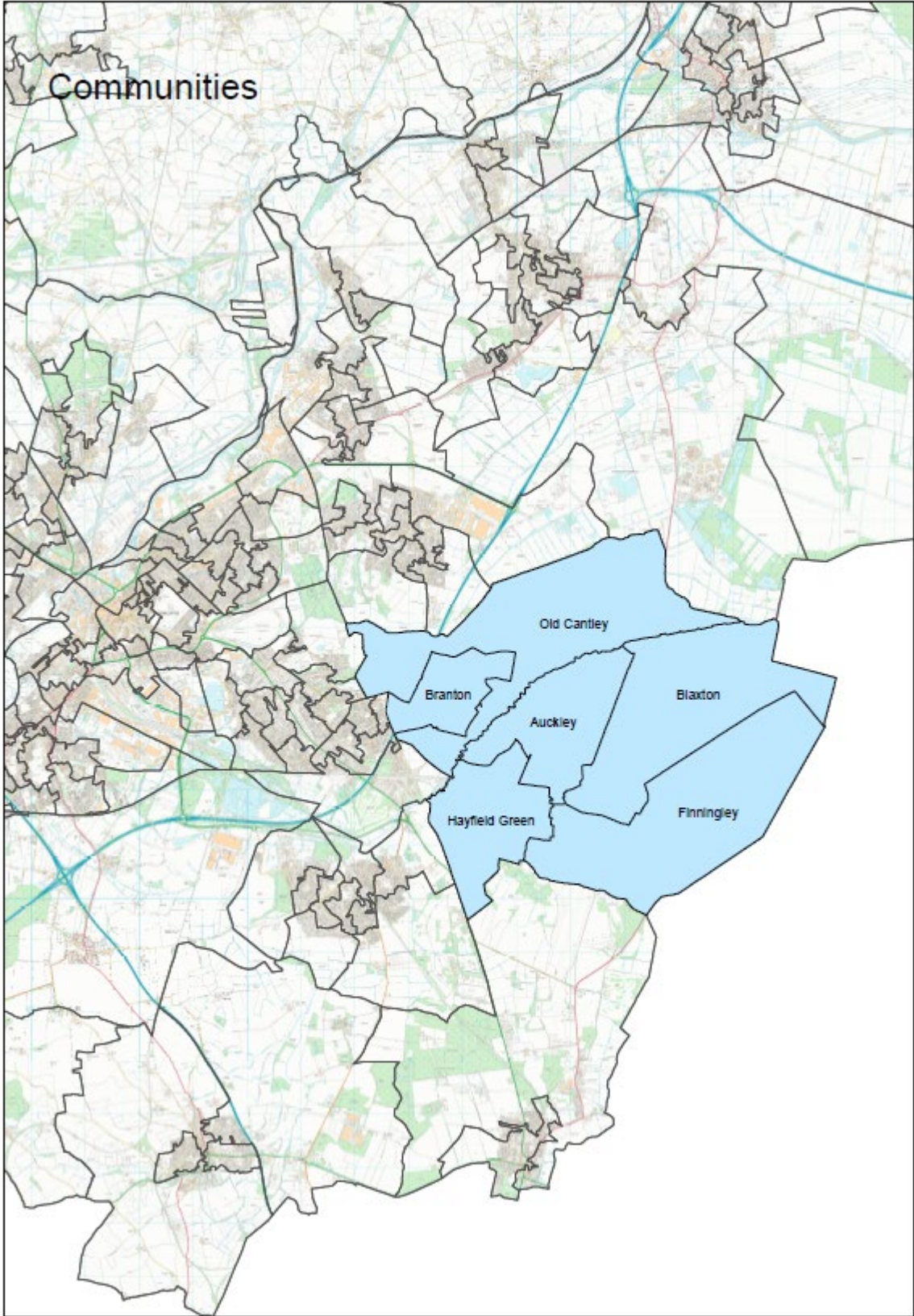

This Report

This report focuses on Finningley ward in the South of the City of Doncaster and consists of six smaller communities as LSOA level: Hayfield green, Blaxton, Old Cantley, Branton, Finningley and Auckley. The report begins with a one-page summary outlining key information and priorities about the Finningley ward. The document builds on the initial community profile of 2021 and updated figures have been included where possible. This report shows the initial conversations with communities, including ward members, community organisations, faith groups, residents and other organisations who work in the area. Communities' knowledge of their own areas enables them to identify their strengths and the assets on which they can build on. This document is shared with the intention of supporting those conversations and sharing information that might not be readily available to local people.

One page Summary

Located in the South of Doncaster the Finningley Ward exhibits signs of affluence based on the data analysed. The ward consists of the 7 communities included within this report including Hayfield Green, Blaxton, Old Cantley, Branton, Finningley and Auckley. Most people living in the Finningley ward were born in the UK 96.5%, and 92.5% report themselves to be white. Data shows that people living in the Finningley Ward are an ageing population with 26.1% of the population aged over 65.

The wards residents experience a higher socio-economic status, which is associated with better access to healthcare resources and healthier living conditions. This is reflected by data showing only 2.9% of the working age population is unemployed in comparison to the Doncaster rate of 6.1%. The majority of those are in full time employment, and a significantly higher percentage of those are in senior and management roles 15.5% in comparison to the Doncaster rate of 10.2%.

Most homes in the Finningley Ward are owned outright 42.3% higher than the average for England at 32.5%. A further 39.9% owns their home with a mortgage, or loan or shared ownership compared to England with 29.8%. Only 6.4% of housing is Social Rented compared to an average of 17.1% for England; and 11.4% live in private rental properties compared to 20.6% as an average for England.

The Finningley Ward Index of Multiple Deprivation is 11.1 which is significantly lower than Doncaster as a whole (30.3) and England (21.7) and is the lowest in the City indicating it is the most affluent ward. There is a pocket of deprivation in Hayfield Green

Most residents living in the Finningley Ward report to have very good health. Life expectancy for both males and females is higher amongst Finningley residents, than the rest of Doncaster. The leading cause of death is Colorectal Cancer and there is high smoking prevalence in those aged 15 years of age.

For subsequent sections of this report, we have opted to combine Old Cantley with Branton and Auckley with Hayfield Green. This decision is driven by the availability and nature of the data. When examining the data at the Ward level, it's important to note that part of Bessacarr and Cantley is encompassed within the dataset, but they are not individually identified as communities within the ward. To make an accurate comparison, more information is needed on specific ward boundaries.

Areas in Hayfield Green exhibit indicators of deprivation when compared to the rest of the community, and are illustrated in the figures below. A high percentage of properties around Elm Road, Pane Tree Way & Cypress Avenue area of Hayfield Green are deprived in 3 dimensions, shown in Figure 13. 86.6% are socially rented and a significantly high number of people are economically inactive due to looking after the home or family, illustrated in Figure 14, a further 12.8% of people in this area are also economically inactive due to long term sickness or disability. Furthermore 6.7% of houses experience overcrowding. All three figures are highest in the Finningley Ward.

A high number of residents around New Street and Blue Bell Street in Blaxton experience deprivation in two dimensions illustrated in Figure 16, 19.6% of residents in this area also have no qualifications. Both figures are high when compared to the rest of the community and ward but are not significantly high compared to Doncaster.

