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1. Introduction

1.1 Background

The Tour de Yorkshire is widely believed to have a powerful legacy in terms of the social benefits on the communities involved but there is a need for a clearer picture in relation to the exact nature of these community benefits, as well as to



be able to better evidence these social outcomes to justify continued public funding.

In light of this, Doncaster Council (Leisure Services) commissioned a social impact assessment for their section of the 2018 Tour de Yorkshire route through their status as a Sport England Local Delivery Pilot. Leeds Beckett University were chosen to carry out this research / assessment.



The overall aim was to use an evidence-led approach to develop insight around understanding the social impacts of sports events on local communities and their levels of physical activity and use TDY as an opportunity to pilot a new and innovative practical approach to assessing and monitoring the social outcomes of future major sporting events in Doncaster.

Findings were then used to make practical recommendations on interventions that could be made for using future TDY events to maximise local benefits and act as a catalyst/'sparkler' to encourage people to live a more active lifestyle.

As Doncaster were hosting a section of the TDY 2019, this provided an opportunity for the findings from TDY 2018 to be piloted as part of a new and innovative practical approach to delivering, assessing and monitoring the social outcomes of major sporting events in Doncaster.

One of these recommendations was to implement a Micro Grant Scheme, which gives Communities the opportunity to apply for a small pot of money, which they can utilise to deliver their events, activities and promotion within their community to support the Tour de Yorkshire passing through the locality. It was believed this approach would contribute to communities' senses of pride and ownership, engaging a wider audience in the event, further boosting social impact.

1.2 First steps

As a result, Doncaster Council (Leisure Services) put aside £3000 to allow applicants to apply to the fund for a maximum of up to £200. This would allow a minimum of 15 applicants.

The Scheme is part of Get Doncaster Moving, which aims to get more people physically active across Doncaster. The Get Doncaster Cycling element of the Scheme is a programme of activities aimed at promoting cycling as a recreation, sport and a mode of transport to Doncaster residents.



In order to ensure the scheme was set up effectively, the team approached Doncaster Councils Communities Team to receive advice and guidance on how they delivered their SEEDS Fund within Communities. This fund enables local people/informal groups to come together to develop and expand their activities by utilising a small fund.

The SEEDS fund has been very successful within Communities and therefore a number of their recommendations were taken into consideration when setting up the Micro Grant Scheme.

This included allowing informal networks / groups to apply even if they weren't a constituted group. This was important to the Micro Grant as it was identified that a number of groups actually only came together as a result of TDY coming to their communities and therefore were not at the stage of becoming constituted.

Another recommendation taken on board was where the items / services applied for with the funding application would be purchased by Doncaster Council (Leisure Services). This ensured that applicants didn't have to have a bank account to transfer funds and also meant they were not required to keep receipts and provide proof of purchases.

The final recommendation which was incorporated into this scheme was to ensure that the application process, including the application form, was as simple and straightforward as possible to ensure applicants would not be put off applying by being required to complete numerous types of paperwork.

1.3 Criteria

The Application process was designed to be as easy as possible with minimal requirement for information that identified the following: -

- What items / services they would like
- Where they could be purchased from (Including costs)
- How the items / services would be utilised
- Who would benefit from the items / services within their community

Doncaster Council (Leisure Services) were keen on receiving applications from those who would be able to assist in achieving a number of the other recommendations identified via the Leeds Beckett Research. Therefore, applicants were advised that the team were "particularly interested" in (although not exclusively) applications that: -



- Will engage communities along the route
 - o Town Centre
 - Bentley
 - o Tollbar
 - o Askern
 - o Campsall
 - Norton
- Demonstrate an ability to sustain engagement following the initial support provided for the event; this may relate to physical activity/sport and/or volunteering
- Applications that target, although not exclusively:
 - BAME populations
 - o 16-25 year olds
 - o 60+ year olds
- Applications which can evidence "match funding", where the applicant will match funds requested to purchase similar or different items for their event / activity.

A copy of this application form can be found in *Appendix 10.1*.

1.4 Monitoring

As part of the Scheme, applicants were advised they would be required to complete Monitoring after the event and allow their details to be shared with Leeds Beckett University to assist in carrying out further research on the effectiveness of the Scheme.

1.5 Scheme Launch

The scheme went live on 18th January 2019 with a deadline of 8th March. This timeframe ensured the team had plenty of time to process applications, purchase items and have them delivered to utilise in the run up to the event.

The Scheme was promoted through the Community engagement work undertaken for the event and via Community roadshows delivered by Leisure Services Business Development Manager Andy Maddox and Welcome to Yorkshire.

