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This Report

This report focuses on the Rossington and Bawtry Ward in the South of Doncaster which consists of New Rossington, Old Rossington, and Rossington and Bawtry. The report begins with a one-page summary outlining key information and priorities about Old Rossington. This report shows the initial conversations with communities, including ward members, community organisations, faith groups, residents and other organisations who work in the area. Communities' knowledge of their own areas enables them to identify their strengths and the assets on which they can build on. This document is shared with the intention of supporting those conversations and sharing information that might not be readily available to local people.

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One page Summary

Old Rossington is a term used to describe a settlement based around the 'Old Village' of Rossington. Old Rossington is separated from New Rossington by the East Coast Main Railway Line and a level crossing is in operation over the busy line. Old Rossington is a semi-rural settlement and Rossington was previously a Mining community, the Pit closed in 2007.

Old Rossington is made up of predominately privately own properties with only 1% of housing being social rent. Data also shows us that the population of Old Rossington is made up of older residents with a large number 7.8% being aged between 70 and 74, this figure is 5.3% for the rest of Doncaster.

The Census Data for Old Rossington shows it to be affluent in comparison to Doncaster and when compared to neighbouring village, New Rossington. Data for Old Rossington shows that 56.5% of households are not deprived in any dimension, significantly lower than New Rossington and Doncaster.

However please note that much of the data used within this report will be the same as shown for New Rossington due to the way some survey data is collected. Where the data states 'Old Rossington' it will be specific to Old Rossington.

Key Health Priorities

- High levels of Smokers are reported at the Rossington Surgery
- The Rossington and Bawtry ward shows a significantly high rate of Lung Cancer