Key Health Priorities

- High incidences of Colorectal Cancer (120.4 per 100.0) and is the seventh highest area in the city, this reflects the higher age of the population.
- Rates of Smoking are low in comparison to Doncaster and the rest of England, however there is a higher rate of regular smokers aged 15 (10%) in comparison to Doncaster and the rest of England.
- A lower percentage of children from the Finningley ward reported that they visited a Dentist in the last 12 months in comparison with Doncaster

Assets

Well Doncaster use a community centred approach which allows investment in supporting, working with, and empowering communities to facilitate a healthy community. The voice and role of our communities and taking a strength/assets-based approach to work with individuals, families and communities is crucial to the achievement our overall vision. It is recognised that work is needed in the community to expand the understanding of who, how and what is accessed in the area. Greater knowledge of the identity of each community/ward will allow a more appropriate and effective response to community needs.

Asset Maps

The maps below illustrate the different types of assets found in Finningley ward. Maps have been split to show Business, Community, and Health assets separately. It should be noted that these maps are a starting point in understanding the community and that further work is needed amongst the community to understand all the assets and how they are used.

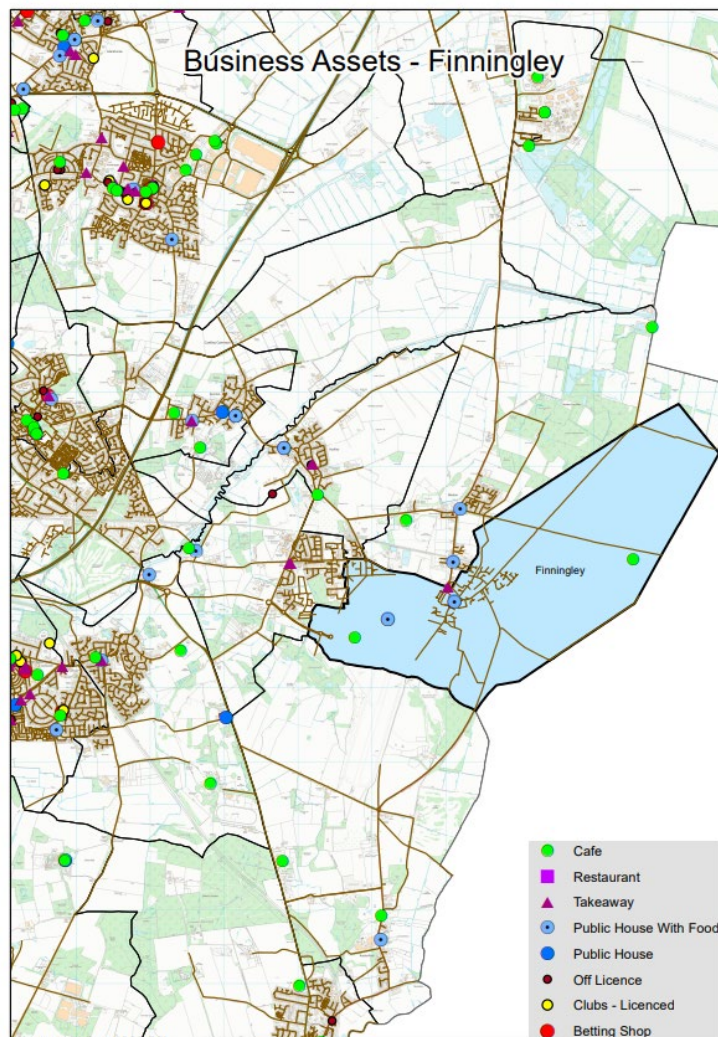


Figure 1 Finningley Business Assets

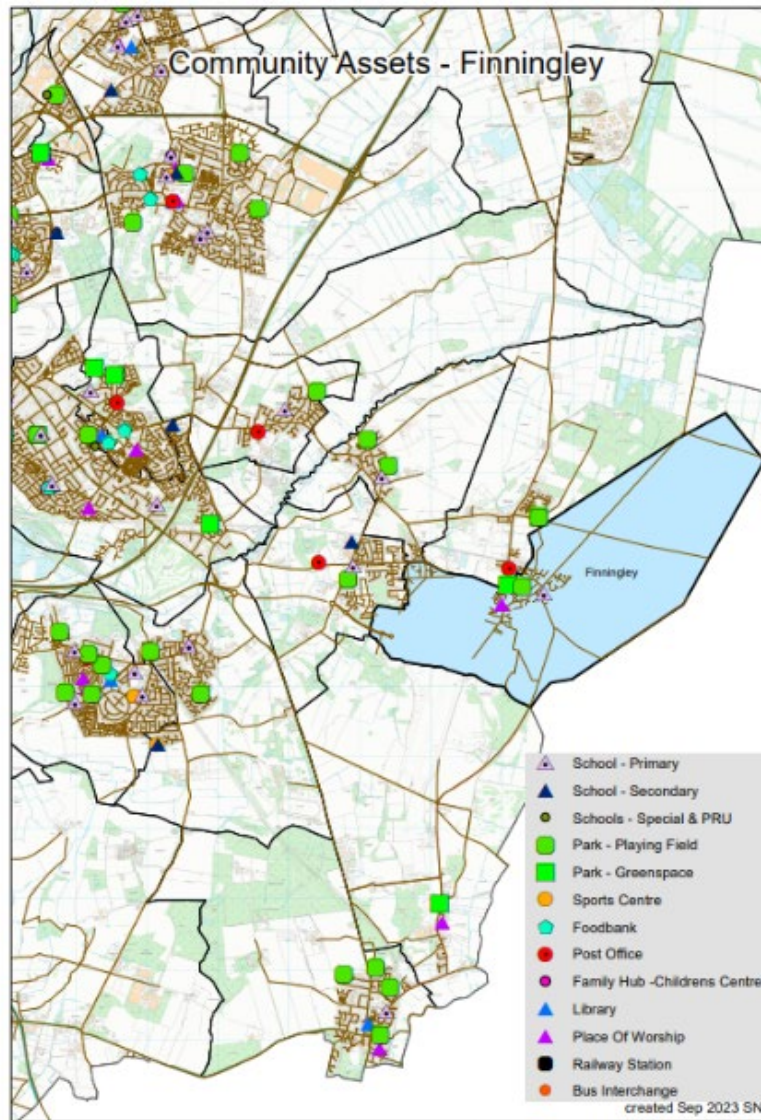


Figure 2. Community assets in Finningley ward

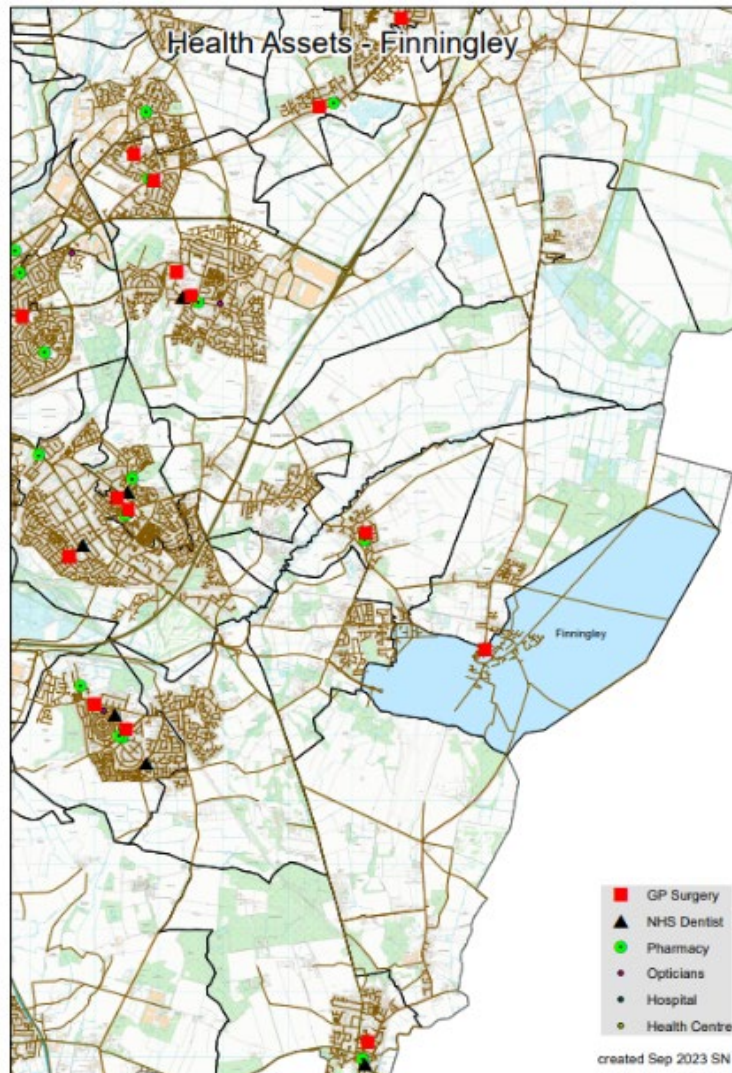


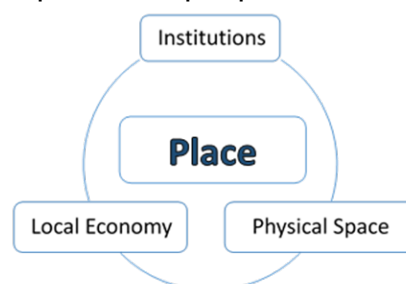
Figure 3. Health Assets in Finningley ward