In addition to this, Doncaster Council Communications Team ensured the information was promoted on Doncaster Councils website and Social Media Accounts. This also included paid targeted ads on Twitter and Facebook to ensure the audience reached was relevant to the types of applicants that were being sought.




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2. Applicants


In total, there was **21** Applications received for the Micro-Grant Scheme, of which **18** were successful and granted.



The team were extremely happy with the number of applications, due to the race running through a small section of the Borough.

In terms of Applications received from each area, the highest number were received from Bentley (9) and Askern (8). The smallest number of applications were received from Town Centre (1) and Campsall (1). Tollbar submitted 2 Applications. No applications were received from Norton.

Applications from the **Town Centre** were not expected to be in high numbers due to the limited footprints available to put on activities and events. Application numbers from **Tollbar, Campsall** and **Norton** were expected to be in low numbers due to the same reason.



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2.1 Unsuccessful Applicants

The 3 applications, which were not successful, were as follows: -

Applicant #1 - The Applicant proposed to build a wall with Shrink-wrap around trees at Askern Lake, which would then be turned into a street art mural with Aerosol spray paint.

The decision not to grant this fund was mainly due to concerns in relation to: -

- The damage to the trees the shrink-wrap may have had
- The disposal of the items after the activity
- The health and safety aspect of the activity
- This would go against the greener / cleaner activity recommendation identified via Leeds Beckett Research

Applicant #2 - The applicant proposed to have a number of tables along the route creating wooden TDY Medals with members of the public.

The decision not to grant this fund was mainly due to concerns in relation to: -

- The sourcing of the wood to be used for this activity
- Their target audience had not been determined
- Their locations identified had already been recognised as areas where high footfall of spectators would be congregating highlighting crowd management concerns
- Items requested were included a number of non-environmentally friendly substances and materials.

Applicant #3 - The applicant proposed to purchase Patio Umbrellas and sheets to create a large piece of Land Art, which could potentially be picked up by the TV Helicopter crews.

The decision not to grant this fund was mainly due to concerns in relation to: -

- Land Art is never guaranteed to be picked up by TV crews
- The items requested could not be re-used and potentially would be thrown away or stored for lengthy periods of time
- The cost of the items would not achieve value for money

It is worth noting that once the reasons for declining the bids were given to the applicants, they were all understanding and advised they would probably still deliver their proposed activities by utilising their own funds, but take into account the advice and concerns expressed.

It is also worth noting that a small number of applications had been received over the weekend just after the deadline date. The Team agreed to still allow these applications to be added to the list as it was still within the timeframe of being able to process them.

2.2 Successful with small amendments

Out of the **18** Successful applications, **7** of them were advised that their bids had been successful but required some small amendments made to their original list of items for a number of reasons.

On a number of occasions, the items listed in some of the Applicants bids had become unavailable from the supplier they had specified or had increased in price since their application was submitted. On these occasions, contact was made with the applicant to advise them that the same item(s) could be purchased from other suppliers for a similar or cheaper price than what they had originally expected.

In addition to the above amendments made to a number of bids, there was discussions made with a number of applicants regarding the purchase of Bunting.

Doncaster Council had purchased bunting for previous Tour De Yorkshire Events and therefore had sourced a company from which to purchase bunting from. Therefore, it was agreed with applicants that the team would purchase their requested length of bunting from that supplier, as it would be significantly cheaper.


It was also agreed with these applicants that the Bunting would be returned to Doncaster Council to utilise in other Communities for future Tour De Yorkshire Events. This ensured the value for money was being maximised for this item.

3. Application Category Types

The events and activities delivered by utilising the Micro Grant covered a wide variety of types and themes. With a number of them meeting the recommendations set out by the Leeds Beckett Research.

These can be broken down into the following categories: -

- Decoration of area
- Entertainment
- Viewing Hub / Area
- Party / Gala
- Refreshments
- Physical related Activity
- School Children engagement



Many of the applicants included items in their applications which met two or more of the above categories. The most popular ones were as follows: -

- Decoration of Area
- Refreshments
- Party / Gala


4. Expenditure

4.1 Individual Application Expenditure

The maximum amount for applications was £200, and there was some expectation that most would try to maximise their applications to get as close to this figure as possible.

Though this was the case with most applications, the amounts applied for did vary and the second most popular amount applied for came in at the £50 - £100 range.





There were two occasions were an applicant had bid for over the £200.