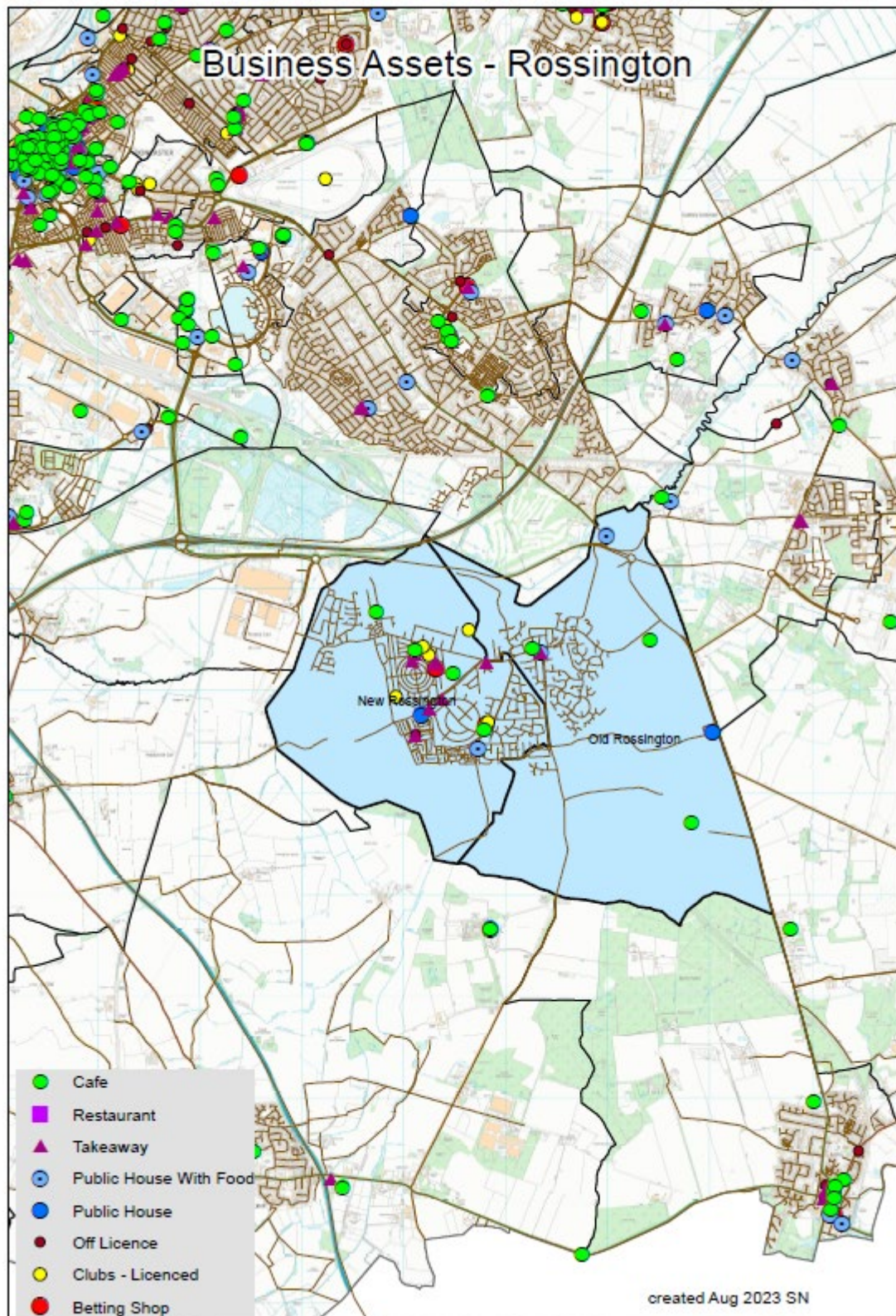


Figure 1. Business Assets

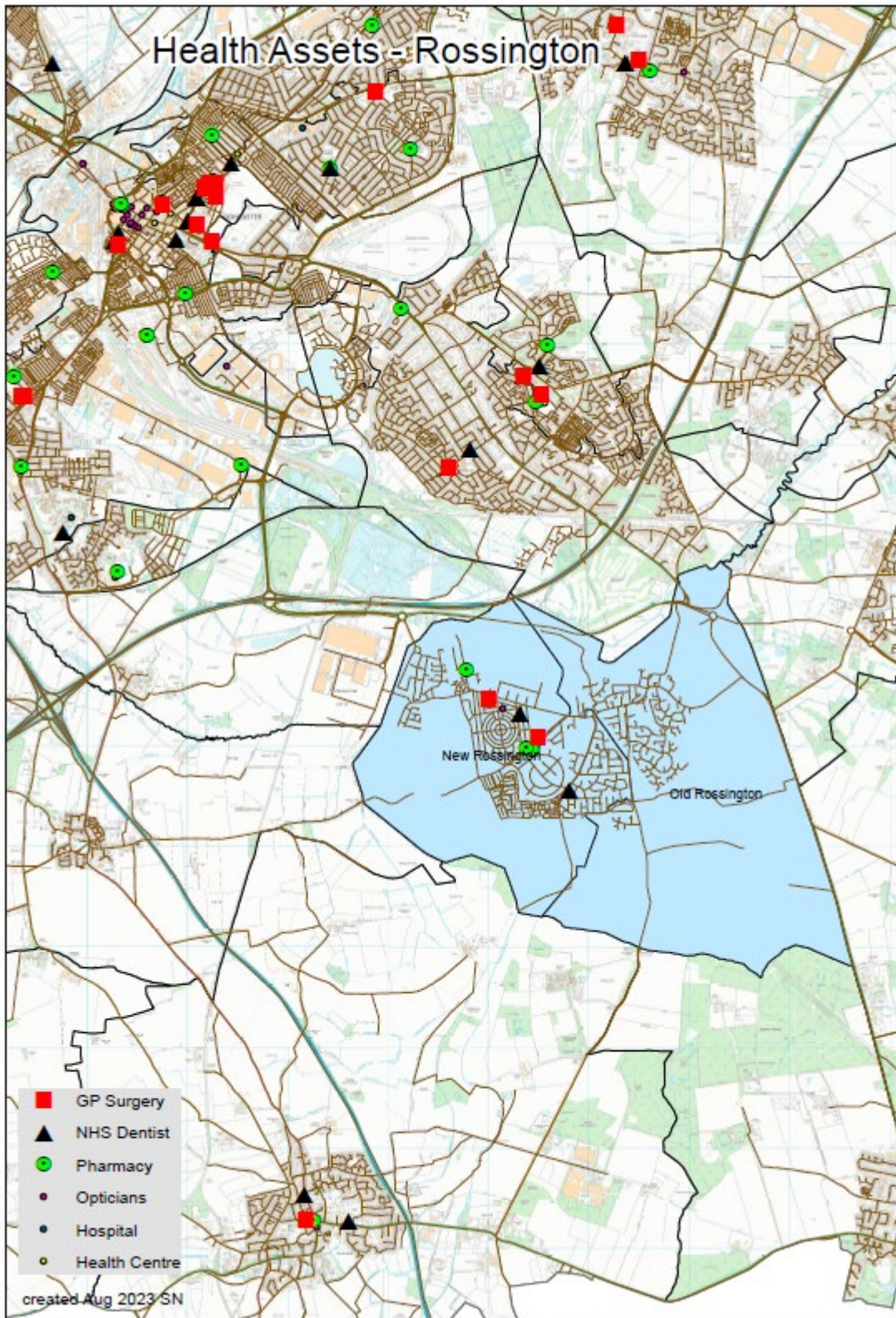


Figure 2. Health Assets

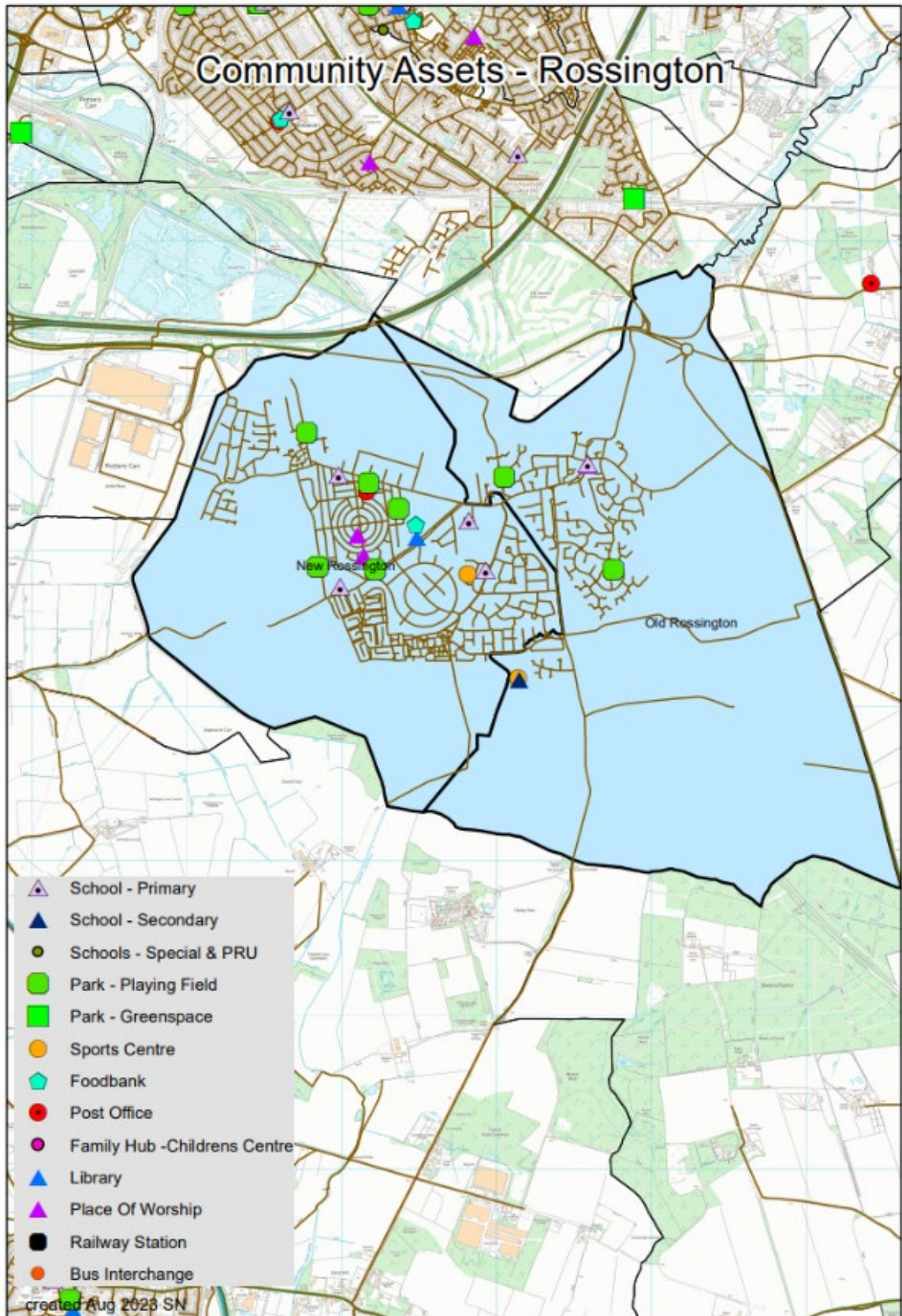


Figure 3. Community Assets

Health and Wealth

Health inequalities are avoidable differences across the population, and between different groups within society. Health inequalities arise from the conditions in which we live, work and play. These conditions influence our opportunities for good health, how we think, feel and act, therefore shaping our health and wellbeing.