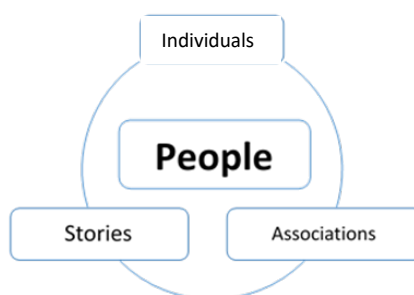

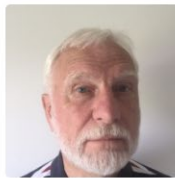

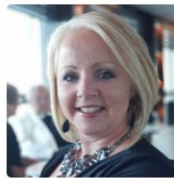

Health and Wealth

Health inequalities are avoidable differences across the population, and between different groups within society. Health inequalities arise from the conditions in which we live, work and play. These conditions influence our opportunities for good health, how we think, feel and act, therefore shaping our health and wellbeing.

Deprivation

Evidence shows that people living in our most deprived areas face the worse health inequalities in relation to health access, experiences, and outcomes. Deprivation covers a range of issues and refers to unmet needs caused by a lack of resources, including but not limited to finances, housing, and education. It is measured in different ways including the Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD).

The Finningley Ward IMD score is 11.1 which is significantly the lower than Doncaster (30.3) and England (21.7) and is lowest in the borough indicating it is the most affluent ward.

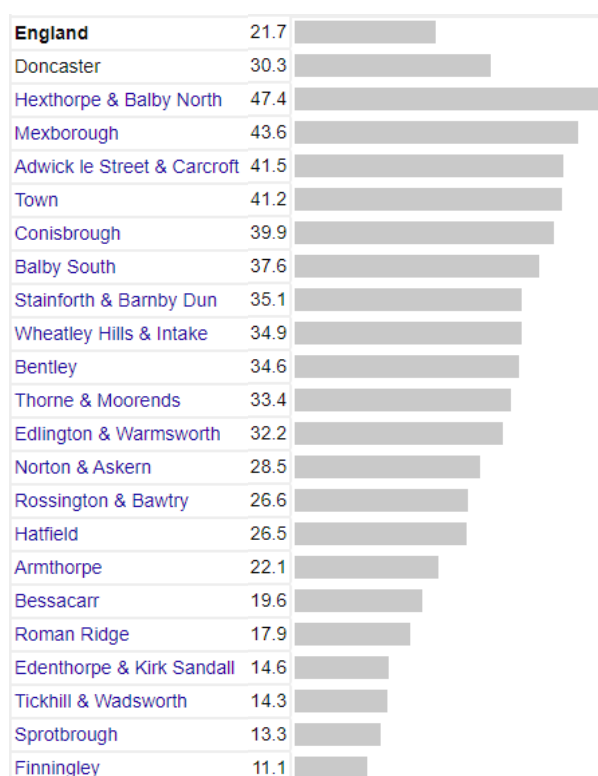


Figure 4 Indices of Multiple Deprivation

When looking at the Public Health Fingertips data the Finningley Ward scores better than Doncaster and England on a number of indicators of deprivation including those impacted by income deprivation, including children, older people in poverty, those impacted by fuel poverty, households experiencing overcrowding and those aged over 65 who live alone and is illustrated below.

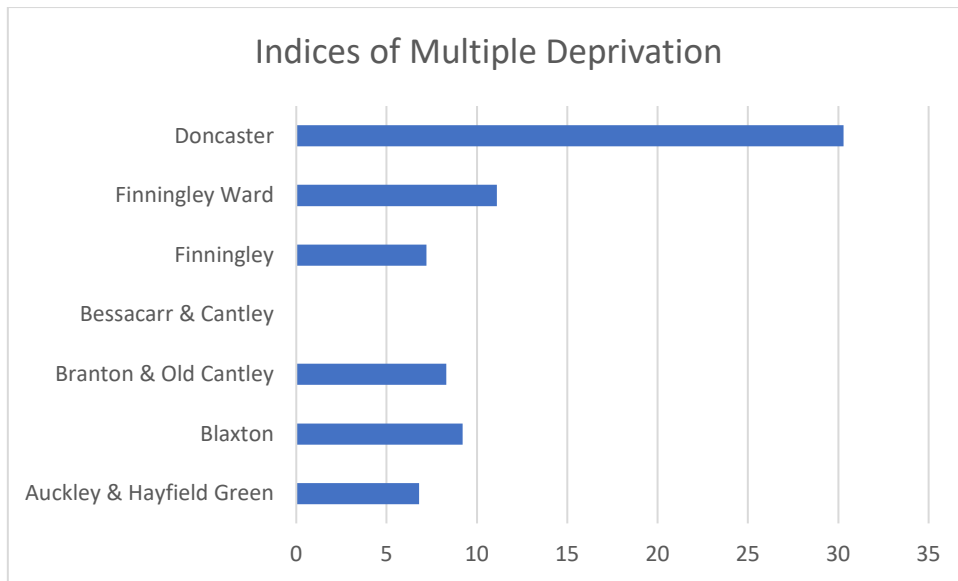


Figure 5 Indices of Multiple Deprivation at Community level

Figure 11 illustrates the communities in the Finningley Ward rank amongst the lowest in the City, with 5 of the 6 communities making up the 5 least deprived.