One applicant applied for £240 to deliver a Drumming workshop costing £200 + £40 VAT. The group advised they would cover the cost of the VAT. As a Local Authority, DMBC claims back VAT and therefore this cost was within the £200 limit.


One applicant applied for items that originally cost £200. However, postage charges increased the cost slightly. The final amount was £201.94. Due to the fact that this was only slightly over the £200 limit, it was agreed that this would be accepted.

4.2 Application Expenditure Totals

The budget for the Micro Grant Scheme was set at £3000, providing a minimum of 15 bids at the £200 limit.

The actual final total of all 21 bids received was £3278.11.


Because the team had managed to reduce costs by providing items from known suppliers and purchasing items from other sources, the cost of successful bids was £2250.24 and value of declined bids was £565.54



Breakdown Of Application Total + Spend

One consideration which will be utilised for future decision making will be that bids over budget can potentially be reduced in cost by sourcing other suppliers.

It is worth noting that at no point did the team consider the locality of the application but only how the application met the criteria.



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5. Monitoring / Feedback

As previously mentioned, all applicants agreed to take part in monitoring and research of the Scheme. The first stage of this was completing a simple monitoring form, which would capture a number of different statistics and provide feedback opportunities.


This form was sent to all successful applicants shortly after the Tour De Yorkshire Event. Overall, the results were extremely positive and can be found in detail via *Appendix 10.4*.

5.1 Success of Events / Activities

The first question on the monitoring form was: -

"Please provide an overview of how your project / event went"

All of the responses received were extremely positive and everyone agreed that they had a successful event overall. The responses can be broken down into a number of categories as follows: -



Event Overview Category

The comment mentioned the most was the amount of passers-by who came to watch the race but then took part in the event / activity delivered. This had a number of positive outcomes for the applicants but also the spectators who may have not been aware of the activities on offer, but now had an opportunity to take part before and after the actual the race passed through their area.

The second most popular response was the event improved Community Cohesion. A number of Applicants identified that they were proud of how their community had come together to celebrate the event.

Other categories which were identified included ones which benefited the applicant such as having their group members attend in high numbers, providing engagement with spectators (promote themselves), raise money and even gaining new members / clients as a result of the day.

A common theme amongst many of the responses was in relation to the weather, which saw a number of rain showers throughout the day and during the event. The applicants who mentioned this all advised that their event still went ahead and was still successful. This was definitely highlighted by those who had received items such as Gazebos, which ensured that their event would be able to continue. These applicants were very grateful for this and there was mention of their events potentially being cancelled if they didn't have these items.

It is worth mentioning that other than the weather, there were no negative responses and though it is possible that the applicants may have experienced small issues on the day, they haven't deemed them worthy of bringing up in their feedback.

A small selection of the positive comments from each applicant can be seen below: -

Overview of how the project / Event Went

"It was a great day with lots of families braving the rain to support the race."

"The drumming workshop went extremely well regardless of the weather."

"Every patient and staff enjoyed the day."

"It was great how many people turned up."

"It was great to see a Community together again enjoying the day for what it was."

"It was a fantastic community event, which I was proud to be a part of."

"It simply could not have gone any better and I was thrilled with outcome."

"The event was overall a great success"

"All individuals had a great time despite the rain so the fact that you provided us with a gazebo, proved to be invaluable."
"Also we raised over £300 from our bottle tombola which helps us to be able to provide outings for our individuals. We are taking them to Cleethorpes in a few week, so the money will go to providing the transport."

"Askern Town Council's event and celebrations for the Tour de Yorkshire bike race went very well, there was an excellent turn out of residents and a great community feel."

"There was so much excitement even though at times the rain was against us."

"So many people commented on how great the day was."

"We asked the children to think of something healthy they already did or will aim to do following the event and add this to their bunting."

"Our event was extremely successful. We attracted approximately 2000 people on the day".

"The event was successful"

"The BACuP micro grant was used to purchase 200 metres of TDY bunting to decorate the fencing on the front of Bentley Pavilion, Park and My Place."

"Smaller sections were used to assist local organisations to add to their displays on the route from Town End to the Pavilion."

"Amazing great turnout wonderful Community Spirit."

"The students had an amazing day"

"They truly loved making the buns to hand out the community"

"Since the TDY Open Day we have had six new volunteers start and enquiries from several others. Adults and teenagers."

"It went very well"

"We reached our goals of having more contact with the community and their families and also were able to raise money for the Cancer Detection Trust."

"Very well."

"Having shelter available on a showery day proved invaluable."