Deprivation

Evidence shows that people living in our most deprived areas face the worse health inequalities in relation to health access, experiences, and outcomes. Deprivation covers a range of issues and refers to unmet needs caused by a lack of resources, including but not limited to finances, housing, and education. It is measured in different ways including the Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD).

Food Poverty

There are 5 active foodbanks in the South locality of Doncaster. Arks and Crafts Food Train and Trussell Trust provide the foodbanks in close proximity to Old Rossington residents. Cost of Living Crisis, Low income, Benefit Changes, Debt and Benefit delays are the top 5 reasons for residents accessing support from foodbanks across Doncaster. Figure 5 shows demand for food support has increased since April 2022 across North of Doncaster. An average of 164 adults are supported by food parcels every month in North of Doncaster, whilst 97 children are supported by food parcels every month. It must be noted that this data does not highlight what community residents are accessing support, and therefore it is unknown where food poverty is more prevalent.

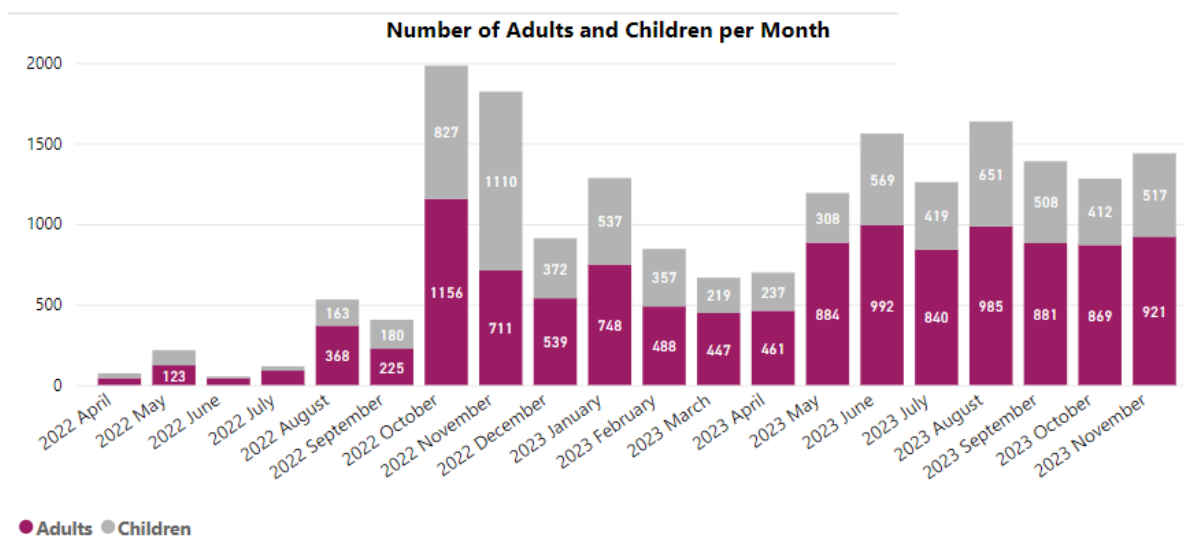


Figure 4. Number of Adults and Children accessing foodbanks in South locality

Fuel Poverty

Many residents are also living in fuel poverty. Fuel poverty is defined as a household living on a lower income that is not deemed reasonable enough to warm a home sufficiently. In 2020, 10.4% of adults were unable to warm their homes to a reasonable standard in Rossington compared to Doncaster’s average (18.8%). across communities in the ward do differ. Data taken at LSAO level suggests residents living in fuel poverty is lower in Old Rossington when compared to New Rossington (table 1).

Employment

As shown in the Socio-economic Classification (NS-SeC) graph, the residents of Old Rossington show significantly higher percentages of people employed in both higher and lower managerial positions. In line with the age data, it shows a lower number of full-time students when compared to Doncaster.

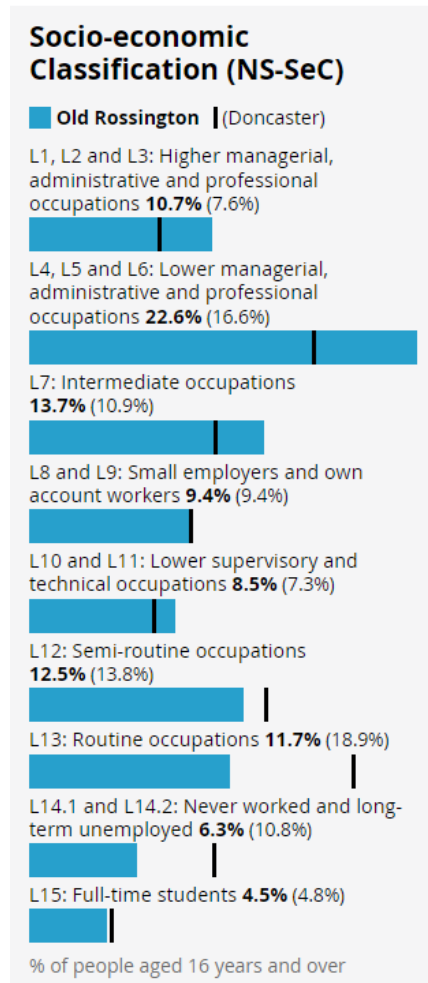


Figure 5. Socio-economic classification in Rossington

Citizens Advice Doncaster Borough (CADB)

Citizens advice Doncaster Borough (CADB) are an independent charity and part of the Citizens Advice Network across England and Wales. They provide free, confidential and impartial advice and campaign on money, benefit, housing or employment issues affecting people’s lives. There are 165 residents living in Rossington currently accessing CADB. During the 2023/24 fiscal year, Rossington and Bawtry ward had the 3rd highest number of interactions with CADB in the South of Doncaster. There have been a total of 1651 interactions with CADB, 73 of which, have been repeat interactions. Debt, benefits and tax credits, utilities and communications, benefits and universal credits and housing issues are the top 5 issues when seeking support.