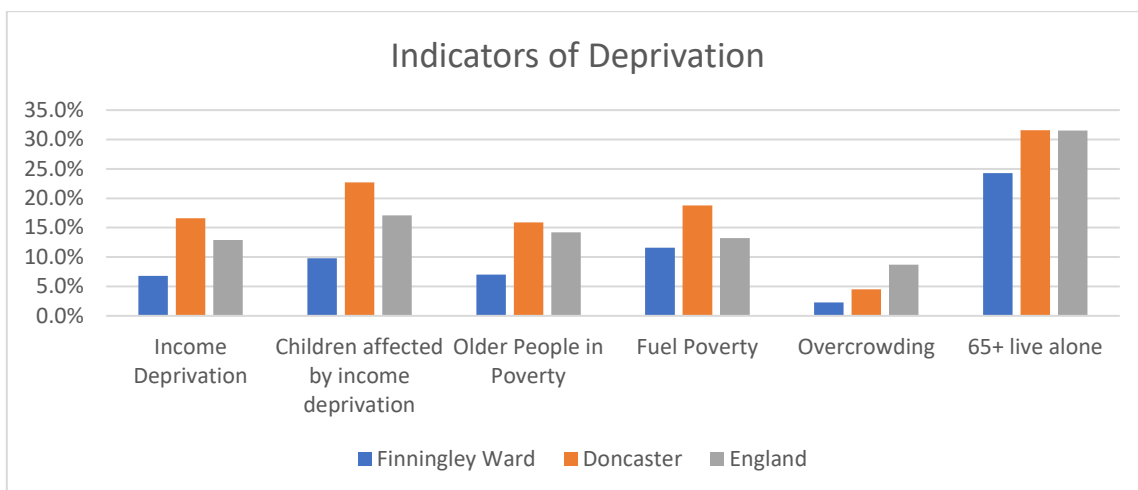


Figure 6 Indicators of Deprivation

According to the Census (2021) the dimensions of deprivation used to classify households are indicators based on four selected household characteristics: education, employment, health and housing.

Finningley has more households that aren't deprived in any dimensions and 1.7% of households are deprived in three dimensions significantly lower than Doncaster (4.6%) and England (3.7%). There are comparatively low levels of socially rented housing and more own their house outright and with a mortgage, in addition less houses are privately rented. This is illustrated in Figure 5 below.

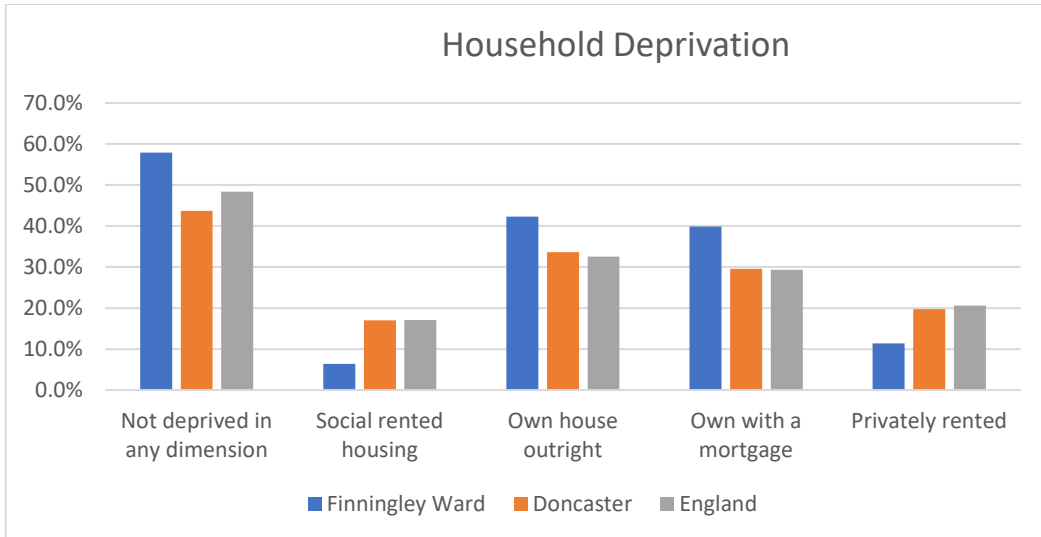


Figure 7 Household Deprivation

Another measure which may indicate deprivation is the number of cars in each household. 10.1% of households have no car or van, significantly lower than Doncaster (24.4%) and England (23.5%) and 38.9% have 2 cars or vans, significantly higher than Doncaster (25.8%) and England (26.1%).

Wealth Inequalities

Employment

Finningley ward unemployment rate amongst working age adults is 2.9% which is lower than Doncaster (6.1%) and England (5.0%), and is 2nd lowest in the borough. 20.9% of residents aged 16 and over who are not in employment have never worked, significantly lower than Doncaster (27.2%) and England (25.6%).

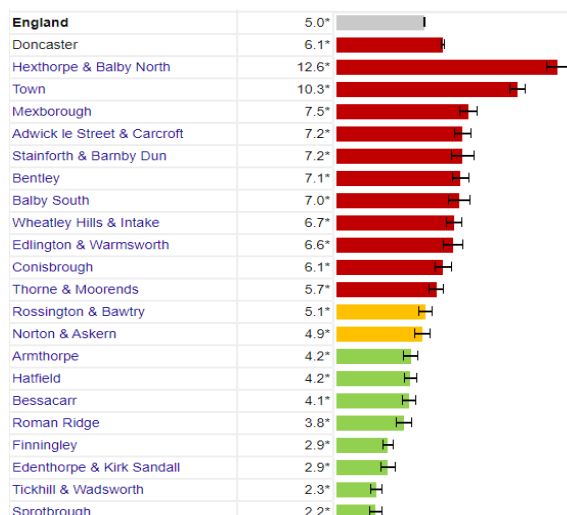


Figure 8 Unemployment Rates in Finningley ward

Of those who are in work, the majority work full time (60.0%), which is similar to figures for Doncaster (60.7%) and England (59.1%) and 27.5% work part time, lower than Doncaster (28.9%) and England (29.8%).

Occupation figures in Figure 7, highlight those in professional occupations are the most prevalent and are significantly higher than Doncaster and similar to England. A large percentage are Managers, directors and senior officials when compared to Doncaster, both traditionally high skill, higher pay jobs. Elementary occupations and plant, process and machine workers are much lower than Doncaster and England, which are traditionally low skill, low pay work. A small percentage of people aged 16 years and older have no qualifications Furthermore, a significantly high percentage of residents are qualified to Level 4 and a large percentage of people work from home.