5.2 Numbers

The second question on the monitoring form was: -

"Please estimate how many people have benefited from your project / event?"




It is worth noting that this is difficult for many organisers to determine. Their interpretation of how many people benefitted from their project / event can differ depending on a number of factors.

It also differs significantly depending on the type of project / event the organiser holds. It is much easier for an applicant to count attendees to a small event within a confined area than it is for an applicant to determine numbers benefitted from decorating a community.

Therefore, though the numbers collated is not an exact science, it can be a good indication of how many people within a community potentially benefited in the long run. This process also assists the team in determining numbers / footfall in each area during the day, which can be a difficult task.

The total figure was determined to be **7459** people providing a cost per head of 30p



As expected, the highest numbers came from **Bentley** and **Askern**, which is to be expected due to the numbers of bids submitted and supported in those areas.

5.3 Demographics

The third question on the monitoring form was: -


"Please tick the following demographics which you believe benefited from your project /

The applicants were then given the following demographic categories: -

- BAME
- Under 16s
- 16-25 Year Olds
- 25-60 Year Olds
- 60+ Year Olds

It is again worth noting that this is also difficult for many organisers to determine. Their interpretation of which demographics benefitted from their project / event can differ depending on a number of factors.

The graph below provides a breakdown of applicants that identified that their project / event benefited one or more demographic group.



BAME, **16-25** and **60+** demographics were the groups identified by the Leeds Beckett University Social Impact research that were less engaged in previous Tour De Yorkshire events.

Therefore, the team provided focus on these groups, and it is clear that the scheme was successful in reaching the **16-25** and **60+** demographics. This can be seen in terms of the percentages of bids which benefited people within these age brackets.

- **16-25** = **83%** of bids
- **60+** = **89%** of bids

However, the number of bids that benefited the BAME Population demographic was the lowest with 39% of bids.

It is also worth noting that there were 7 bids, which were identified as benefiting all demographics groups in some way.

As mentioned in *Section 7*, future schemes will incorporate a section that will allow applicants to break down the demographics benefited via numbers. This will allow the team to record the information in more detail.



5.4 Benefits to the Community

The fourth Question on the Monitoring form was: -

"What benefits were created with the spending of this funding on your project / event?"



Once again, the responses were all positive and this is the section of the feedback document that had the most content from applicants.

There were no negative responses received in this section of the feedback.

The responses can be broken down into a number of categories as follows: -

Benefits to the Community

Surprisingly the most common response was in relation to the amount of engagement with School Children during the applicant's events. This was not expected as only 2 applicants had applied for items that targeted school children (See *Section 3*). However, it was identified that a number of the events / activities benefitted from the impressive turnout of school children in their area, which in turn attended and took part in the local events and activities.

It is also worth noting that as a result of school engagement carried out by Doncaster Council, schools were signposted to these local events / activities. Therefore, a number of applicants had been approached by schools enquiring if they could be involved. This then meant applicants original plans evolved to incorporate more facilities / activities to accommodate the school children.

The second most popular benefit mentioned was that the applicants utilised their activities / events as a positive networking opportunity, which as a result ensured future relationships developed within their community.

Another popular response identified intergenerational engagement where young and old came together to prepare and deliver their event / activities. This ties in with the goal of ensuring the elderly were engaged not only with the event but improving relationships with the younger sections of their community.

There were many responses that mentioned the development of lasting friendships as being developed within the Community that came together on the day.

Other responses include positive spectator feedback of the community environment as part of the Area Decoration.

A small selection of these positive comments can be seen below.

Benefits to the Community

"It was also a lovely opportunity for the older and younger generations joining together to have fun."

"Events like this go a long way towards reducing the stigma faced by our service users by allowing them to interact with the public in a differed capacity."

"The money we got for the food was very helpful and also made patients get involved in a group cooking session which also gave confidence to our service users and also provided kitchen skills."

"New people met new neighbours."

"Old friends re- met"

"From this we are starting a small gala to include a lot of the community."

"Thank you for accepting and granting my application for the micro grant, it has and will continue to benefit our centre for years to come."

"the event was also an excellent opportunity of networking by bringing all the staff from the various teams together especially as this is a new service development within the community"

"After speaking to individuals, they all expressed how it was once in a lifetime opportunity for them to be part of it."

"It made a big difference and added to the decorations in place allowing the main bike route to stand out more and created a sense of inclusion and celebration as the community came together as one."

"The free water went down very well and Norton infants and Juniors benefited as we took some up to them while they tried to eat their lunch outside in the rain."