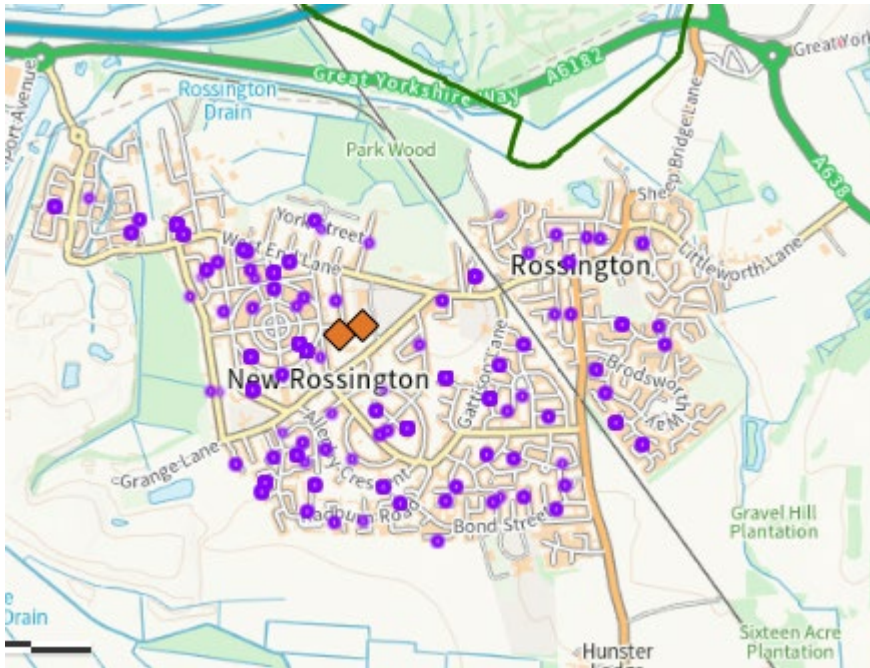


Figure 6. CADB interactions in Rossington and Bawtry ward

Childhood Development

Children in New Rossington have lower child development at age 5 than the average of the borough. The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) sets standards for the learning, development and care of children from birth to 5 years of age and includes a framework against which to assess child development as children reach the age of five. In 2017, 58.2% of 16-year-olds achieved 5 A*-C at G.C.S.E level in New Rossington compared to the borough's average of 49.1%. To be noted is that children attending school may not necessary be residents of the ward and could be residents from New Rossington, Old Rossington or Bawtry.

Childhood Obesity

In the Rossington and Bawtry children's weight is a priority considering that 26.2% of children were overweight or obese at reception age in 2021, this has now increased to 29.6%, which is higher in comparison to the average of Doncaster (26.1%) and England (22.6%) but is in line with the local growth trend. In 2021 this figure increased to 36.7% at year 6, but is now reported as 39.3% which is higher than Doncaster (38.3%) and England (35.8%).

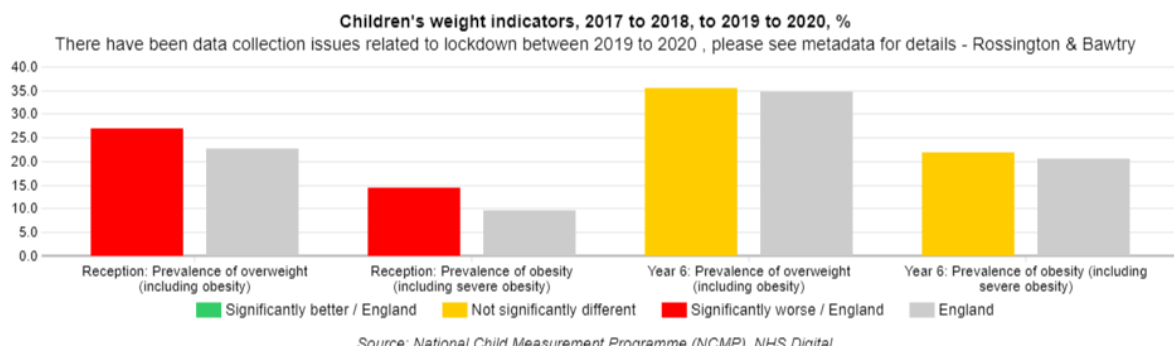


Figure 7. Children’s weight indicators in Rossington & Bawtry Ward

Smoking

In the Rossington and Bawtry Ward the prevalence of regular smokers at age 15 (7.6%) are higher than Doncaster (6.8%) and England (5.4%) and the general fertility rate, which is live births per 100.0 women aged 15-44 is lower (59.2) than Doncaster (62.4) and England (59.2). These figures are all the same as reported in 2021.

Hospital Admissions

Emergency admissions in under 5s (98.7 per 100.0) are significantly higher in Rossington & Bawtry than Doncaster (91.1 per 100.0) but lower than England (140.7 per 100.0). Emergency hospital admissions for injuries in under 15-year-olds (103.5 per 100.0) are also significantly higher than Doncaster (88.8 per 100.0) and England (92.0 per 100.0) and are the same as 2021.

In the Rossington and Bawtry Ward pupils expected grades at Key Stage 2 and GCSE can be seen below in comparison to Doncaster and England. At KS2: Each pupil is assessed in reading, writing and maths and the figure shows the percentage of pupils who have reached the expected standard in all three subjects. At GCSE (KS4) Each pupil is given an Attainment 8 score out of 90, based on their 8 best GCSE grades including English, maths and at least 3 other traditional academic GCSEs. The figure below shows the percentage of pupils reaching the expected standard and is consistent with the low levels of qualifications in New Rossington therefore access to the labour market may be limited. Work around increasing this number should be considered.

Pupil Lifestyle Survey

The Pupil Lifestyle Survey is conducted by City of Doncaster Council to provide valuable data on children and young people’s health-related behaviour, through an anonymous school-based questionnaire. Data from the survey has provided a set of Doncaster-wide figures at key points in children and young people’s development; KS2, 3 and 4. This profile will compare the previous 2020 data with that collected most recently in 2022.