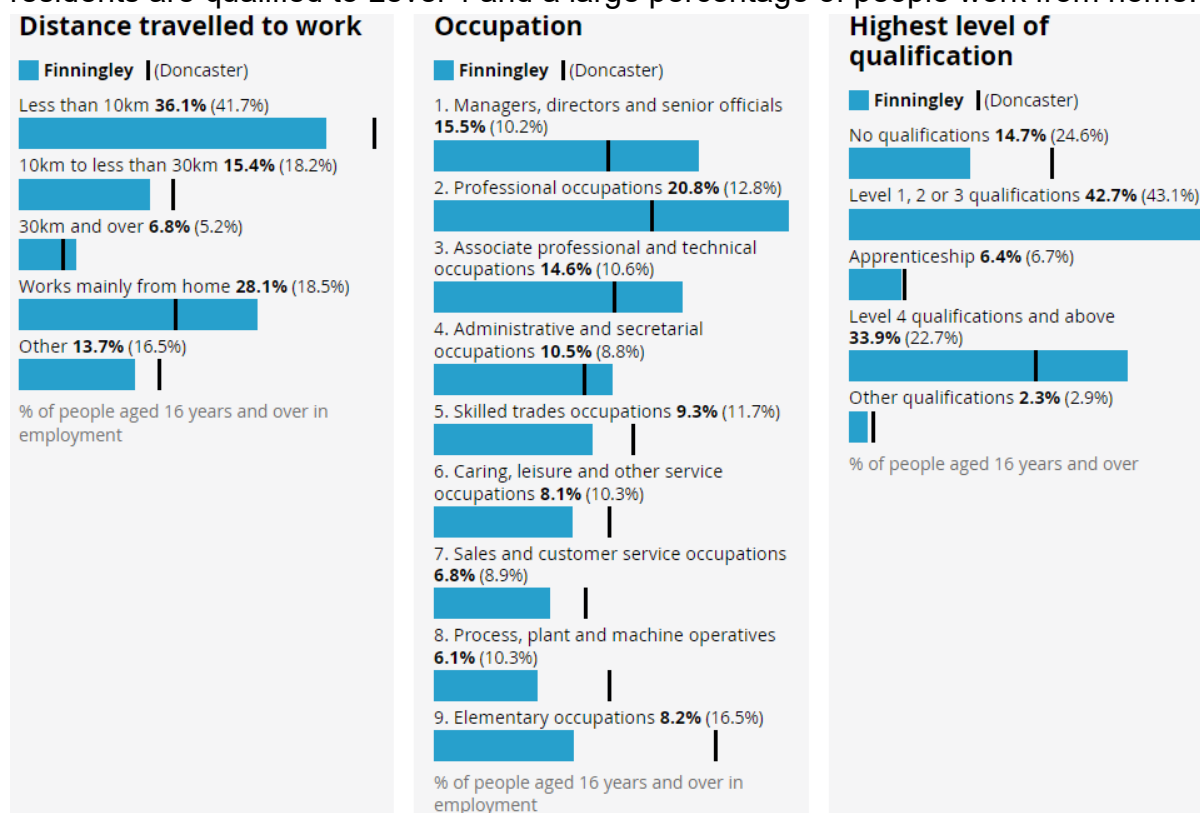


Figure 9 Employment & Education in Finningley Ward

Most Branton residents (21%) of residents are engaged in professional occupations whilst 16.3% of the working population hold managerial, directorial, or senior official positions. 20.3% of Auckley residents are engaged in professional occupations, whilst a significantly higher number of residents of the working population hold associate professional and technical positions (15.7%). Similarly, 19.8% of Blaxton residents are employed in professional occupations and a similar proportion (17%) hold Associate professional and technical positions.

The Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) (2022) data displays percentages of residents claiming universal credit. In the Finningley Ward, 2.05% of the population

are claimants, which is significantly lower when compared to Doncaster of 4.48% and is 4th lowest in the borough.

Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough

From April 2023, Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough, have supported 39 clients living within the Finningley Ward across 33 postcodes. There have been 300 new interactions for this ward, and 13 repeat actions. The predominant issue has been addressing debt.

Food Poverty

There is no foodbank within the Finningley Ward, the nearest being in New Rossington, and there are five in total in the South locality. From the data held we cannot pinpoint the areas that people collecting food live in at this time.

The Finningley Ward does not have a Foodbank so the following data is for the whole of the South of Doncaster for the period August, September and October 2023. The average number of adults helped by the Foodbanks in that period was 115 per month and the average number of children was 79 a month. These numbers were higher in August which is likely to reflect use during the school holidays, this was also the time that more single parents required help than families or couples. The figures were higher for families than for single parents in September and October.

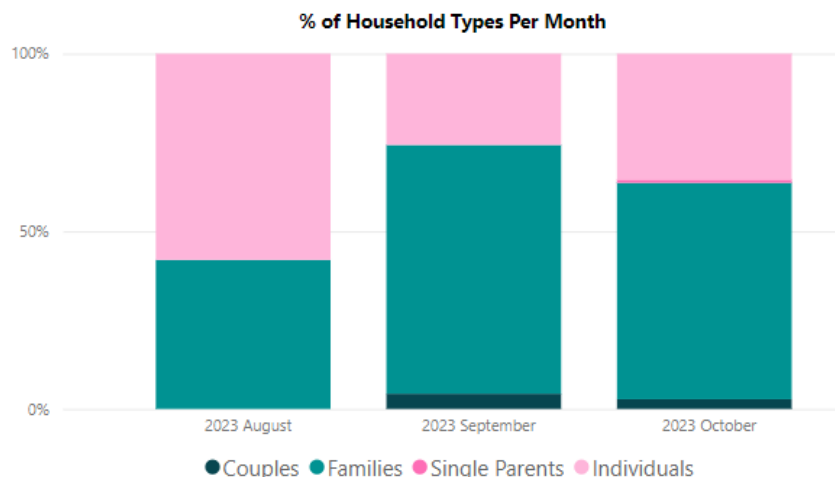


Figure 10 Household types accessing foodbank services in South Doncaster

Childhood Development

Childhood Obesity

In the most recent data collected in 2021 it showed that less children are overweight or obese at reception age and year 6 than Doncaster, however there are more regular smokers at age 15 compared to Doncaster and England.

Pupil Lifestyle Survey

The Pupil Lifestyle Survey is conducted by City of Doncaster Council to provide valuable data on children and young people's health-related behaviour, through an anonymous school-based questionnaire. Data from the survey has provided a set of Doncaster-wide figures at key points in children and young people's development;

KS2, 3 and 4. In the 2022 data, Finningley ward had 52 pupils participated. A curated collection of data that sets Finningley apart Doncaster and from other wards is detailed in Figure 9. Finningley has a high number of children who have reported being bullied in the last 12 months (50%) and a high number of young carers (7%), it also has a high proportion of parents who can't control how much they drink when compared to Doncaster as reported in the Pupil Lifestyle Survey in 2022.

