Voice engagement methods

Community Investment

Over the last 3 years there has been £2.42 million of investment into the Central Locality from Public Health and partnerships. This investment has been successfully applied for by partners and VCFS (Voluntary Community and Faith Sector) groups. The top 3 areas of funding spend has gone to support Youth Activities (£348,604), Community Engagement employment (£287,915) and Mental Health (£234,312).

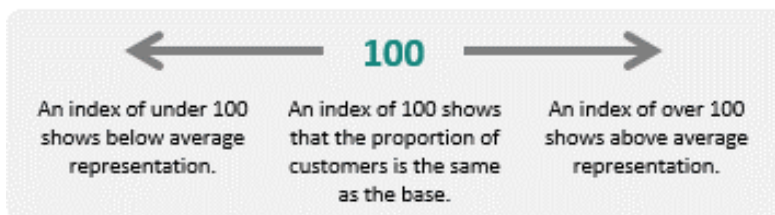

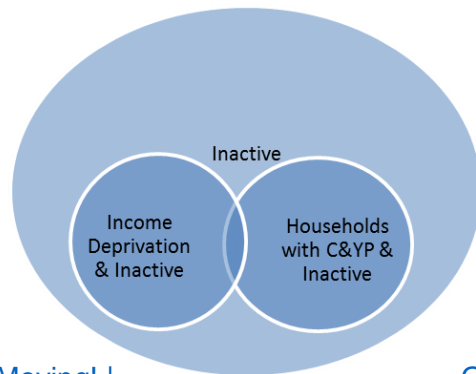

The Physically Inactive Population of Doncaster

The MOSAIC types who “Do not exercise” and “Do not take part in Sport” were searched and three priority groups have been identified through work with strategic partners as part of the development of Doncaster’s Physical Activity Strategy. The three priority groups are:

- The Inactive
- Families with children and young people
- People living in income deprivation

These groups are cross-referenced against the inactivity list allowing for the identification of MOSAIC types which are both likely to be inactive and living in deprivation as well as inactive and from households with children and young people.