In the 2022 data, Rossington and Bawtry had 112 pupils participated. 48% of participants have school dinner, this is lower than Doncaster (55%) and higher than 2021, indicating packed lunches may be contributing to the high levels of childhood obesity. 11% of school-aged children have free school meals, this is lower than Doncaster (19%) and the same as 2021. 25% have a healthy food and beverage

intake and 9% claimed to consume takeaway food most or every day (vs 15% across Doncaster). And daily sweet and snack consumption is 71%, higher than Doncaster (58%).

98% of children reported they feel warm and comfortable at home which is lower than Doncaster (97%). 90% felt able to clean themselves at home, similar to Doncaster (91%). 2021 data showed that only 71% of school children in Rossington & Bawtry felt able to have a restful night's sleep, this has now increased to 78% yet still lower than Doncaster (80%).

90% of Children reported that they felt safe at home which matches Doncaster and 88% have a nice, safe place at home or near home to play (Doncaster 87%).

68% of school children in reported that they feel able to get involved in the wider community which has increased compared to previous data 62% and is now higher than Doncaster (62%).

The biggest worry for children the Rossington and Bawtry Ward is relationships (38%) which is considerably higher than Doncaster (19%) and the highest in the borough. Furthermore, 32% of pupils surveyed admitted to being bullied in the last 12 months, significantly higher than Doncaster (27%) and 19% have deliberately hurt someone in the last 12 months, higher than Doncaster (16%).

It is important to note that the Pupil Lifestyle Survey is self-reported and was not completed by all the schools.

Learner Outcomes

The Doncaster Pupils Lifestyle Survey conducted for the academic year 2020/2021 was completed by 2102 pupils in Doncaster overall. 52 students form Rossington and Bawtry ward. 42% identified as male and 54% as female. 4% preferred not to say or identified differently. Of these pupils, 69% had a white ethnicity and 23% ethnic minority. Compared with 81% for Doncaster as a white and 13% ethnicity, this was the highest percentage of ethnic minority across Doncaster wards.

English was a second language for 23% in Rossington and Bawtry. This was the same per cent as reported across Doncaster as a whole. Again, prevalence of disability was in the line compared to Doncaster 6%. Long-standing illness in pupils was reported at 13%. This's 2% lower than across Doncaster.

Special Educational Needs (SEN) was reported for 19% of pupils from the Rossington & Bawtry ward taking part in the survey, which is 10% higher than that reported for Doncaster overall and the highest than all wards. Of those reporting SEN, just over one-half (53%) of pupils received extra help at school. Again, this is higher than the overall percentage for Doncaster (49%).

Twenty-three children (Bawtry 8 & Rossington 15) have been recorded as receiving Elective Home Education. Eight children (Bawtry 1 & New Rossington 7) were recorded as missing education in the ward (City of Doncaster Council, August 2023).

At KS4, each pupil is given an Attainment 8 score (a score out of 90) based on their 8 best GCSE grades including English, maths and at least 3 other traditional academic

GCSEs (sciences, languages, and humanities). Other qualifications at an equivalent level (e.g. BTECs) can also count towards the score. In 2022, average GCSE attainment 8 score per pupil (out of 90) was 61.8 in Bawtry (38 pupils); the second highest in Doncaster compared to first highest 63.4. This was higher in comparison to 2019 (54) and across overall Doncaster in 2022 (45.2). In New Rossington average GCSE Attainment 8 was 42.9 (achieved by 100 pupils). This was lower comparing to Doncaster (45.2) and to the year 2019 (44.3).

At KS2, each pupil is assessed in reading, writing and maths. This shows the percentage of pupils who have reached the expected standard in all three subjects. In 2023, 63 % of pupils in Bawtry & achieved the expected standard in reading, writing, and mathematics at key stage 2 in Bawtry and 59% in New Rossington. In New Rossington is a drop of 4% since 2022. In Bawtry this is higher than across Doncaster as a whole (55%) and to the year 2019 (56%).

Health Inequalities

Life Expectancy

People living in New Rossington have a lower life expectancy and live more of their lives in poor health in comparison to the averages of Doncaster and England. Life expectancies for men (78.2 years) and women (79.9 years) living in Rossington and Bawtry are lower to the averages of Doncaster (*m*: 78.1, *f*: 81.6) and England (*m*: 79.7, *f*: 83.7). Men are expected to develop a health condition at age 56 and women at 57, therefore decreasing the opportunity of living in better health by 6.9 years and 7 years, respectively. These figures are the same as reported in 2021.

This data is for the ward 'Rossington and Bawtry, it shows that life expectancy is better than of that for England.



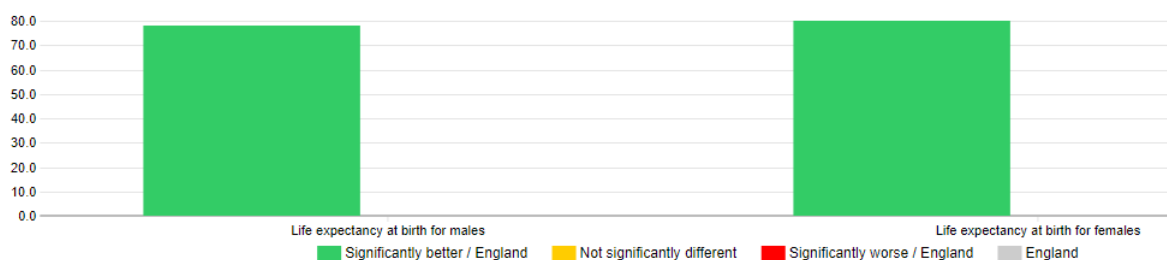

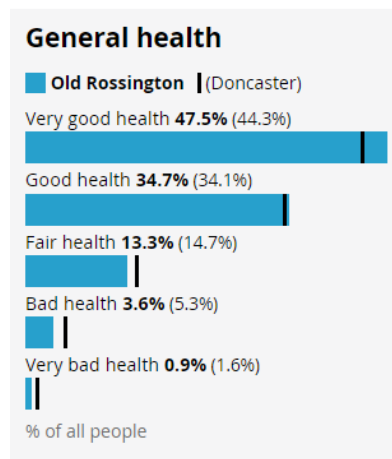


Figure 9. General health in Old Rossington

As the graph below shows there is a higher number of people reporting to be in very good health when compared to Doncaster, and lower numbers shown for people reporting to be in bad or very bad health.