"We were able to form a link with the primary schools in Askern and have made arrangements to discuss a long term working partnership where we can deliver health, conservation and environmental based activities both on and off site."

"An opportunity for intergenerational dialogue."

"Lasting relationships across the Greater Bentley area."

"The benefits of our project were that the community could come in and get involved in their part of the decorations/bunting and seeing it being displayed along the A19."

"It also brought a lot of fun & laughter looking at each other's designs."

"The micro grant was appreciated as it was central to ensuring a successful display of colour along the whole route from Bentley to Toll Bar."

"We received many complements and told people that some refreshments were supplied for the event by you."

"This gave our students a project to work towards and too work as a team"

"Students gained a great sense of helping the community and the buzz of the day itself was just amazing. Thank you"

"Promoting the activity of volunteering from the physical activity perspective and the emotional benefits participation in a community activity brings."

"People met each other from years ago (previously they had lost contact)"

"we raised £100 for the Cancer Detection Trust."

"A real sense of community spirit, with people of all ages talking and sharing with each other, in a positive, upbeat manner."

"The TdY passing through Askern will be remembered very positively for many years to come."


5.5 Micro Grant Scheme Feedback

The fifth and final question on the monitoring form was: -

"Do you have any feedback in relation to the process of applying for the funding and receiving your items so that we can improve future schemes?"



The responses received from this section can be broken down into the following categories:



As can be seen above, 14 out of the 18 Applicants advised that there were no recommendations they could make to improve the Scheme, which is extremely positive, especially taking into account that this is the first grants scheme the team had delivered.

One applicant advised they struggled to type on the form that came in a Microsoft Word Document. This wasn't an issue mentioned by any other applicant and this may be due to the fact this applicant was using their phone to complete the application. Suggestions for other formats the form can come in will be discussed in Section 7.3 of this report.

One applicant advised that one of the items that was replaced due to unavailability, was not fit for the purpose it was intended for. This was in relation to ribbon to be used for Bunting. One of the lessons learnt from this will be to check with the applicant to ensure they are happy with the replacement item (also covered in Section 7.4).

One of the recommendations received was that there could have been a more unified approach from organisations committed to delivering activities / events in their area. This was due to the applicant having set up a dedicated TDY planning group in their area to bring numerous Community groups together to co-ordinate the areas involvement. It was

identified that members of these groups had not finalised their plans for the micro grant during these meetings and submitted applications separately.

It is worth noting that on this occasion, the bids in the area from the members of this planning group had applied for different items specific to their own events and activities and therefore no duplication was made for the area.


Future schemes will incorporate mention of potential for duplication so for example different groups don't apply for the same items when resources received can be shared and co-ordinated for the area.

The last recommendation received was for a central point in an area to be set up so that groups from there can pick their items up rather than travel to the Civic Office to receive them.

Due to the management of the grant scheme it would be extremely difficult to incorporate in this scheme due to the fact that items are purchased and delivered over a period of time and therefore are not all available on the same date.

This section was mainly aimed at determining recommendations which the team could utilise for future schemes, however applicants also used this section of their feedback to provide positive comments on the scheme and how they found the process.

These comments can be broken down into the below categories: -



The majority of comments were in relation to how simple and easy the application process was. This was comforting for the team to hear as this was one of the main goals of the scheme to ensure as many groups / networks as possible would apply.

The second most popular response was in relation to the officer managing the scheme, the support they provided and communication with applicants. This emphasised the importance of having a single point of contact when it comes to these schemes to ensure the process is managed effectively for the benefit of the applicant.

A small selection of these positive comments can be seen below.

5.6 Leeds Beckett University Research Additional Questions

Leeds Beckett University were keen on determining the success of the Micro Grant Scheme, especially as a result of it being one of the key recommendation's they had made as part of their research carried out during Tour De Yorkshire 2018.



Therefore, they requested that a number of follow up questions be put forward to applicants in order to determine the success of the scheme. The questions are as follows.

- 1. Would you have done things differently for the Tour de Yorkshire event without this micro-grant? If yes, how?
- 2. Has this micro-grant helped you engage 'new faces'/people in your activities/organisation? If yes, can you give us some more details (NB. no personal information required)?
- 3. Has this micro-grant encouraged you to do other events in the future? If yes, can you give details?

The responses to these Questions can be found in Appendix 10.5.

Due to the fact Leeds Beckett University will be evaluating this section, this report will not cover in detail the results. However, a small selection of comments can be seen below: -

Micro grant Feedback

QUESTION 2:- "Yes we have had a few new Mums coming to our Weekly Stay and Play group, and it's prompted more partnership working/planning for future events with TARA."