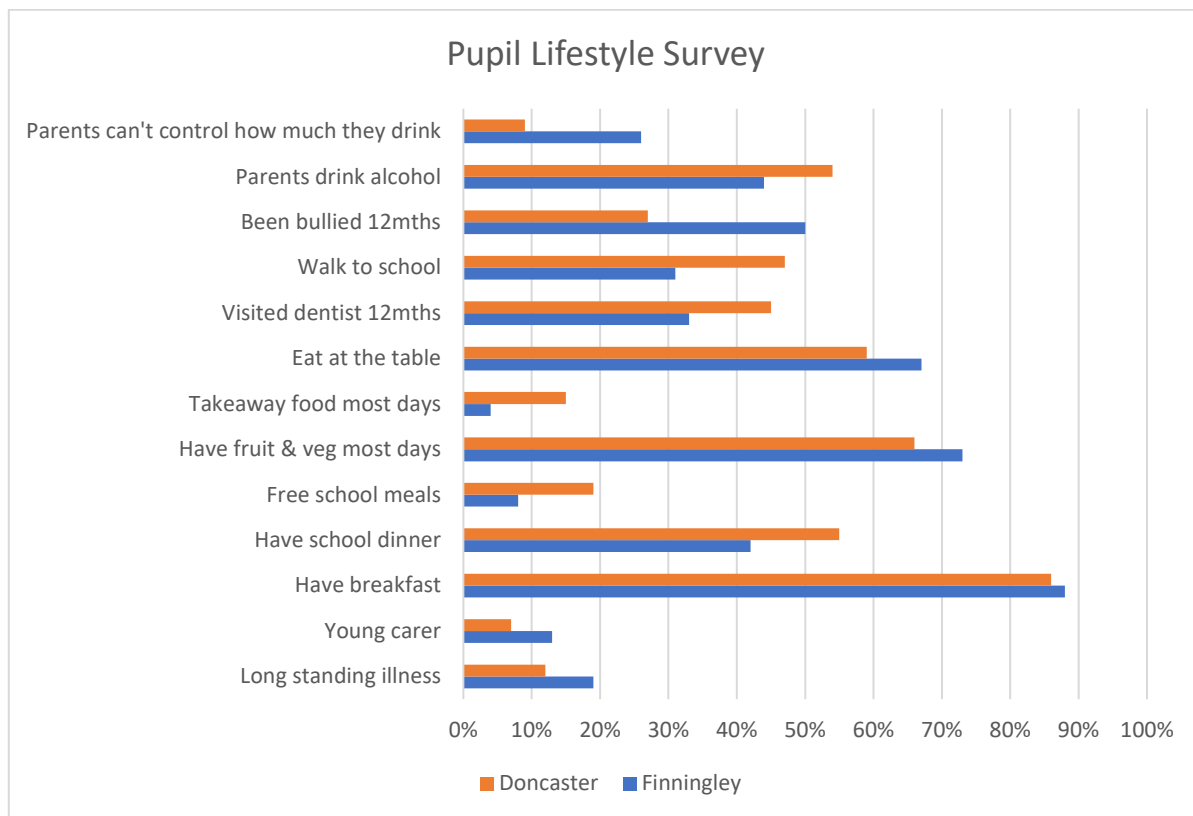


Figure 11 Pupil Lifestyle Survey

Health Inequalities

Long-Term Health Conditions

The number of people who report to be living with a long-term limiting illness (17.5%) is significantly lower than Doncaster (21.7%) but in line with England (17.6%). And those reporting bad or very bad health (4.3%) is better than Doncaster (6.9%) and 51.1% have very good health which is higher than Doncaster (44.3%) and England (48.5%). There are similar rates of bad health across all communities within the ward. Blaxton reports 3.6% of residents to have bad health, whilst Branton and Old Cantley report 3% and Auckley and Hayfield Green report 2.4%. 15% of residents are registered with a long-term health problem or disability, including conditions or illnesses relating to old-age in line with the Equality Act 2010.

The Finningley Ward has lower emergency hospital admissions for all causes: coronary heart disease, stroke, heart attacks, and COPD than the rest of Doncaster and lower incidences of all cancers: breast, lung and prostate than Doncaster. However, there are high incidences of colorectal cancer (120.4 per 100.0), and is the

seventh highest in the City. Hospital admissions for intentional self-harm, hip fractures in 65+ and those attributed to alcohol are all lower than Doncaster.

The standardised mortality ratio for all causes is lower than Doncaster: circulatory disease, coronary heart disease, stroke and respiratory disease, and deaths considered preventable are significantly lower than Doncaster. The leading cause of death in the ward is cancer (103.0 per 100.0) but is still significantly lower than the rest of Doncaster (116.1 per 100.0).

Alcohol Intake

Data collected shows that recorded levels of Alcohol Specific Admissions to Hospital were lower from the Mayflower Surgery 22.5, in comparison to Doncaster at 37.4 (per 1000 patients). This data only applies to people registered at The Mayflower Medical Practice.

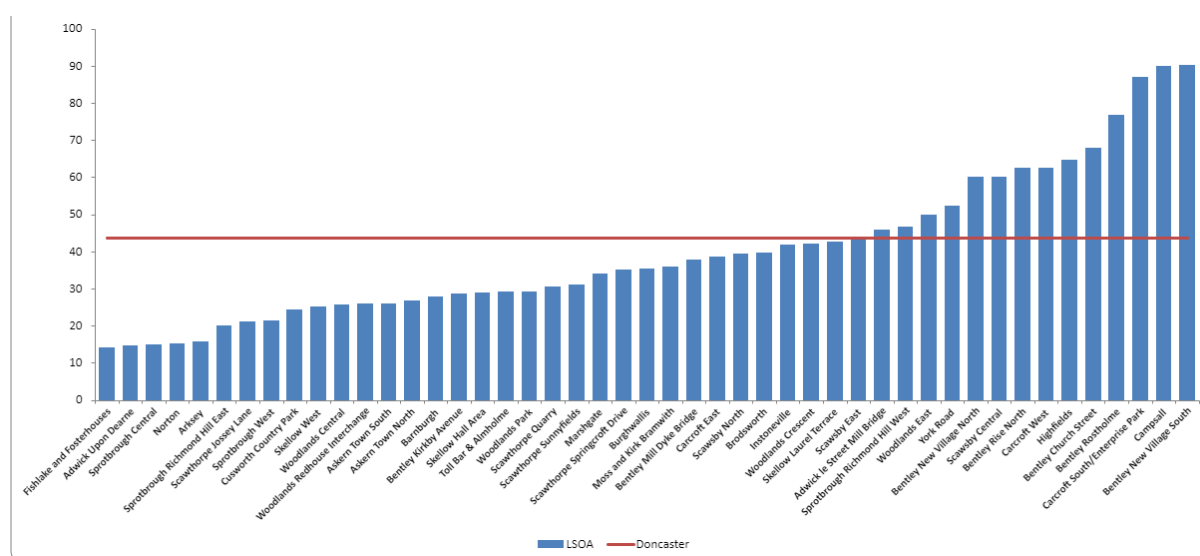


Figure 12. Alcohol specific admissions per 1000 population (April 2016-July 2023) by area

Smoking

This data is based on patients aged 15 and over who reported that they smoked when registering at The Mayflower Medical Practice; of 6353 patients 544 reported to be smokers 8.56%, this is lower than the data showed from the combined Primary Care Networks figure of 15.4%, and the South Primary Care Network Data 17.3%. Doncaster as a place shows an overall smoking rate of 14.50%. This makes for interesting reading when the data for children who report that they smoke regularly at age 15 years is higher at 10% than that of Doncaster at 6.8% and England at 5.4%.

Life expectancy

People living in the Finningley Ward have a higher life expectancy than those living in Doncaster or in England as a whole.