Smoking

According to NHS England in 2023 ((NHS England Quality and Outcomes Framework 2022-2023), there are 54584 patients older than 15 years registered patients with Doncaster South Primary Network (PCN) in of Doncaster. 9298 of those are registered as smokers. Making up 17.03% of registered patient smokers across south of Doncaster. This per centage is slightly lower than across Doncaster (17.96%).

In the Rossington Practice there are registered as smokers 17.84% of patients. 1207 out of total registered patients of 6766. In the West End Clinic there are registered as smokers 17.35% of patients. 643 out of total registered patients of 3706. These are comparable to across four PCN in Doncaster of 17.96%; and slightly higher than across PCN South of 17.03%. However, it is significantly higher when compared to a GP with the lowest number of registered as smokers 15+ (8.51%). This is likely to contribute to the higher levels of respiratory disease and relatable Hospital Admissions as shown above. Rossington and Bawtry ward has similar levels of emergency hospital admissions for heart disease. The incidences of cancer are higher (113.1 per 100.0) The lung cancer (166.5 per 100.0) is the 5th highest in the city.

It must be noted that data is taken from self-reported measures when signing up to GP. This may not truly reflect the prevalence of smoking in specific communities. Also, it relies on individuals self-reporting their behaviours. Residents registered at GP do not necessarily reside in the community. It does not reflect patients residing in the community but might be registered with a GP outside of it.

Physical Activity

It is known that Doncaster has more physically inactive adults, and fewer physically active adults than the national average (Get Doncaster Moving/Sport England, 2019). Across Doncaster, 29.1% of adults are physically inactive and this is higher than across England (25.4%). The number of physically active adults in Doncaster is lower than the England rate, at 59.0% and 62.3% respectively.

The Mosaic map below shows levels of inactive households across Doncaster. Data is mapped to LSOA, however wards are shown and labelled for orientation. There are a low to moderate number of inactive households, with the number of inactive households higher in the North of the ward.

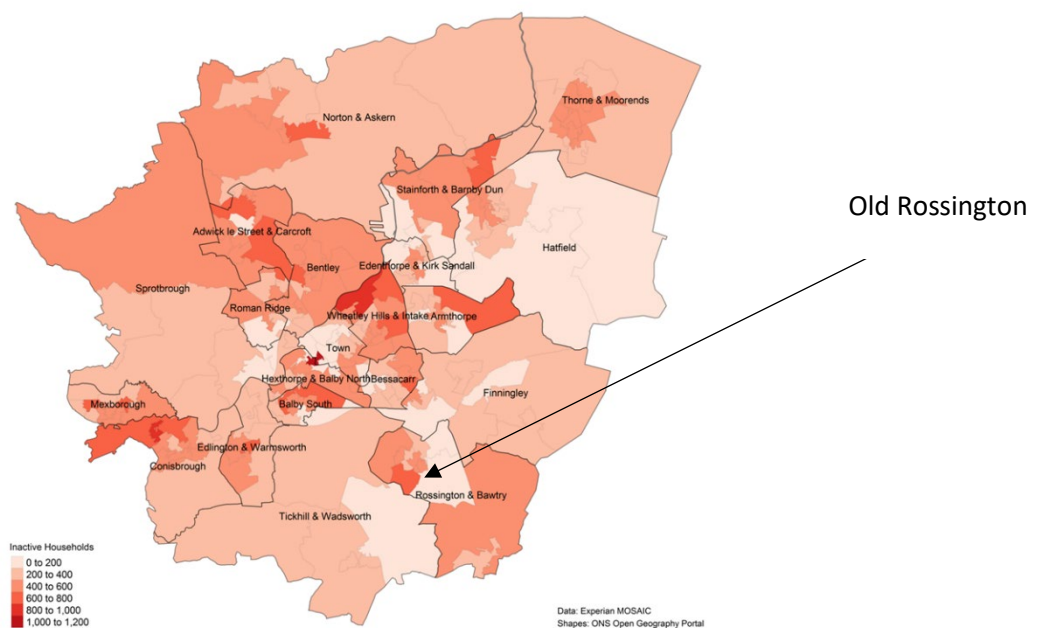


Figure 9. Inactive households

Green Spaces and Parks

There are green space assets for the whole Rossington & Bawtry ward available, and in close proximity to the communities. It is adjacent to open countryside and has access to countryside footpaths and open spaces to enjoy on various walking routes and nature walks. Local parks and green spaces don't have as wide range of facilities as major parks. However, they are still home to great pockets of facilities.