QUESTION 3:- Certainly we are looking at adopting a micro grant scheme ourselves to promote the national recovery month in September which is around reducing the stigma associated with substance misuse and can often prevent those accessing support who need it as well individuals integrating back in to there communities

QUESTION 2: - "Absolutely, 2 teams from RDASH worked together which was great, also the community engaged and stated they liked the atmosphere. Our patients were very grateful for the grant and thoroughly enjoyed the day"

QUESTION 3: - "Yes, and from the encouragement of St leger Carol Higgins, we have decided to promote a teddy bear picnic gala on the 14th August for our local community. We have engaged some local groups to attend this."

QUESTION 1: - "We would rely on people to venture into the Renew Centre to seat themselves. With chairs and tables outside it offered a more relaxed approach for people who would not normally approach us on the event day. As it happens, it rained, as you know, which brought people that had not visited Renew before!"

QUESTION 1:- "If we hadn't had the microgrant money, we still would have tried to be involved although because of the poor weather, we would have likely have had to cancel going over to the Lakeside to watch the cyclists go bye, and so because you purchased our gazebo, it meant things could carry on regardless."

QUESTION 3:- "The TDY event was a lovely way to see the community come together, not just to enjoy the race but also to feel a collective responsibility and ownership of the local area, which heightened spirits and made residents and the local authority feel a sense of pride."

QUESTION 1:- "Yes, there wouldn't have been as much interest or involvement and as such we probably wouldn't have done the refreshment tent."

QUESTION 2: - "It enables us to engage with all the primary Schools in the Askern area as we had not been in to the school environment prior to this grant becoming available. All our activities are done on site.

Therefore we were able to involve a large number of children in the activities – without the grant our resources would only have enabled us to engage with a couple of schools"

QUESTION 2:- "We have made lasting relationships and new networks within our community and this will sustain beyond the event"

QUESTION 1: - "Without the micro-grant, we probably wouldn't have done any activities for the Tour De Yorkshire. We do depend on grants for activities and we were grateful for it"

QUESTION 2: - "The overall event and drawing together a Planning Group resulted in meeting new faces and developing fresh contacts. Of particular significance was the development of a partnership with the business community. A bit of bunting or a bike, kick started positive and matched responses from some shops which may not have participated otherwise."

QUESTION 1:- "We would have done things the same but obviously the interest shown by the council and the micro-grant encouraged us, and helped us financially in purchasing extra refreshments for the expected increase of numbers."

QUESTION 1:- "We possibly wouldn't have done any activity and just attended to watch."

QUESTION 1: - "It was actually the availability of grant that prompted us to hold the event. As a charity where funds are tight it meant we could hold the public Open Day without using charity funds."

QUESTION 2:- It has enabled us to engage with new faces from the community and we are following them up and will invite them to future events.

QUESTION 2: - Yes – following TdY to date a small number (<5) of those who came into our premises on that day (and were not regular attenders) have returned for subsequent services/events. Would anticipate more in future being willing to attend events/services in future as a result of engagement through TdY.

6. Good News Stories

As part of the Question 4 on the Monitoring Form, applicants were asked if they had any "Good News Stories" from their event.

This kind of information is difficult to capture as there would be occasions were such occurrences were not obvious to the event organiser(s) and difficult to determine without interviewing every attendee to their event.



However, many of the applicants did manage to determine such stories and though they have been mentioned in some form as part of the snapshots of positive comments of the previous sections of this report, there is some that the team believe are worth highlighting again.

Many of the Good News Stories were in relation to how the Community came together to enjoy their activities / events and the actual race itself. A selection of these can be seen below: -

Good News Story

"It was also a lovely opportunity for the older and younger generations joining together to have fun."

"New people met new neighbours. Old friends re- met One of the stewards actually lived here, it was great to see her all grown up."

"The most significant good news story associated with the selection of the route through Bentley & Toll Bar is the partnership working from all sections of the community. From the initial meeting at Bentley Community library, the follow up further meeting at Bentley Pavilion and the subsequent weekly meetings held at Toll Bar Communal Hall the message is 'Greater Bentley – Better2Gether'."

"It generated a lot of good will feelings throughout."

"People met each other from years ago (previously they had lost contact)"

Another common theme was that of the applicant and their group members or clients having positive experiences as a result of the day. A selection of these can be seen below: -

Good News Story

"Events like this go a long way towards reducing the stigma faced by our service users by allowing them to interact with the public in a differed capacity."