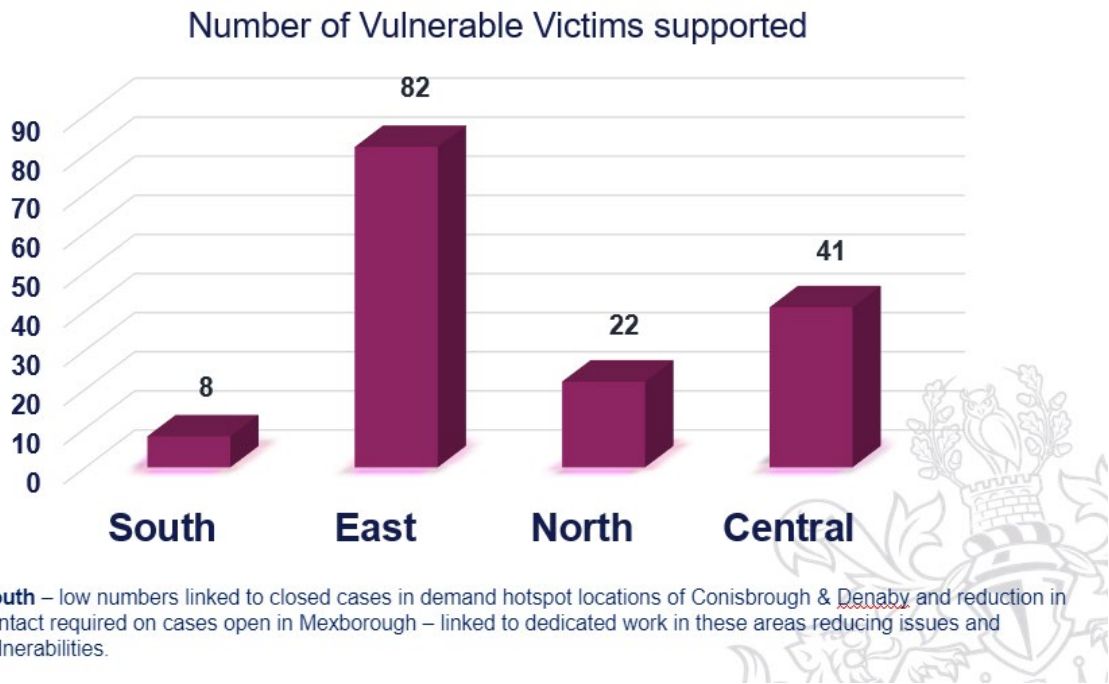


Figure 13. Vulnerable Victim breakdown

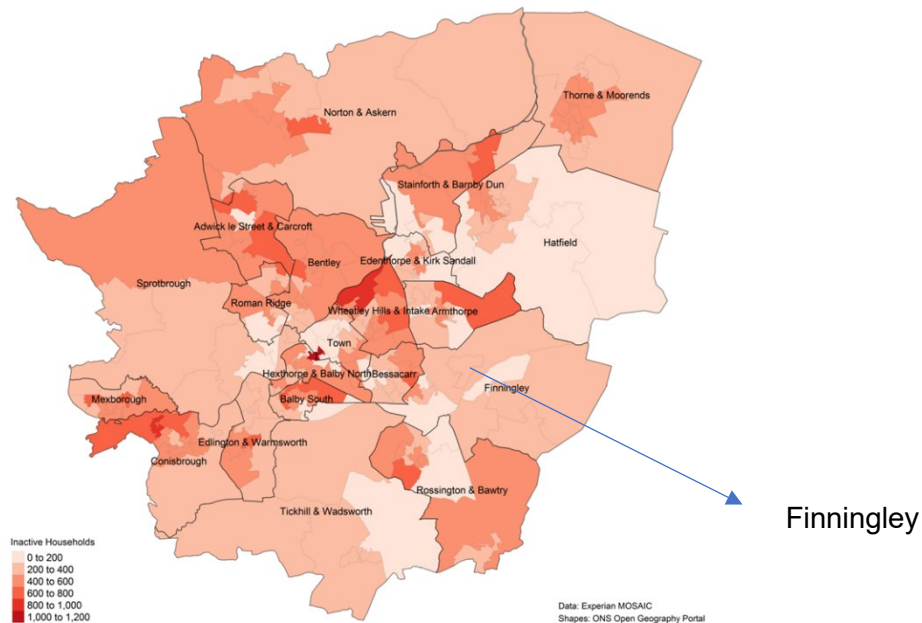


Figure 14 Inactive Households in Doncaster

The total population of the Finningley Ward is 17,109. Population density, people per square kilometre (394) is lower than Doncaster (551) and England (434).

Age Profile

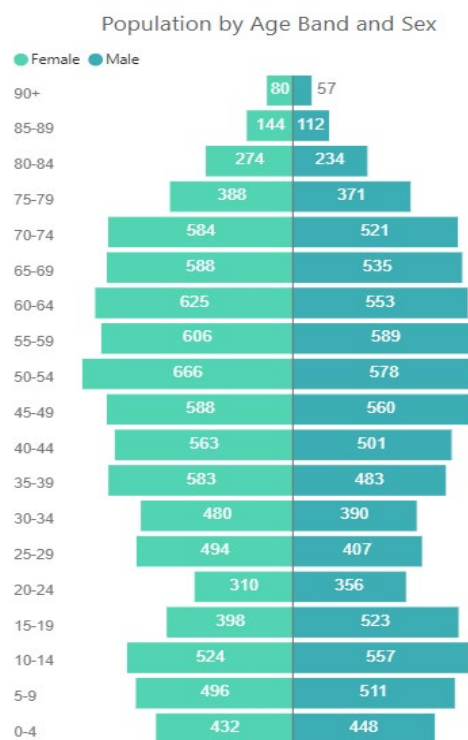


Figure 12 Population by Age Band and Sex (ONS, 2021)

Age breakdown can be seen in Figure 11. 16.6% are aged 15 years and under, lower than Doncaster (18.6%). 57.4% are of working age 16 to 64, lower than Doncaster (62.0%) and 26.1% are aged 65+, significantly higher than Doncaster (19.4%). The majority of Blaxton (60.7%), Hayfield Green (65.1%), Finningley (58%) and Branton and Old Cantley (58.8%) residents are working aged adults aged 16-64 years old.

51.3% of residents are female and life expectancy for males is 82.0, higher than Doncaster (77.9) and England (79.5) and is 2nd highest in the borough. Females (83.7) is also higher than Doncaster (81.3) and England (83.2) and is 3rd highest in the borough.

Ethnicity and Language

The majority of Finningley ward identify as 'White' but there are similar proportions of Black and Ethnic Minority Ethnicities than the rest of Doncaster. Over 96% of the population class English as their main language across all communities, higher than Doncaster (92.8%) and England (90.8%). Auckley has the most diverse population, with 5.8% of residents identifying as Black and Ethnic Minorities.

Housing

The ward has higher than average households that are owned outright or by mortgage. Finningley leads the way with 88% of households owned outright, followed by Blaxton (83.7%). Auckley has the lowest number of houses owned outright (78.8%), but these are still significantly higher than other areas in Doncaster. Social housing and private rented properties are significantly lower than the rest of Doncaster.