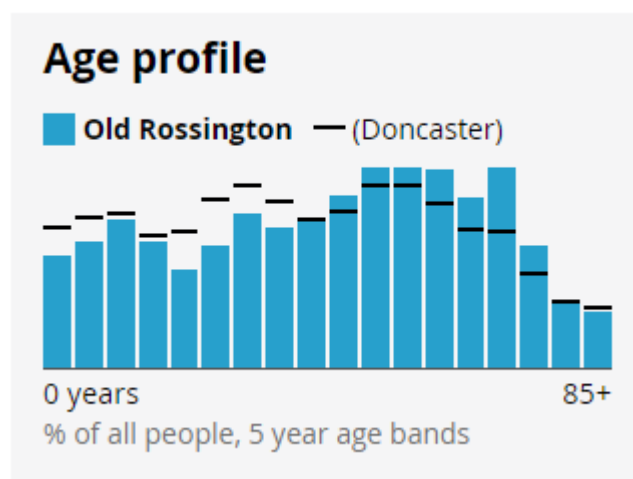


Figure 10. Age Profile in Rossington

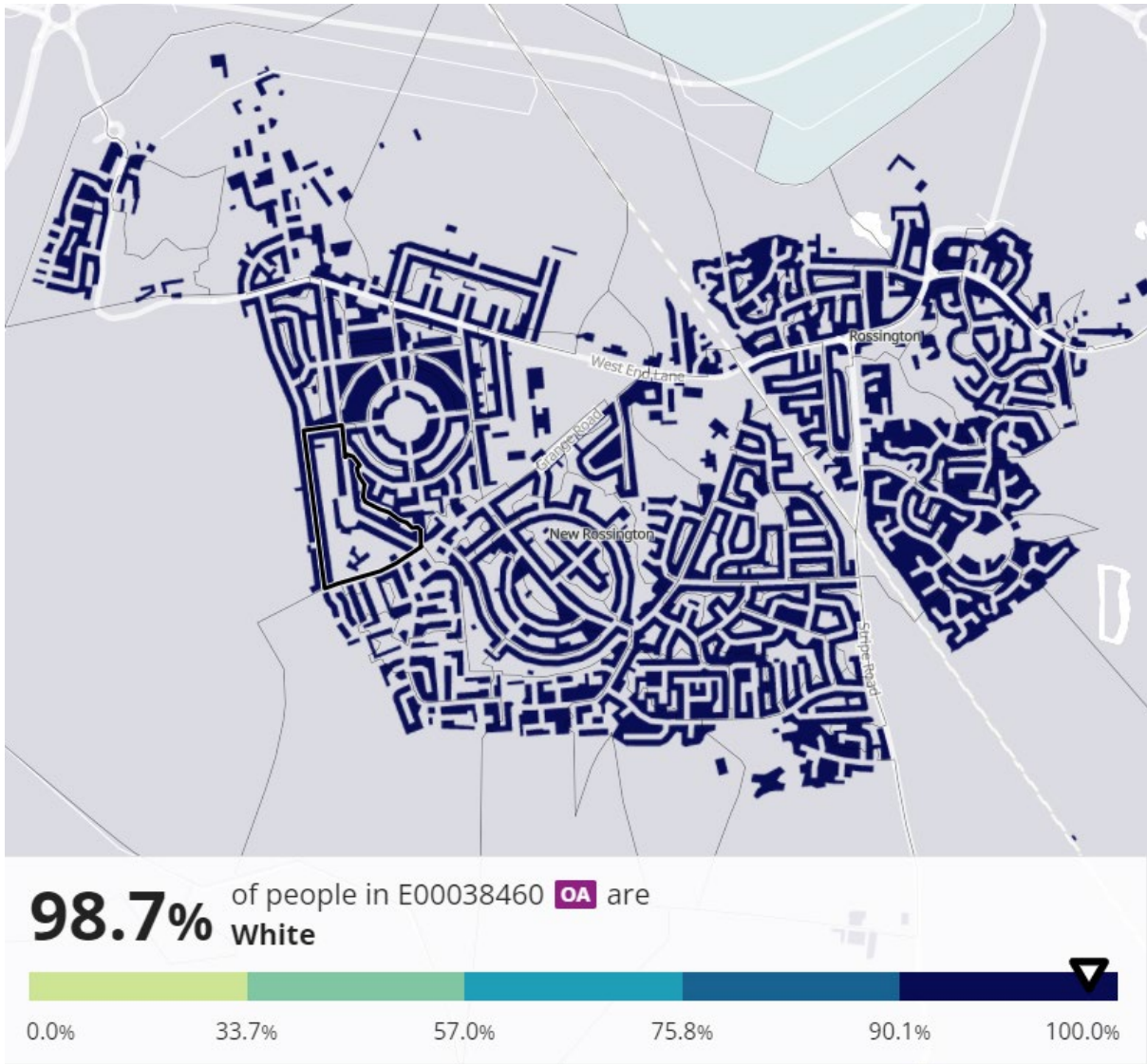


Figure 12. Ethnic population for Rossington

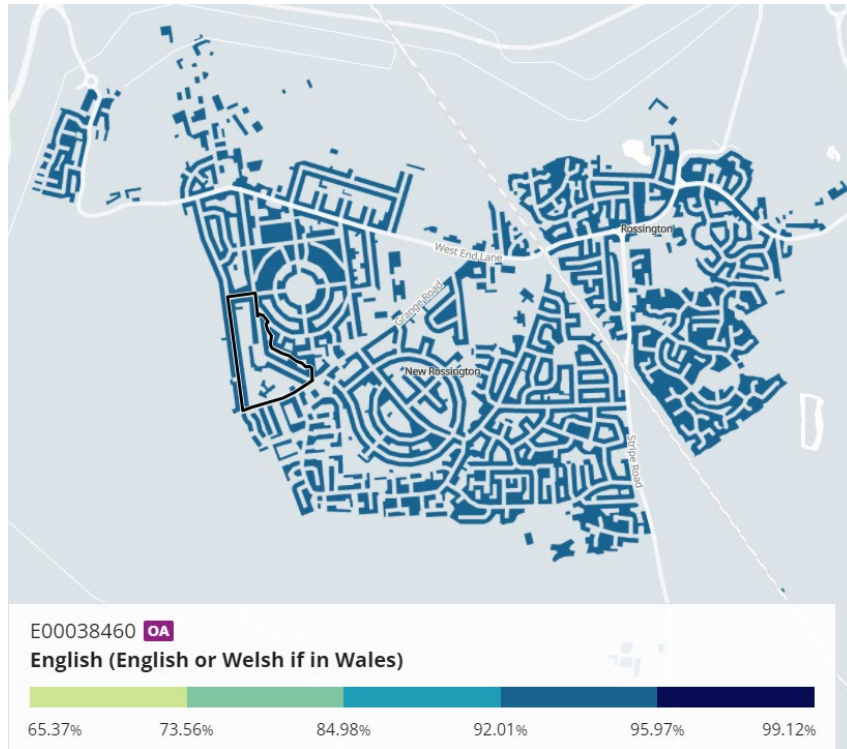


Figure 13. Languages spoken in Old Rossington (ONS, 2021)