"The money we got for the food was very helpful and also made patients get involved in a group cooking session which also gave confidence to our service users and also provided kitchen skills."

"Clients looked forward to and some did go on the smoothie bike and stated they felt part of the experience plus enjoyed the general good feeling of being actively part of this."

"After speaking to individuals, they all expressed how it was once in a lifetime opportunity for them to be part of it."

"We were able to form a link with the primary schools in Askern and have made arrangements to discuss a long term working partnership where we can deliver health, conservation and environmental based activities both on and off site"

Students gained a great sense of helping the community and the buzz of the day itself was just amazing. Thank you.

And last but most certainly not least, was the following Good News Story which was provided which the team believe summed up the positive vibes experienced as a result of the Tour De Yorkshire and the impact it can have on spectators, groups and communities as a whole: -

"A real sense of community spirit, with people of all ages talking and sharing with each other, in a positive, upbeat manner. This applied to both locals and visitors from further afield.

The rain could not have dampened spirits, and there was genuine feel-good factor which has continued in conversations in the days since the event.

The TdY passing through Askern will be remembered very positively for many years to come.

The interaction for the Tour (caravan, police, teams, press, race organisers as well as the cyclists themselves) was much appreciated.

At a time of much dissatisfaction (Brexit, austerity, etc.) my sense is that everyone was more than ready for an event about which we could unite, enjoy, and have a good time together, allowing us to forget about our troubles for a while."

7. Lessons learnt

Though the Micro Grant Scheme has been positively received, some recommendations were suggested by applicants and identified by the team throughout the process. This section will discuss these below: -



7.1 Businesses

Although the Application form did not specify that Businesses could not apply, a small number of bids were received from Local Businesses and companies.

The wording of the Application specified applicants could be groups, networks and organisations and it seems that the latter may have caused some confusion to this small number of Businesses who had applied.

Those who did apply were advised their applications could not be accepted and were understanding. They advised they were not sure if they could apply or not and decided to do so anyway.

Therefore, because of this, future Micro Grant Scheme Application forms and promotions will specify that the fund is not open to Businesses.

7.2 Schools

Again, the application form did not specifically specify schools could not apply in the wording but a number of Schools engaging with the team enquired about utilising the scheme.

It is worth noting that none of the schools were disappointed once advised they could not and were very understanding. However due to the impressive amount of School involvement and engagement with Tour De Yorkshire this year (over 3500 children) it is worth discussing the possibility of opening up the Scheme for schools to apply in the future.

Those schools who showed interest in applying advised they would have requested small waving flags and Land Art materials. Though the Land Art items would probably have been declined, the Waving flags are a significantly cheap item to purchase in high numbers.

7.3 Application Form

The Application form was easily accessible via the DMBC website and was emailed to all groups on the teams TDY Mailing list. However, a small number of groups engaging with the Team advised that they rarely use computers and would have benefitted from having the form available in a hard copy format.

Therefore, because of this, a number of hard copies will be printed off and taken to the numerous roadshows and meetings attended by the team within the communities in order to distribute to such groups / individuals.

A small amount will also be left at key locations where groups meet such as Libraries and Town Halls to ensure a wider reach of the scheme

The applicants have the choice to submit their applications via email or post and therefore will make the process of applying much easier for the wider community.

7.4 Breakdown of costs

Most of the applicants did a great job in providing a breakdown of costs.

However, a small number had provided a rough estimate with no specific supplier listed. On these occasions, the team went back to the applicants to request further details and calculations.

There was also a small number of applicants who had calculated the costs incorrectly or missed of the Postage and Packing aspect of their items.

As a result of this, more emphasis will be put into the Application form of the requirement for this section to be accurate and complete.

As mentioned previously in this report, one recommendation taken from the feedback received will be that if replacement items are purchased due to the unavailability of the original item, this will be checked with the applicant prior to ensure they are happy it will be fit for what they intend to use it for.

7.5 Receiving Items

Though most applicants were very patient in waiting for their items to be delivered and available for pick up, a small number were in regular contact enquiring about their items ETAs shortly after receiving the confirmation their bids were successful.

The Application form did specify that applicants needed to be aware that the fund may take several weeks to process. However, it seems that some of the applicants had not taken this into consideration when planning their project / event.

Therefore, this will be emphasised in more detail on the application form.

7.6 Monitoring

The content of applicants monitoring forms varied from highly detailed to barely populated. This is to be expected, however more emphasis on the requirement for detail to be included will be incorporated into the Monitoring form and through discussions with successful applicants.