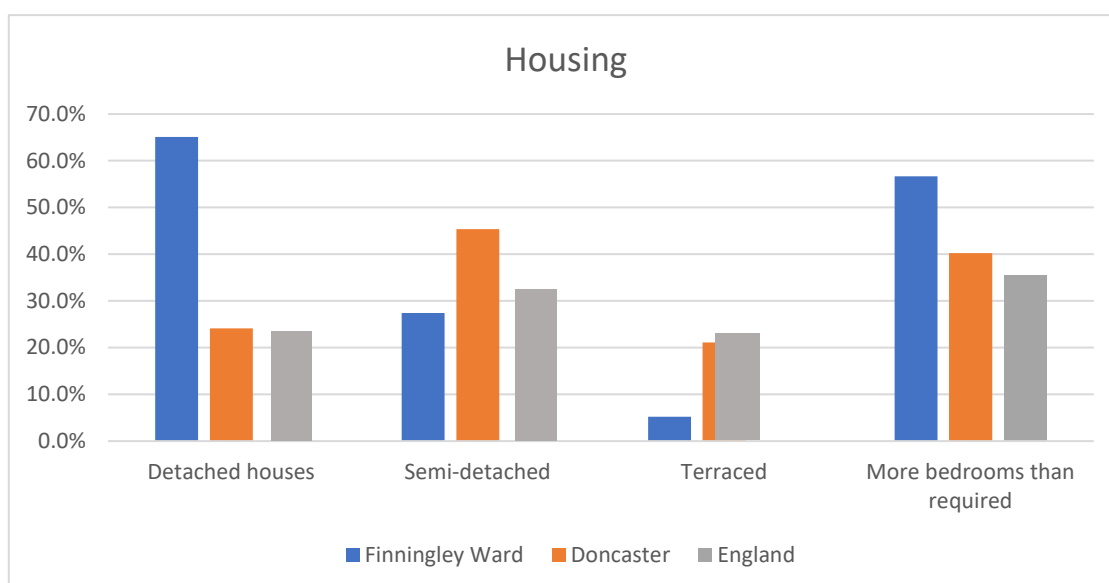


Figure 13 Types of Housing in Finningley

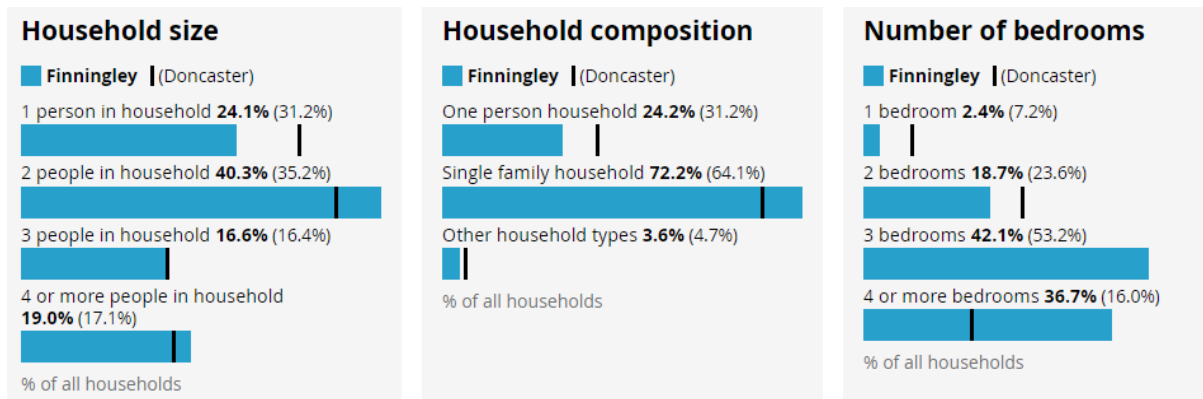


Figure 14 Household size, composition and bedrooms in Finningley Ward

Only 1.4% of houses are classed as overcrowded, which is significantly lower than Doncaster (2.5%) and England (4.3%). Household size and composition can be seen compared to Doncaster in Figure 14.

There are a high proportion of one-person households across the ward. Blaxton has the highest proportion of residents living alone (25.5%), closely followed by Branton and Old Cantley (25%). Finningley has similar rates (22.2%), whilst Auckley has the lowest of the ward (20.4%), but levels remain high.

Crime/ Anti Social Behaviour

In quarter 1 (23/24) there has been 28 reports made for anti-social behaviour incidents in the Finningley Ward, this is very low in comparison to the Rossington and Bawtry ward which reported 105, and Tickhill and Wadsworth reporting 54.

Community Insight

Appreciative Inquiry

The Well Doncaster Team undertake an Appreciative Inquiry within communities to gather insight to support co-designing action plans with the community. The AI questions are structured to pull on the successes of the past and present, to seek new potentials and possibilities and build on those through the Dream and Design stages.

The Appreciative Inquiry will include the following steps:

1. **Discovery** – This will involve engagement with the residents of the Finningley Ward to find out what is working well in the community. Responses will be themed to allow priorities of the community to be established.
2. **Dream** – Residents and key stakeholders will be invited to attend an initial workshop to discuss what ideas they have for their community and how these will meet the priorities highlighted in the discovery phase.
3. **Design** – All attendees are invited back for a second workshop to develop an action plan to direct work for the community.
4. **Deliver** – A collaborative way of working and investing resources in working towards to the actions from the previous phase.

The emerging positive themes from this years Appreciative Inquiry for the Finningley Ward are family and friends, wellbeing and ageing well, the local shops and community activities, these are all positive views expressed about the area during community conversations

Doncaster Talks

It presents data for middle super output areas (MSOA), electoral wards, clinical commissioning groups (CCG), local authorities, and England as a whole.

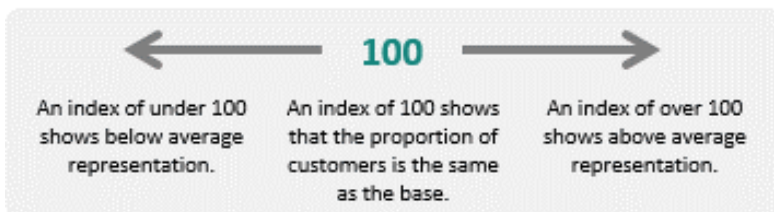
Acorn profiles

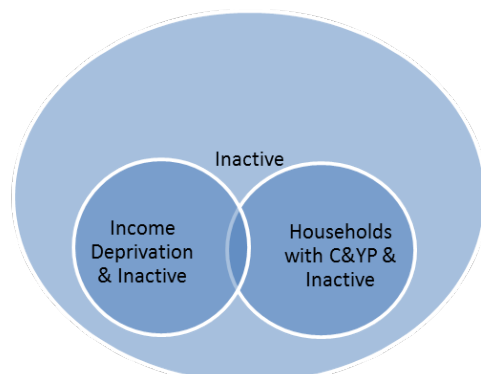

The Physically Inactive Population of Doncaster

The MOSAIC types who “Do not exercise” and “Do not take part in Sport” were searched and three priority groups have been identified through work with strategic partners as part of the development of Doncaster's Physical Activity Strategy. The three priority groups are:

- The Inactive
- Families with children and young people
- People living in income deprivation

These groups are cross-referenced against the inactivity list allowing for the identification of MOSAIC types which are both likely to be inactive and living in deprivation as well as inactive and from households with children and young people.