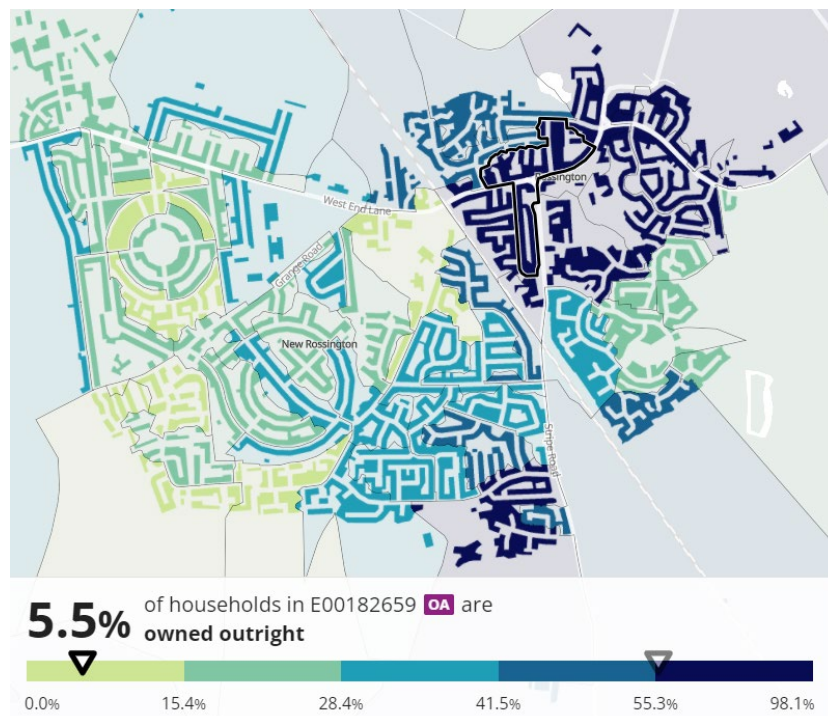


Figure 14. Households owned Outright in Old Rossington (ONS, 2021)

Crime/ Antisocial Behaviour

Stronger Communities purpose is for there to be strong, active, inclusive, and resilient communities across the whole of Doncaster, effectively building on and using their strengths and assets to work in partnership to improve their quality of life and well-being, to make their neighbourhoods safe and supportive and able to tackle the issues that matter to them. 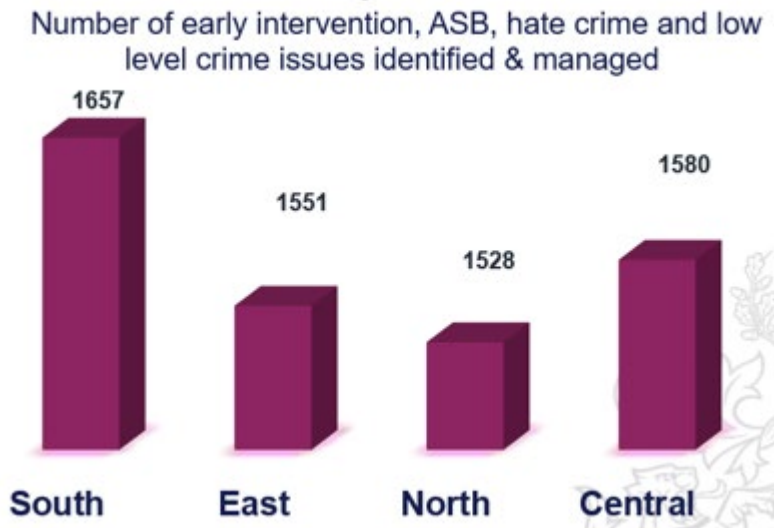


Figure 15. Stronger Community case loads across localities in Doncaster

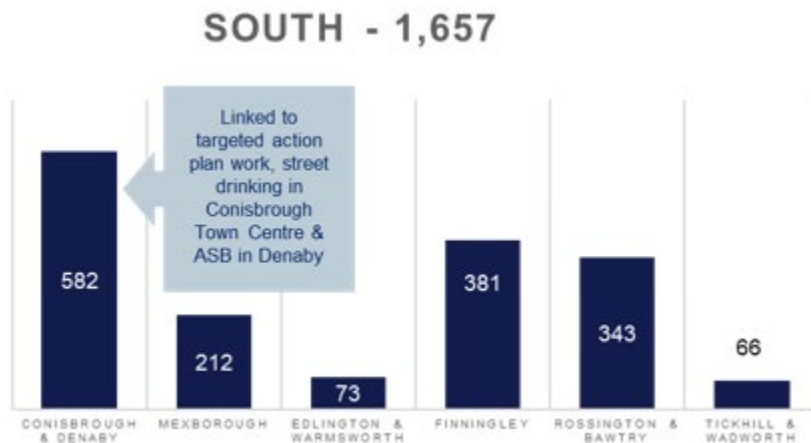


Figure 16. Number of early interventions, ASB, hate crime and low level crime issues identified in communities

Community Insight

Appreciative Inquiry

The Well Doncaster Team undertake an Appreciative Inquiry within communities to gather insight to support co-designing action plans with the community. The AI questions are structured to pull on the successes of the past and present, to seek new potentials and possibilities and build on those through the Dream and Design stages.

The Appreciative Inquiry will include the following steps:

1. **Discovery** – This will involve engagement with the residents of Rossington to find out what is working well in the community. Responses will be themed to allow priorities of the community to be established.
2. **Dream** – Residents and key stakeholders will be invited to attend an initial workshop to discuss what ideas they have for their community and how these will meet the priorities highlighted in the discovery phase.
3. **Design** – All attendees are invited back for a second workshop to develop an action plan to direct work for the community.
4. **Deliver** – A collaborative way of working and investing resources in working towards to the actions from the previous phase.


Due to Rossington in its early stages of Appreciative Inquiry, Well Doncaster are continuing to gather community insight to feed into a co-produced action plan with the community. The table below captures the discussions had so far. It is acknowledged more understanding is needed and such conversations will be built on with more insight.

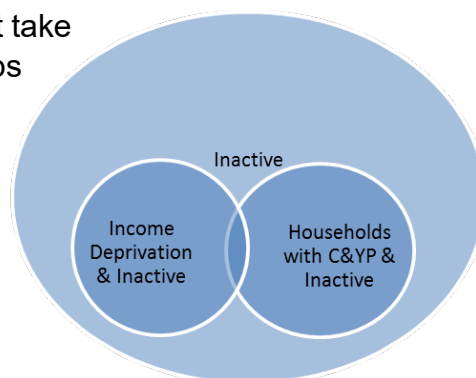
Mosaic Data

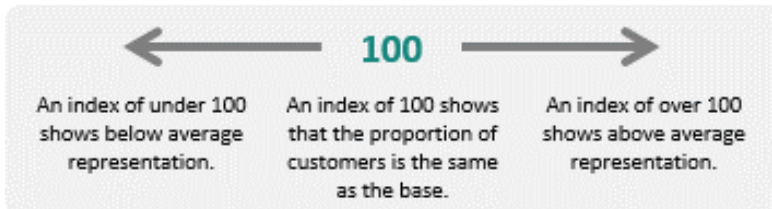
Acorn profiles