The breakdown of statistics relating to demographics that benefitted from the applicant's project / event could be improved to include numbers from each category. This will be added to future monitoring forms where the applicant can breakdown their total number of people benefitting into each category.

It may also be worthwhile giving a copy of the monitoring form to Applicants prior to the completion of their project / activity so that they are aware of the questions and detail the team are requiring in order to assist them capturing that information on the day rather than estimating afterwards.

The additional questions identified via Leeds Beckett University Research are also worthwhile additions to future Schemes monitoring forms, especially due the fact that the research will also cover the UCI Road World Championships 2019 and potential Tour De Yorkshire events in 2020/21.

7.7 Breakdown of Lessons Learnt

A full list of Lessons learnt / Recommendations can be seen below: -

- 1. Application forms and promotions will specify further in detail and prominence that the fund is not open to Businesses.
- 2. Discuss the possibility of opening up the Scheme for schools to apply.
- **3.** Ensure hard copies of the Application form are available at roadshows, meetings and key locations within the Community.
- **4.** More emphasis on breakdown of costs being accurate and complete.
- 5. Replacement items double-checked with applicant before purchasing.
- **6.** Emphasise to applicant on timescales of purchases and check this will not affect the delivery of their event / activity.
- **7.** Provide Applicants with a copy of the Micro Grant Monitoring form prior to the event.
- 8. Include section for applicant to add numbers at side of each demographic.
- **9.** Emphasise monitoring content to be as detailed as possible.
- 10. Consider using Leeds Beckett Research additional questions in monitoring form.

8. Next Steps

Next Steps for future Schemes are as follows: -

- Incorporate recommendation's highlighted in Lessons learnt section of this report
- Launch UCI Road World Championships 2019 Micro-Grant Scheme
- Receive feedback from internal departments / colleagues / partners on the content of this report to ensure it provides useful information that can enable them improve their work streams.

What is the Get Doncaster Cycling Fund?

As part of the borough wide Get Doncaster Moving Programme, and to celebrate the town's role in hosting the Tour de Yorkshire 2019, this fund has been introduced as part of a programme of activities allowing Get Doncaster Cycling to promote cycling as a recreation, sport and a mode of transport to Doncaster residents.

The Get Doncaster Cycling Fund has been developed to offer grants of up to £200 to eligible groups/networks/organisations within the borough of Doncaster. These grants are being offered to facilitate a 'festival atmosphere' and encourage people to be more active in the surrounding communities around Tour de Yorkshire 2019 on the Thursday 2nd May.

This grant could help fulfil the delivery of a project in your local area to contribute to a positive and vibrant festival atmosphere.

Please note:

- You do not need to be a formal, constituted group to be eligible
- Monies from the fund will not be paid directly, items/services will be purchased by DMBC on behalf of successful applicants (and collection arranged)

What can the fund be used for?

DMBC are willing to provide funding for projects that can demonstrate a contribution to promoting engagement in cycling within local communities of Doncaster. This may include:

- Using banners, bunting and/or flags to decorate areas along a cycle event route
- Hosting a 'viewing hub' perhaps providing:-
 - Respite for vulnerable residents
 - Light refreshments
 - 'Big screen' footage of the event
- Leading cycle based activities to engage communities

We are particularly interested in (although not exclusively) applications that:-

- Will engage communities along the route:-
- Town Centre, Lower Wheatley, Bentley, Tollbar, Askern, Owston, Campsall, Norton
- Demonstrate an ability to sustain engagement following the initial support provided for the event; this may relate to physical activity/sport and/or volunteering
- Applications that target, although not exclusively:
- BAME populations
- 16-25 year olds
- 60+ year olds
- Applications which can evidence "match funding", where the applicant will match funds requested to purchase similar or different items for their event / activity.





Please note:

The Get Doncaster Cycling SEED fund will not pay for;

- Activities promoting religious or political beliefs
- Professional fundraisers
- Any activities outside of the borough of Doncaster
- Holidays, prizes or food (other than light refreshments)
- Uniforms
- Goods or services that have already been bought or ordered
- Volunteer expenses

Points for consideration:

- Think carefully about the aims of the project to ensure that they are realistic.
- Plan ahead you need to be aware that the fund may take several weeks to process.
- Working in partnership and through networks can often strengthen the support given to the group/network/organisation.
- Include supporting evidence where you feel it would strengthen the application.
- It must be demonstrable that the project represents good value for money.
- Following the event, DMBC will require successful applicants to complete monitoring forms and engage in research work measuring the benefits of the scheme.
